## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO STUDENT JOURNALISM.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. This Act shall be known and may be cited as the
- 2 Hawaii Student Journalism Protection Act.
- 3 SECTION 2. The legislature finds that states may enhance
- 4 the protections guaranteed by the First Amendment of the United
- 5 States Constitution through state laws, rules, and regulations.
- 6 The legislature further finds that student journalists attending
- 7 Hawaii public schools and the University of Hawaii need
- 8 additional protection against censorship, and that advisors need
- 9 additional protections against retaliation for refusing to
- 10 illegally censor student journalists.
- 11 Pursuant to the exclusive jurisdiction of the legislature
- 12 to identify laws of statewide concern, granted under article X,
- 13 section 6, of the Hawaii State Constitution, the legislature
- 14 further finds that allowing student journalists at the
- 15 University of Hawaii to exercise freedom of speech and freedom
- 16 of the press in school-sponsored media and protecting their

1	advisors from retaliation for refusing to censor their students
2	is a matter of statewide concern.
3	The purpose of this Act is to establish the Hawaii Student
4	Journalism Protection Act in order to:
5	(1) Allow student journalists at public schools and the
6	University of Hawaii to exercise freedom of speech and
7	freedom of the press in school-sponsored media; and
8	(2) Protect advisors from retaliation for refusing to
9	infringe upon student press freedom.
10	SECTION 3. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
11	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
12	and to read as follows:
13	"§302A- Student journalists; school-sponsored media.
14	(a) A student journalist shall be allowed to exercise freedom
15	of speech and freedom of the press in school-sponsored media and
16	shall not be disciplined for acting in accordance with this
17	section. A student journalist shall be responsible for
18	determining the news, opinion, feature, and advertising content
19	of school-sponsored media.

(b) Nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent

a student media advisor from teaching professional standards of

3	(c)	Nothing in this section shall be construed to
4	authorize	or protect student expression that:
5	(1)	Is libelous or slanderous;
6	(2)	Constitutes a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal
7		privacy;
8	(3)	Violates state or federal law;
9	(4)	Is obscene; or
10	(5)	So incites students as to create a clear and present
11		danger of the commission of an unlawful act, the
12		violation of lawful school or board policies, or the
13		material and substantial disruption of the orderly
14		operation of the school; provided that the
15		determination of a risk of material and substantial
16		disruption shall be based upon specific facts,
17		including past experience at the school and current
18		events influencing student behavior, and not on
19		undifferentiated fear or apprehension.
20	(d)	There shall be no prior constraint of material
21	prepared :	for school-sponsored media except as provided in

8	(e) No publication or other expression of material by
9	student journalists in the exercise of rights under this section
10	shall be deemed to be an expression of the school, board, or
11	department. No state agency, member of the board, officer of
12	the department, or employee of any agency or the board shall be
13	held responsible in any civil or criminal action for the
14	publication or other expression of material by student
15	journalists in the exercise of rights under this section.
16	(f) A student media advisor shall not be dismissed,
17	suspended, disciplined, reassigned, transferred, or otherwise
18	retaliated against for:
19	(1) Acting to protect a student journalist engaged in
20	conduct protected under this section or the First
21	Amendment to the United States Constitution; or

1	(2)	Refusing to infringe on conduct that is protected by
2		this section or the First Amendment to the United
3		States Constitution.
4	<u>(g)</u>	The board shall adopt a written policy for the
5	exercise	of the right of student journalists to freedom of
6	speech an	d freedom of the press in school-sponsored media in
7	accordanc	e with this section; provided that the policy shall
8	<u>include:</u>	
9	(1)	Reasonable provisions for the time, place, and manner
10		of distribution of student expression; and
11	(2)	A procedure for the timely appeal of decisions made
12		pursuant to this section.
13	(h)	For the purposes of this section:
14	<u>"Sch</u>	ool-sponsored media" means any material:
15	(1)	Prepared, written, published, or broadcast in any
16		media by a student journalist at a school;
17	(2)	Distributed or generally made available, either free
18		of charge or for a fee, to members of the student
19		body; and
20	(3)	Prepared under the direction of a student media
21		advisor, regardless of whether the material is

