#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO STATE HOLIDAYS.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that it is important for
- 2 the State's residents to learn about Hawaii's culture and
- 3 history. In 1843, King Kauikeaouli Kamehameha III established
- 4 La Hoihoi Ea, also known as Restoration Day, as the first
- 5 national holiday in the Hawaiian Kingdom. Historically
- 6 celebrated on July 31st, La Hoihoi Ea marked the restoration of
- 7 the Hawaiian Kingdom's government after the British ambassador
- 8 and a British Navy captain illegally seized control.
- 9 In 1840, Mr. Richard Charlton, Hawaii's first British
- 10 ambassador, arrived in the islands and began illegally claiming
- 11 certain land on Oahu. When Kauikeaouli rejected the claims,
- 12 Charlton left Hawaii, intending to return to England, via
- 13 Mexico, so he could argue his claim to the land before Britain's
- 14 Foreign Office. While in Mexico, Charlton met Lord George
- 15 Paulet, a British Navy captain, and persuaded Paulet to travel
- 16 with him to Hawaii to investigate his claims. Once there,
- 17 Paulet seized military control of the government and had all

- 1 Hawaiian flags lowered and burned in a five-month occupation
- 2 that became known as the "Paulet Affair".
- 3 In light of Paulet's actions, the king sent diplomatic
- 4 envoys Timoteo Haalilio and William Richards to England to
- 5 present their side of the issue, ultimately gaining favor with
- 6 Britain and clearing the way for removal of Paulet. Admiral
- 7 Richard Thomas would later be dispatched to Hawaii, where he
- 8 would remove Paulet and correct his unwarranted transgressions
- 9 against the Hawaiian Kingdom and its people.
- 10 The legislature finds that, on July 31, 1843, subjects of
- 11 the kingdom gathered on the grounds of what is now known as
- 12 Thomas Square on the island of Oahu to witness Admiral Thomas
- 13 officially restore the kingdom's government and Kauikeaouli as
- 14 king. Later that day, at Kawaihao Church, the king spoke the
- 15 words that would become the motto of the monarchy and in 1959
- 16 the official motto of the State of Hawaii: "Ua Mau ke Ea o ka
- 17 Aina i ka Pono", or "The life of the land is perpetuated in
- 18 righteousness". The commemoration of the events that occurred on
- 19 this day would come to be known as La Hoihoi Ea, or Restoration
- 20 Day, the kingdom's first national holiday.

- 1 After being removed as an official holiday, many would
- 2 continue to remember and celebrate it in small pockets
- 3 throughout the islands until it went into obscurity. Today, La
- 4 Hoihoi Ea Honolulu works in partnership with the Honolulu
- 5 Mayor's Office on Culture and the Arts to plan events throughout
- 6 the month of July to share the importance of this day and honor
- 7 upstanding members of the Hawaiian community.
- 8 The legislature notes that there have been other efforts to
- 9 recognize King Kamehameha III's accomplishments and to restore
- 10 official celebrations of La Hoihoi Ea. On June 16, 2015, the
- 11 County Council for the County of Hawaii unanimously passed
- 12 Resolution No. 185-15, Draft 2, requesting the legislature to
- 13 designate July 31 as La Hoihoi Ea, or Restoration Day. On July
- 14 31, 2018, the City and County of Honolulu marked the 175th
- 15 anniversary of La Hoihoi Ea by installing a twelve-foot tall
- 16 bronze statue of King Kamehameha III in Thomas Square Park. The
- 17 installation includes the state motto and Hawaii's flag.
- 18 Annual gatherings take place in Waianae and Waimanalo on
- 19 the island of Oahu; in Hamakua and Waimea on the island of
- 20 Hawaii; and in Lahaina on the island of Maui. A small
- 21 remembrance ceremony is also held each year in New York. The

- 1 legislature believes that, given the strong interest in
- 2 recognizing La Hoihoi Ea, the date should be made a state
- 3 holiday.
- 4 The legislature also believes that it is no longer
- $oldsymbol{5}$  necessary to designate election days as state holidays. The
- 6 original purpose of these holidays was to ensure that all
- 7 citizens had the time and opportunity to vote. Vote by mail,
- 8 same-day registration and voting, and other practices have made
- 9 voting easier, more accessible, and more convenient. In 2019,
- 10 Act 136 authorized all registered voters in Hawaii to vote by
- 11 mail, beginning in 2020. The Act also allowed a limited number
- 12 of voter service centers to remain open from the tenth business
- 13 day preceding an election through the day of the election to
- 14 receive personal delivery of mail-in ballots, accommodate voters
- 15 with special needs, offer same day registration and voting, and
- 16 provide other election services. At the conclusion of the 2020
- 17 election, the office of elections reported that more than sixty
- 18 per cent of all registered voters in Hawaii cast their ballot by
- 19 mail, while only 3.5 per cent used a service center. The
- 20 legislature believes that, rather than designating election days
- 21 as a state holidays, the holiday could be better used to educate

the State's residents on an important part of Hawaii's history 2 and to give Native Hawaiians the opportunity to celebrate and 3 remember. 4 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to remove election 5 days as designated state holidays and to establish the 6 thirty-first day of July each year as the state holiday La 7 Hoihoi Ea. 8 SECTION 2. Section 8-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows: 9 10 "§8-1 Holidays designated. The following days of each 11 year are set apart and established as state holidays: 12 The first day in January, New Year's Day; 13 The third Monday in January, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., 14 Day; 15 The third Monday in February, Presidents' Day; 16 The twenty-sixth day in March, Prince Jonah Kuhio 17 Kalanianaole Day; 18 The Friday preceding Easter Sunday, Good Friday; 19 The last Monday in May, Memorial Day;

The eleventh day in June, King Kamehameha I Day;

The fourth day in July, Independence Day;

1	The thirty-first day in July, La Hoihoi Ea;
2	The third Friday in August, Statehood Day;
3	The first Monday in September, Labor Day;
4	The eleventh day in November, Veterans' Day;
5	The fourth Thursday in November, Thanksgiving Day; and
6	The twenty-fifth day in December, Christmas $\text{Day}[+]$ .
7	[All election days, except primary and special election
8	days, in the county wherein the election is held;
9	Any day designated by proclamation by the President of the
10	United States or by the governor as a holiday."
11	SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
12	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
13	SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
