### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO KUPUNA CARE PROGRAM.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The purpose of this Act is to improve
- 2 government efficiency by amending part II of chapter 349, Hawaii
- 3 Revised Statutes, entitled kupuna care and caregiver support
- 4 services, to incorporate the kupuna caregivers program into the
- 5 kupuna care program.
- 6 SECTION 2. Section 349-16, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 7 amended to read as follows:
- 8 "§349-16 Definitions. Unless the context clearly requires
- 9 a different meaning, when used in this part:
- "Activities of daily living" means the following activities
- 11 that individuals perform as a part of daily living: eating,
- 12 dressing, bathing, toileting, transferring in and out of a bed
- 13 or chair, and walking.
- 14 "Adult day care" means personal care for dependent elders
- 15 in a supervised, protective, and congregate setting during some
- 16 portion of a day. Services offered in conjunction with adult

- 1 day care include social and recreational activities, training,
- 2 and counseling.
- 3 "Aging and disability resource centers" means an entity
- 4 established by the State as part of the state system of long-
- 5 term care, serving as a highly visible and trusted source where
- 6 people of all incomes and ages can [get] obtain information on
- 7 the full range of long-term support options, and a single point
- 8 of entry for access to public long-term support programs and
- 9 benefits.
- 10 "Area agency on aging" means an agency designated by the
- 11 executive office on aging to develop and administer the area
- 12 plan for a comprehensive and coordinated system of aging
- 13 services.
- 14 "Assisted transportation" means assistance and
- 15 transportation, including escort, for a person who has cognitive
- 16 or physical difficulties using regular vehicular transportation.
- 17 "Attendant care" means standby assistance, supervision, or
- 18 cues, including verbal prompts for medication, bathing, eating,
- 19 grooming, and dressing, and may also include other activities to
- 20 help maintain the independence of an individual at home.
- 21 "Attendant care" does not include physical contact in support,
- 22 including but not limited to weight-bearing assistance with
- 23 transfers, washing, bathing, and dressing.

2	based, in	terdisciplinary approach to integrating health care and
3	social su	pport services that are tailored to an individual's
4	needs and	goals across all care services.
5	"Car	e recipient" means an individual who:
6	(1)	Is a citizen of the United States or a qualified
7		alien; provided that for the purposes of this
8		paragraph, "qualified alien" means a lawfully admitted
9		permanent resident under the Immigration and
10		Nationality Act;
11	(2)	Is sixty years of age or older;
12	(3)	Is not covered by any comparable government or private
13		home- and community-based care service, except or
14		excluding kupuna care services;
15	(4)	Does not reside in a long-term care facility, such as
16		an intermediate care facility, assisted living
17		facility, skilled nursing facility, hospital, foster
18		family home, community care foster family home, adult
19		residential care home, or expanded adult residential
20		care home; and
21	(5)	Has impairments of at least:
22		(A) Two activities of daily living;
23		(B) Two instrumental activities of daily living;

1	(C)	One activity of daily living and one instrumental
2		activity of daily living; or
3	(D)	Substantive cognitive impairment requiring
4		substantial supervision because the individual
5		behaves in a manner that poses a serious health
6		or safety hazard to the individual or another
7		person.
8	"Caregive	r" means a spouse, adult child, other relative,
9	partner, or fr	iend who has a personal relationship with and
10	provides a bro	ad range of unpaid assistance for an older adult
11	with a chronic	or disabling condition.
12	"Caregive	r support services" means services that offer
13	education, ski	lls, knowledge, mental, emotional, or social
14	support to emp	loyed caregivers.
15	"Case man	agement" means assistance either in the form of
16	access or care	coordination in circumstances where an individual
17	is experiencing	g diminished functioning capacities, personal
18	conditions, or	other characteristics that require the provision
19	of services by	formal service providers, caregivers, or [family]
20	employed careg	ivers. Activities of case management may include
21	assessing need	s, developing care plans, authorizing and
22	coordinating s	ervices among providers, and providing follow-up
23	and reassessme	nt, as required.

