A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ACUPUNCTURE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the regulation of
- 2 medical professionals is important to ensure public safety and
- 3 promote access to quality care. Acupuncture is one of the
- 4 fastest growing fields in American health care due to expanded
- 5 benefits under health insurance policies and medicare and is a
- 6 popular treatment among patients seeking an alternative to
- 7 prescription opioids and those with other medical conditions.
- 8 The legislature further finds that a number of state laws
- 9 regarding acupuncturists have not been updated in over twenty
- 10 years, despite the growing demand for acupuncturists, changes to
- 11 standards for national certifications, and expanded accredited
- 12 educational programs, which now include master's and doctoral
- 13 level degrees.
- 14 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to make
- 15 comprehensive updates to chapter 436E, Hawaii Revised Statutes,
- 16 regarding acupuncture practitioners to reflect modernized scopes
- 17 of practice and licensing requirements.

1	SECTI	ON 2. Chapter 436E, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended by	adding two new sections to be appropriately
3	designated	and to read as follows:
4	" <u>§436</u>	E-A Requirements for initial licensure. (a) To
5	qualify fo	or licensure after July 1, 2023, an applicant shall
6	submit evi	dence satisfactory to the board that the applicant
7	meets the	following educational and examination requirements:
8	(1)	An individual applying for initial licensure shall
9		have successfully completed an acupuncture medicine
10		program from an accredited acupuncture medicine
11		institution; provided that those applicants who
12		graduated with an earned master's degree may apply to
13		the board for the "L.Ac." license designation, and
14		those applicants who graduated with an earned
15		doctorate degree may apply to the board for the
16		"D.Ac." license designation; and
17	(2)	All applicants for initial licensure shall pass
18		examinations and be certified by the National
19		Certification Commission for Acupuncture and Oriental
20		Medicine, or its successor entity.

- 1 (b) Applicants who have earned a bachelor's, master's, or
- 2 doctoral degree from a foreign university or college shall
- 3 demonstrate curricula and standards equivalent to or higher than
- 4 accredited institutions in the United States, which have been
- 5 recognized and approved by the board. The board may contract
- 6 with a third-party agency to determine equivalency, at cost to
- 7 the applicant.
- 8 §436E-B Legacy exemptions. Any current acupuncture
- 9 <u>licensees</u> in the State as of July 1, 2023, shall be designated
- 10 legacy status by the board for their current license
- 11 designation, allowing for the practice of acupuncture medicine.
- 12 If a license that was issued before July 1, 2023, lapses and is
- 13 not restored within two years of its expiration date, the
- 14 licensee shall be subject to the licensure requirements pursuant
- 15 to section 436E-A."
- 16 SECTION 3. Section 436E-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 17 amended to read as follows:
- 18 "[+]\$436E-1[+] Declaration of necessity for regulation and
- 19 control. The legislature hereby finds and declares that
- 20 acupuncture medicine is an evidence-based medicine rooted in
- 21 traditional and modern modalities and that the practice of

- 1 acupuncture [is a theory and method for] medicine includes
- 2 examination, evaluation, diagnosis, and treatment of [illness
- 3 and disability and for strengthening and invigorating the body
- 4 and as such affects] the patient, therefore requiring regulation
- 5 and control for public health, safety, and welfare[, and
- 6 therefore there is a necessity that individuals practicing
- 7 acupuncture be subject to regulation and control]."
- 8 SECTION 4. Section 436E-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 9 amended as follows:
- 10 1. By adding seven new definitions to be appropriately
- 11 inserted and to read:
- ""Accredited acupuncture medicine institution" means a
- 13 school or college accredited or recognized as a candidate for
- 14 accreditation by an acupuncture medicine accrediting body
- 15 recognized by the United States Department of Education.
- 16 "Acupuncture medicine" means the evidence-based medicine
- 17 rooted in traditional theories and practices, integrated with
- 18 modern biomedical theories and practices.
- 19 "Acupuncture medicine doctor" means an acupuncture
- 20 practitioner engaged in the practice of advanced acupuncture
- 21 medicine.

1	"Licensed acupuncturist" is an acupuncture practitioner who
2	has complied with all educational and professional examination
3	requirements as determined by the board and whose license
4	remains in good standing with the board, utilizing the license
5	designation "L.Ac.".
6	"Licensed doctor of acupuncture" is an acupuncture medicine
7	doctor who has complied with all educational and professional
8	examination requirements as determined by the board and whose
9	license remains in good standing with the board, utilizing the
10	license designation "D.Ac.".
11	"Practice of acupuncture medicine" means the practice of
12	acupuncture with adjunctive therapies, including but not limited
13	to manual, mechanical, electrical, light, sound,
14	electromagnetic, thermal therapy, herbal and nutraceutical
15	medicines, lifestyle and nutritional counseling, movement, and
16	other traditional and modern techniques as further determined by
17	rules adopted by the board.
18	"Practice of advanced acupuncture medicine" means the
19	practice of acupuncture medicine and the use of advanced

diagnostics, specialties, and therapeutics, based on additional

20

- 1 traditional and biomedical internal medicine training, as
- 2 further determined by rules adopted by the board."
- 3 2. By amending the definition of "acupuncture
- 4 practitioner" to read:
- 5 ""Acupuncture practitioner' means a person engaged in the
- 6 practice of acupuncture[-] medicine."
- 7 3. By amending the definition of "practice of acupuncture"
- 8 to read:
- 9 ""Practice of acupuncture" means [stimulation of a certain
- 10 acupuncture point or points on the human body for the purpose of
- 11 controlling and regulating the flow and balance of energy in the
- 12 body. The practice includes the techniques of piercing] the
- 13 integrative examination, evaluation, diagnosis, prevention, and
- 14 treatment of a physical, mental, or emotional disease in the
- 15 patient by stimulating tissue by puncturing the skin [by
- 16 inserting needles and point stimulation by the use of
- 17 acupressure, electrical, mechanical, thermal, or traditional
- 18 therapeutic means.] with a needle approved by the United States
- 19 Food and Drug Administration to various depths or utilizing
- 20 other means to achieve a response."

