## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that it is very 2 challenging to provide quality education for Hawaii's students 3 while dealing with a chronic teacher shortage. The teacher shortage in the State has been exacerbated by the COVID-19 4 5 pandemic, which has caused further staffing shortages in the 6 teaching workforce. Many teachers have stayed home from work 7 because they have tested positive for COVID-19, are awaiting 8 test results to confirm whether they are positive for COVID-19, or have to take care of loved ones who are sick with COVID-19. 9 10 The legislature further finds that many teachers also 11 retired during the 2020-2021 academic year. According to data 12 provided by the department of education, four hundred twentyeight teachers retired during the 2020-2021 academic year. Some 13 14 of these individuals may wish to return to employment as 15 teachers. However, existing law prevents a retirant from being 16 employed as a teacher within twelve months of retiring. 17 legislature believes that allowing recently retired licensed

15		(A)	The retirant was not employed by the State or a
16			county during the twelve calendar months prior to
17			the first day of reemployment;
18		(B)	No agreement was entered into between the State
19			or a county and the retirant, prior to the
20			retirement of the retirant, for the return to
21			work by the retirant after retirement; and

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1		(C)	Each employer shall contribute to the pension
2			accumulation fund the required percentage of the
3			rehired retirant's compensation to amortize the
4			system's unfunded actuarial accrued liability;

6	(5)	As a	teacher or an administrator in a teacher shortage
7		area	identified by the department of education or in a
8		chart	ter school or as a mentor for new classroom
9		teach	ners; provided that:
10		(A)	The retirant was not employed by the State or a

12			the first day of reemployment;
13		(B)	No agreement was entered into between the State
14			or a county and the retirant prior to the
15			retirement of the retirant, for the return to
16			work by the retirant after retirement; and
17		(C)	The department of education or charter school
18			shall contribute to the pension accumulation fund
19			the required percentage of the rehired retirant's
20			compensation to amortize the system's unfunded
21			actuarial accrued liability[-]; or

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1	<u>(6)</u>	<u>As a</u>	teacher during a state of emergency declared by
2		the	governor pursuant to chapter 127A; provided that:
3		<u>(A)</u>	No agreement was entered into between the State
4			or a county and the retirant prior to the
5			retirement of the retirant, for the return to
6			work by the retirant after retirement;
7		<u>(B)</u>	The department of education or charter school
8			shall contribute to the pension accumulation fund
9			the required percentage of the rehired retirant's
10			compensation to amortize the system's unfunded
11			actuarial accrued liability; and
12		<u>(C)</u>	By the date of separation from service, the
13			retirant had been issued a license from the
14			Hawaii teacher standards board pursuant to
15			subpart D, part III, of chapter 302A, to teach as
16			a part-time or full-time teacher."

19	SECT	ION 4	. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050, and
20	shall be	repea	led on June 30, 2023; provided that section
21	88-9(d),	Hawai	i Revised Statutes, shall be reenacted in the form