1	"Cho:	re" means assistance such as heavy housework, yard
2	work, or	sidewalk maintenance for a person.
3	"Coa	ch" means an individual who:
4	(1)	Helps the care recipient understand the program of
5		participant-directed services and support;
6	(2)	Develops and implements a spending plan to describe
7	pi	how the care recipient will spend the care recipient's
8		budget; [and]
9	(3)	Evaluates whether the participant-directed service and
10		support program is meeting the care recipient's
11		needs[-]; and
12	(4)	Assists the care recipient with the program's
13		enrollment process, including completing necessary
14		forms such as state and federal tax forms, privacy and
15		confidentiality forms, criminal background check
16		forms, financial management forms, employer and
17		employee related forms, and forms requested by the
18		executive office on aging for enrollment.
19	"Emp.	loyed caregiver" means an individual who meets the
20	following	requirements:
21	(1)	Provides care for a care recipient; and
22	(2)	Is employed at least twenty hours per week by one or
23		more employers or is self-employed

1	("Family caregivers" means a spouse, adult child, other
2	relative, partner, or friend who has a personal relationship
3	with, and provides a broad range of unpaid assistance for an
4	older adult with a chronic or disabling condition.
5	"Financial management service provider" means an agency
6	under contract with the executive office on aging to act as the
7	fiscal and employer agent on behalf of a care recipient to
8	manage employer-related functions, process payment to employees
9	and vendors, and monitor the care recipient's allocation of
10	funds.
11	"Home-delivered meals" means a meal provided to a care
12	recipient in the care recipient's place of residence; provided
13	that the meal is served in a program administered by the
14	executive office on aging or an area agency on aging and meets
15	all of the requirements of the Older Americans Act of 1965, as
16	amended, and all state and local laws.
17	"Homemaker [services] " means a person that provides
18	assistance with preparing meals, shopping for personal items,
19	managing money, using the telephone, or performing light
20	housework.
21	"Instrumental activities of daily living" means the
22	following instrumental activities that individuals perform as a
23	part of daily living: preparing meals, shopping for personal

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1 "Person-centered planning" means a process, [directed by 2 the care recipient, intended to identify the strengths, 3 capacities, preferences, needs, and desired outcomes of the care 4 recipient [-], caregiver, or employed caregiver. 5 "Person-centered support plan" or "support plan" means a 6 plan developed by a care recipient, caregiver, or employed 7 caregiver [with the assistance of a coach] that allows the care 8 recipient, caregiver, or employed caregiver to establish the 9 goals, skills, and knowledge necessary to work toward the 10 desired outcomes and lays out practical steps toward the 11 achievement of the goals; provided that family members and 12 friends may provide assistance in developing a care recipient's plan if the care recipient chooses to include them. 13 14 ["Qualified caregiver" means an individual who meets the 15 following requirements: 16 (1) Provides care for a care recipient; and **17** (2) Is employed at least thirty hours per week by one or 18 more employers.] 19 "Respite care" means services that offer temporary, 20 substitute supports, or living arrangements for care recipients 21 to provide a brief period of rest to [qualified] employed caregivers. "Respite care" includes: 22

1	(1)	In-nome respite (personal care, homemaker [services],
2		and other in-home respite);
3	(2)	Respite provided by attendance of the care recipient
4		at a nonresidential program;
5	(3)	Institutional respite provided by placing the care
6		recipient in an institutional setting such as a
7		nursing home for a short period of time as a respite
8		service to the employed caregiver; and
9	(4)	Any combination of services to assist the employed
10		caregiver as deemed appropriate by the area agency on
11		aging.
12	"Ser	vice provider" means an entity that has all required
13	licenses	or certificates, and is registered as a business entity
14	in the St	ate.
15	"Tra	nsportation" means transportation from one location to
16	another w	ith a vehicle and does not include any other activity."
17	SECT	ION 3. Section 349-17, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
18	amended t	o read as follows:

20	on aging	may establish the kupuna care program. The program
21	shall pro	vide an array of long-term services and supports to
22	address t	he needs of Hawaii's older adults [ <del>and their desire to</del>

12	executive	office on aging, shall determine eligibility for the
13	program,	which may include the following:
14	(1)	An intake process to preliminarily determine
15		eligibility for publicly-funded services and supports,
16		including kupuna care services;
17	(2)	A comprehensive in-home assessment of the care
18		recipient or a caregiver assessment, if necessary;
19		and
20	(3)	A written individualized person-centered support plan
21		that identifies all the services and supports needed
22		or currently used to meet the needs of the care
23		recipient, caregiver, or employed caregiver, including

