ACT 176 S.B. NO. S.D. 2 H.D. 1

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PROCUREMENT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that during challenging
- 2 economic times, it is necessary for the State to investigate and
- 3 employ digital technology and other innovative ways of
- 4 maintaining and improving state services and infrastructure,
- 5 ensure input by stakeholders, and ensure the prudent and
- 6 cost-effective expenditure of public moneys.
- 7 The legislature further finds that the state procurement
- 8 office is responsible for reviewing the solicitation, award, and
- 9 administration of contracts, advising government agencies on
- 10 procurement issues, and providing procurement training to the
- 11 State's decentralized procurement staff. The state procurement
- 12 office administers statewide, multi-agency contracts that take
- 13 advantage of the State's aggregated purchasing power to leverage
- 14 better pricing and value for the State and the counties. In
- 15 fiscal year 2018-2019, these contracts saved the State and its
- 16 political subdivisions approximately \$19,000,000 in goods and
- 17 services, plus savings in personnel, purchasing, and subject
- 18 matter expert hours.

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1	The legislature additionally finds that government
2	purchasing offices for several states operate using a
3	self-funded model derived from a transaction fee ranging from
4	one per cent to 2.5 per cent charged to all contracts in their
5	respective procurement automation systems.
6	The special committee on State of Hawaii procurement, which
7	has been reviewing state procurement policies and procedures,
8	informally notified the state procurement office that additional
9	oversight over complex procurement issues, such as construction
10	procurement for the State, is necessary.
11	The purpose of this Act is to improve procurement
12	efficiency, minimize risks, and save taxpayer dollars by:
13	(1) Defining the term "procurement automation system";
14	(2) Authorizing the administrator of the state procurement
15	office to develop and administer procurement
16	automation systems and develop a plan for charging and
17	collecting a transaction fee from all vendors using
18	the procurement automation systems to fund the
19	development, implementation, and maintenance of the
20	systems;

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1	(3) Deleting language regarding qualified community		
2	rehabilitation programs made redundant by Act 55,		
3	Session Laws of Hawaii 2021; and		
4	(4) Adding two full-time equivalent (2.0 FTE) positions.		
5	SECTION 2. Section 103D-104, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
6	amended by adding a new definition to be appropriately inserted		
7	and to read as follows:		
8	"Procurement automation system" means an electronic		
9	procurement, accounting-oriented, multi-module, data-based		
10	system that integrates procurement activities from solicitation		
11	to contract management."		
12	SECTION 3. Section 103D-206, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
13	amended to read as follows:		
14	"§103D-206 Additional duties of the administrator of the		
15	procurement office. In addition to the duties referred to in		
16	section 103D-205, the administrator shall:		
17	(1) Perform periodic review of the procurement practices		
18	and procedures of all governmental bodies, in		
19	collaboration with the state procurement policy board		
20	for compliance with the procurement code;		

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1	(2)	Assist, advise, and guide governmental bodies in
2		matters relating to procurement;
3	(3)	Determine corrective actions; provided that if a
4		procurement officer under the jurisdiction of the
5		administrator of the state procurement office or a
6		chief procurement officer of any of the other state
7		entities under section 103D-203, fails to comply with
8		any determination rendered by the administrator within
9		thirty days from the date of the issuance of the
10		determination, or longer if permitted by the
11		administrator upon request by the procurement officer
12		or a chief procurement officer, the procurement
13		officer or chief procurement officer shall be subject
14		to an administrative fine under section 103D-106, for
15		every day of noncompliance;

orientation and training program;

(4) Develop and administer a statewide procurement

2		for vendors wishing to do business with the State and

4	<u>(7)</u>	Develop and administer procurement automation systems,
5		including methods to assess, charge, and collect a
6		transaction fee for the use of the procurement
7		automation systems to cover procurement automation
8		system costs."
9	SECT	ION 4. Section 103D-1010, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
10	amended b	y amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
11	" (a)	Any governmental body, without advertising or calling
12	for bids,	may purchase goods or services provided by qualified
13	community	rehabilitation programs serving persons with
14	disabilit	ies that have indicated an interest in supplying the
15	goods or	services and on an equitable basis may apportion the
16	business	among the interested programs; provided that the goods
17	and servi	ces meet the specifications and needs of the purchasing
18	agency an	d are purchased at a fair market price as determined by
19	the appro	priate public agency; and provided further that the
20	programs	[comply with the following:

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1	(1)	Meet] meet all of the requirements of a qualified
2		community rehabilitation program under section
3		103D-1001[; and
4	(2)	Maintain a disabled to non-disabled employee ratio
5		equal to or in excess of three-to-one for work hours
6		of direct labor at all times on the work contracted].
7	SECT	ION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
8	revenues	of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$150,000 or so much
9	thereof a	s may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 to fund
10	two full-	time equivalent (2.0 FTE) positions to manage, guide,
11	and overs	ee the procurement automation system within the state
12	procureme	nt office.
13	The	sum appropriated shall be expended by the state
14	procureme	nt office for the purposes of this Act.
15	SECT	ION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
16	and stric	ken. New statutory material is underscored.
17	SECT	ION 7. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2022.