1	supported financially by the school or by use of
2	facilities of the school or produced in conjunction
3	with a class for which the student is enrolled.
4	"School-sponsored media" does not include material intended for
5	distribution or transmission for classroom purposes only.
6	"Student journalist" means a student who determines,
7	gathers, compiles, writes, edits, photographs, records, or
8	prepares information or advertising for inclusion in school-
9	sponsored media.
10	"Student media advisor" means an individual employed,
11	appointed, or designated by a school to supervise or provide
12	instruction relating to school-sponsored media."
13	SECTION 4. Chapter 304A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
14	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
15	and to read as follows:
16	"§304A- Student journalists; university-sponsored
17	media. (a) A student journalist shall be allowed to exercise
18	freedom of speech and freedom of the press in university-
19	sponsored media and shall not be disciplined for acting in
20	accordance with this section. A student journalist shall be

3	(b)	Nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent
4	a student	media advisor from teaching professional standards of

7	<u>(c)</u>	Nothing in this section shall be construed to
8	authorize	or protect student expression that:
9	(1)	Is libelous or slanderous;

11		privacy;
12	<u>(3)</u>	Violates state or federal law;
13	(4)	Is obscene; or
14	<u>(5)</u>	So incites students as to create a clear and present

17		material and substantial disruption of the orderly
18		operation of the university; provided that the
19		determination of a risk of material and substantial
20		disruption shall be based upon specific facts,
21		including past experience at the university and

3	(d) There shall be no prior constraint of material
4	prepared for university-sponsored media except as provided in
5	subsection (c). University officials shall have the burden of
6	showing justification without undue delay before a limitation of
7	student expression under this section and shall establish a
8	reasonable period of review for material prepared for
9	university-sponsored media. If the period of review elapses
10	without a decision, the material prepared for university-
11	sponsored media shall be considered authorized.
12	(e) No publication or other expression of material by
13	student journalists in the exercise of rights under this section
14	shall be deemed to be an expression of the university or the
15	board of regents. No state agency, member of the board of
16	regents, officer of the university, or employee of any agency or
17	the board of regents shall be held responsible in any civil or
18	criminal action for the publication or other expression of
19	material by student journalists in the exercise of rights under
20	this section.

1	<u>(f)</u>	A student media advisor shall not be dismissed,
2	suspended	, disciplined, reassigned, transferred, or otherwise
3	retaliate	d against for:
4	(1)	Acting to protect a student journalist engaged in
5		conduct protected under this section or the First
6		Amendment to the United States Constitution; or
7	(2)	Refusing to infringe on conduct that is protected by
8		this section or the First Amendment to the United
9		States Constitution.
10	<u>(g)</u>	The board of regents shall adopt a written policy for
11	the exerc	ise of the right of student journalists to freedom of
12	speech an	d freedom of the press in university-sponsored media in
13	accordanc	e with this section; provided that the policy shall
14	<u>include:</u>	
15	(1)	Reasonable provisions for the time, place, and manner
16		of distribution of student expression; and
17	(2)	A procedure for the timely appeal of decisions made
18		pursuant to this section.
19	(h)	For the purposes of this section:
20	<u>"Stu</u>	dent journalist" means a student who determines,
21	gathers.	compiles, writes, edits photographs records or

1	prepares	information or advertising for inclusion in university
2	sponsored	media.
3	<u>"Stu</u>	dent media advisor" means an individual employed,
4	appointed	, or designated by the university to supervise or
5	provide i	nstruction relating to university-sponsored media.
6	<u>"Uni</u>	versity-sponsored media" means any material:
7	(1)	Prepared, written, published, or broadcast in any
8		media by a student journalist in the university
9		system;
10	(2)	Distributed or generally made available, either free
11		of charge or for a fee, to members of the student
12		body; and
13	(3)	Prepared under the direction of a student media
14		advisor, regardless of whether the material is
15		supported financially by the university or by use of
16		facilities of the university or produced in
17		conjunction with a class for which the student is
18		enrolled.
19	"Universi	ty-sponsored media" does not include material intended
20	for distr	ibution or transmission for classroom purposes only."
21	SECT	ION 5. New statutory material is underscored.

1 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.

Establishes freedom of speech and freedom of the press protections for student journalists producing school-sponsored media or university-sponsored media unless subject to certain exceptions. Effective 7/1/2050. (HD2)

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
