## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF HAWAIIAN HOME LANDS.

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the mission of the
- 2 department of Hawaiian home lands is to develop and deliver land
- 3 to native Hawaiians. The trust, created by Congress through the
- 4 Hawaiian Homes Commission Act of 1920, as amended (HHCA), set
- 5 aside public lands to be used for the benefit of native
- 6 Hawaiians.
- 7 As required by the Admissions Act and as a compact with the
- 8 United States, the State of Hawaii and the people of Hawaii
- 9 adopted the HHCA as a provision of the Hawaii State Constitution
- 10 and agreed to faithfully carry out the spirit of the HHCA for
- 11 the rehabilitation of the Hawaiian race. These trust
- 12 responsibilities remain to this day.
- 13 The legislature also finds that today, the department of
- 14 Hawaiian home lands is responsible for the management of 203,500
- 15 acres of trust lands, 9,959 homestead leases statewide, and
- 16 44,096 lease applications. However, over 28,700 applicants

1	remain on	the waitlist for residential, agricultural, or
2	pastoral	leases.
3	The	challenges faced by the department of Hawaiian home
4	lands in	fulfilling its mission are multi-faceted, and include
5	but are n	ot limited to:
6	(1)	Availability of beneficiary preferred land. The
7		greatest demand, and subsequently, the longest waiting
8		list, is for residential property on Oahu. However,
9		the department of Hawaiian home lands' land holdings
10		on Oahu represent only three per cent of its total
11		lands;
12	(2)	Cost of infrastructure. Preparing the department's
13		lands for homesteading with adequate roads, water,
14		sewer drainage, electrical, and other necessities
15		requires a steady source of funding to ensure that
16		environmental compliance, planning, design, and
17		construction phases are coordinated; and
18	(3)	Capital for mortgage financing. With one of the
19		highest costs of living in the nation, department of

1	challenging issue of obtaining capital for mortgages
2	to build homes and reside on trust lands.
3	The legislature further finds that the revenues collected
4	by the State as of fiscal year 2021 provide an unprecedented
5	opportunity to ensure critical long-term access to adequate
6	funding for the department of Hawaiian home lands to meet its
7	challenges. Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to provide
8	\$600,000,000 to the department of Hawaiian home lands to pursue
9	a multi-pronged approach to eliminating its waitlist.
10	Specifically, this Act:
11	(1) Establishes the Hawaiian home lands special fund; and
12	(2) Appropriates funds into and out of the Hawaiian home
13	lands special fund to enable beneficiaries of the
14	Hawaiian home lands trust to acquire a residence and
15	to enable the department to fulfill its fiduciary
16	duties to beneficiaries.
17	SECTION 2. The Hawaiian Homes Commission Act, 1920, as
18	amended, is amended by adding a new section to be appropriately
19	designated and to read as follows:
20	"§ . Hawaiian home lands special fund. (a) There is
21	established in the state treasury the Hawaiian home lands

3	(1)	Appropriations made by the legislature to the special	
4		<pre>fund;</pre>	
5	(2)	Grants provided by governmental agencies or any other

7	(3)	Donations and contributions made by private	
8		individuals or organizations for deposit into the	
9		special fund;	
10	(4)	Interest accrued on all amounts in the special fund;	
11		and	
12	<u>(5)</u>	Any other moneys made available to the special fund	
13		from other sources.	
14	(b)	Moneys in the special fund shall be used by the	
15	department of Hawaiian home lands to fulfill its fiduciary		
16	duties to	beneficiaries of this Act, including providing funding	
17	for beneficiaries to acquire a residence.		
18	<u>(c)</u>	The department of Hawaiian home lands shall submit an	
19	annual report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior		
20	to each r	egular session that includes:

1	(1) An accounting of the expenditures from the Hawaiian		
2	home lands special fund in the previous fiscal year;		
3	and		
4	(2) The number of beneficiaries taken off the waitlist for		
5	Hawaiian home lands using the funds of the Hawaiian		
6	home lands special fund."		
7	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general		
8	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$600,000,000 or so		
9	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 to b		
10	deposited into the Hawaiian home lands special fund established		
11	pursuant to section 2 of this Act.		
12	SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the Hawaiian home		
13	lands special fund the sum of $\$600,000,000$ or so much thereof $6$		
14	may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 for the department of		
15	Hawaiian home lands to enable beneficiaries of the Hawaiian hor		
16	lands trust to acquire a residence and to enable the department		
17	to fulfill its fiduciary duties to beneficiaries; provided that		
18	the expenditure ceiling for the Hawaiian home lands special fur		
19	shall be \$600,000,000.		
20	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of		
21	Hawaiian home lands for the purposes of this Act.