1 SECTION 5. Section 436E-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended to read as follows: 3 "\$436E-3 [License required.] Licensure. Except as 4 otherwise provided by law, no person shall practice acupuncture 5 or acupuncture medicine or use the title "acupuncturist" in this State, either gratuitously or for pay, [or shall offer to so 6 7 practice, or shall announce themselves either publicly or 8 privately as prepared or qualified to so practice any method of 9 acupuncture] without having [a valid unrevoked license or] first 10 obtained an acupuncture medicine intern permit [from the State; 11 provided that the requirement for a permit shall not be enforced 12 until the board has initially adopted rules] pursuant to section 13 436E-3.6[+] or an "L.Ac." or "D.Ac." license designation from 14 the board." 15 SECTION 6. Section 436E-3.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 16 amended to read as follows: 17 "\$436E-3.5 Physicians and osteopaths not exempt. Persons 18 licensed under chapter 453 who desire to practice acupuncture or 19 acupuncture medicine shall be subject to licensing under this

chapter."

1 SECTION 7. Section 436E-3.6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended to read as follows: 3 "[+]\$436E-3.6[+] Acupuncture medicine intern permit 4 required. [(a) Except as otherwise provided by law, no] No 5 person shall practice [as an] acupuncture or acupuncture 6 medicine as an intern in this State, either gratuitously or for 7 pay, [without having first obtained a permit from the board. 8 This permit shall entitle the applicant to engage in the 9 practice of acupuncture for a period of four years under the 10 immediate supervision of a licensed acupuncturist duly licensed 11 under this chapter. 12 (b) An acupuncture intern permit may be reissued once, for 13 a period not to exceed one year, upon written request to the 14 board and payment of the required fee. 15 (c) The board shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 16 defining the functions of an acupuncture intern, establishing 17 the requirements to be met by an applicant for an acupuncture 18 intern permit, and specifying the procedures for the immediate 19 supervision of the acupuncture intern by a licensed 20 acupuncturist.] unless the intern:

1	<u>(1)</u>	Is actively enrolled in a program with an accredited

21	<u>(a)</u> Ever	y person holding a license under this chapter shall

- 1 register with the board and pay a biennial fee on or before
- 2 June 30 of each odd-numbered year. Failure to pay the biennial
- 3 fee shall constitute a forfeiture of the license as of the date
- 4 of expiration. Any license so forfeited may be restored within
- 5 [one year] two years after the expiration upon filing of an
- 6 application and payment of a restoration fee.
- 7 (b) Beginning with the renewal for the licensing biennium
- 8 commencing July 1, 2023, and every biennial renewal thereafter,
- 9 all licensees in the State shall be in compliance with
- 10 continuing acupuncture medicine education requirements, as
- 11 approved by the board, by obtaining at least thirty credit hours
- 12 of continuing education, which shall include at least two credit
- 13 hours of ethics and at least two credit hours of safety.
- 14 Licensees shall hold a current and valid cardiopulmonary
- 15 resuscitation certification as a condition of license renewal."
- 16 SECTION 11. Section 436E-10, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 17 amended to read as follows:
- 18 "\$436E-10 Revocation or suspension of licenses[-];
- 19 penalties. (a) In addition to any other actions authorized by
- 20 law, any license to practice acupuncture or acupuncture medicine
- 21 under this chapter may be revoked or suspended by the board of

- 8 SECTION 12. Section 436E-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 9 repealed.
- 10 ["\$436E-4 Exemptions. A licensed acupuncturist of another
- 11 state or country for demonstrations or lectures to be given at
- 12 acupuncture or medical society meetings or at acupuncture
- 13 schools shall be exempt from licensing procedures set forth in
- 14 this chapter."]
- 15 SECTION 13. Section 436E-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 16 repealed.
- 17 ["\$436E-5 Qualifications for examination. (a) No person
- 18 shall be licensed to practice acupuncture unless the person has
- 19 passed an examination and has been found to have the necessary
- 20 qualifications as prescribed in the rules adopted by the board
- 21 pursuant to chapter 91.

7	accrediting body that is recognized by the United States
8	Department of Education for the accreditation or
9	pre-accreditation ("candidacy") of professional post-graduate

12	college, the licensee, at the licensee's own expense, shall have
13	the licensee's transcripts and curriculum evaluated by a board

16	least equivalent to the United Etates recognized doctoral
17	program of study in acupuncture and oriental medicine, and that
18	the foreign institute is licensed, approved, or accredited by
19	the appropriate governmental authority or an agency recognized
20	by a governmental authority in the respective foreign
21	jurisdiction and whose curriculum is approved by the board.

1	(e) Except as provided in this section, use of other
2	titles, prefixes, or designations shall not be permitted."]
3	SECTION 16. Section 436E-14, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
4	repealed.
5	["[\$436E-14] Foreign school curricula and standards. The
6	board of acupuncture shall not recognize and approve an earned
7	doctoral degree from a foreign university or college whose
8	curricula and standards are not equivalent to or higher than
9	institutions in the United States which have been recognized and
10	approved by the board in the study or practice of acupuncture."]
11	SECTION 17. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
12	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
13	SECTION 18. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2060.