1	those provided by other programs such as Medicaid or
2	privately paid programs.
3	(e) An area agency on aging shall use the assessment data
4	and individual's support plan to confirm kupuna care program
5	eligibility, then authorize and coordinate services and
6	supports. An area agency on aging shall authorize and allot
7	kupuna care services and shall not delegate the service
8	authorization function to its subcontractors.
9	[e] (f) The kupuna care program shall be delivered through
10	two distinct service options: traditional service delivery or
11	participant-directed services and support, based on an
12	[individual] individualized, person-centered support plan for
13	each eligible care recipient [+], caregiver, or employed
14	<pre>caregiver; provided that:</pre>
15	(1) Traditional service delivery shall be a service
16	provider [ <del>organization or person who provides services</del>
17	to clients under a formal contractual arrangement with
18	the executive office on aging or area agency on aging
19	who shall deliver to each care recipient one or more
20	kupuna care core services to address the care
21	recipient's specific needs that have been identified
22	in the care recipient's person centered support plan;
23	and who provides services to care recipients.

4	shall be a care recipient as defined in section 349-16.
5	(e) An area agency on aging, through the aging and
6	disability resource center or other entity designated by the
7	executive office on aging, shall conduct an intake and
8	assessment of individuals seeking long-term services and
9	supports to determine eligibility for the program. The intake
10	and assessment shall include the following:
11	(1) A statewide uniform intake process developed with and
12	adopted by the executive office on aging to
13	preliminarily determine eligibility for publicly funded
14	services and supports, including kupuna care services;
15	and
16	(2) An assessment of the eligible care recipient utilizing
17	a statewide, uniform comprehensive in home assessment,
18	if necessary. Upon completion of the in home
19	assessment, the care recipient develops a written
20	individualized person-centered support plan with:
21	(A) The assistance of a coach in the preparation of
22	the support plan; and

1	(B) Participation from family, friends, and others, if
2	the care recipient desires such additional
3	<del>assistance.</del>
4	The support plan identifies all the services and
5	supports needed or currently used to meet the care
6	recipient's needs, both formal and informal, including
7	those provided by other programs such as medicaid or
8	private paid programs. The plan shall be reviewed with
9	the care recipient to confirm that it is the plan the
10	care recipient desires.
11	(f) An area agency on aging shall use the assessment data
12	and individual's support plan to confirm kupuna care program
13	eligibility, then authorize and coordinate services and
14	supports. An area agency on aging shall directly authorize and
15	allot kupuna care services, and shall not delegate the service
16	authorization function to its subcontractors.]
17	(g) An individual shall be determined to be ineligible for
18	kupuna care services when:
19	(1) An individual does not meet the eligibility
20	requirements specified;
21	(2) An [individual] individual's need is not substantiated
22	through an in-home assessment;

	(3) An individual leaves the State of the individual's
2	whereabouts are unknown; or
3	(4) An individual refuses services.
4	(h) An area agency on aging shall provide an individual
<b>5</b> : :	with written notice of the disposition of [the request]
6	ineligibility for kupuna care services.
7	(i) An individual who has been determined ineligible for
8	kupuna care services shall have the opportunity to appeal the
9	decision to the [director of the executive office on aging
10	within ninety days after the date of notice of the area agency
11	on aging's written disposition. The director of the executive
12	office on aging's decision on the appeal shall be issued in
13	writing and shall be final. area agency on aging.
14	(j) Prior to termination of kupuna care services, service
15	providers shall notify the [appropriate contracting] area agency
16	on aging of the date and reason for termination. Termination of
17	kupuna care services may occur if the care recipient [+],
18	caregiver, or employed caregiver:
19	(1) Moves and the provider is unable to locate the care
20	recipient[+], caregiver, or employed caregiver;
21	(2) Is transferred to another area agency on aging;

PURPOSE:

To improve government efficiency by

incorporating the kupuna caregivers program

into the kupuna care program.

**MEANS:** 

Amends part II of chapter 349, Hawaii Revised Statutes, entitled kupuna care and caregiver support services, sections 349-16 and 349-17, and repeals section 349-18.

JUSTIFICATION:

Executive Office on Aging determined that having two programs that offer similar services for the care recipient and the caregiver causes silos in the system and does not lend itself to a seamless system of supports for older adults and their

caregivers.

Impact on the public: The combined program model will provide an array of seamless services and supports to meet the holistic and comprehensive needs of the older adults and their caregivers. The impact to the public is minimal as the services provided will continue.

Impact on the department and other agencies: The EOA will provide programmatic and administrative guidance to the county area agencies on aging on implementing the kupuna care program.
