# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO STATEWIDE INTEROPERABLE PUBLIC SAFETY COMMUNICATIONS.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The purpose of this Act is to formally
2	establish the statewide interoperable communications executive
3	committee and technical subcommittee, and the position of
4	statewide interoperability communications coordinator as a
5	position exempt from section 76-16, Hawaii Revised Statutes.
6	SECTION 2. Chapter 128A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
7	amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and
8	to read as follows:

19		and networks, the Nationwide Public Safety Broadband
20		Network, or FirstNet;

1	(4)	Develop plans and strategies for the coordination of
2		state, county, and, where possible, federal emergency
3		alerts and warnings with public safety answering
4		points and public safety responder communications
5		networks, infrastructure, and systems;
6	(5)	Review and adopt plans and recommendations to improve
7		or promote increased interoperability between public
8		safety responders and other government or
9		non-government stakeholders that support responses to
10		emergencies; and
11	(6)	Submit a status report on the requirements of this
12		subsection, including any obstacles and proposed
13		legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty
14		days prior to the convening of each regular session.
15	(d)	The members of the statewide interoperable
16	communica	tions executive committee shall consist of the
17	following	:
18	(1)	The adjutant general or the adjutant general's
19		designee, who shall serve as the chair of the
20		committee;

1	(2)	The attorney general or the attorney general's
2		designee;
3	(3)	The deputy director of law enforcement of the
4		department of public safety or the deputy director's
5		designee;
6	(4)	The chairperson of the board of land and natural
7		resources or the chairperson's designee;
8	(5)	The state chief information officer or the chief
9		information officer's designee;
10	(6)	The director of transportation or the director's
11		designee;
12	(7)	The director of health or the director's designee;
13	(8)	The chairperson of the Hawaii enhanced 911 board or
14		the chairperson's designee; and
15	(9)	Four members at the executive or senior personnel
16		level from the first responder or emergency management
17		agencies from each of the four counties, to be
18		selected by the respective heads of the first
19		responder or emergency management agencies of each
20		county.

- 14 communications systems and networks, including government land
- 15 mobile radio and broadband networks and those related to
- 16 emergency communications centers and public safety answering
- 17 points; provided that:
- 18 (1) The statewide interoperable communications coordinator
- shall serve as the chairperson of the statewide
- interoperable communications technical subcommittee;

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1	(2)	The respective lead radio communication engineer or
2		manager for the state and counties, or their
3		designees, shall serve on the subcommittee as subject
4		matter experts for their respective radio
5		communication systems and networks; and
6	(3)	The respective lead information security manager for
7		the state and counties, or their designees, shall
8		serve on the subcommittee as subject matter experts
9		for matters relating to cyber security.
10	(c)	The statewide interoperable communications technical
11	subcommit	tee shall:
12	(1)	Not have a fixed membership;
13	(2)	Not be subject to any quorum requirement; and
14	(3)	Be exempt from part I of chapter 92.

11		integration and collaboration across the emergency
12		communications landscape;
13	(5)	Coordinate ongoing assessment of the applicability of
14		new technical developments in communications
15		technologies for state and county public safety radio
16		communication systems and networks;
17	(6)	Serve as the single point of contact for the federal
18		government and industry on issues concerning statewide
19		interoperable communications;
20	(7)	Coordinate guidance, input, and recommendations from
21		state, county, and federal agencies on the statewide

1		communications interoperability plan and lead the
2		development, implementation, and regular update of the
3		statewide communications interoperability plan;
4	(8)	Facilitate communications among responders during
5		emergencies when responding to planned and unplanned
6		events;
7	(9)	Coordinate closely with the state single point of
8		contact on issues related to the implementation of the
9		Nationwide Public Safety Broadband Network in the
10		State;
11	(10)	Coordinate interoperability activities with public
12		safety answering points, operators of state, county
13		and federal communications systems and emergency
14		management coordinators;
15	(11)	Manage communications unit program training and
16		exercises provided by federal and state agencies, and
17		work with public safety agencies to assist with any
18		credentialing or recognition of their communications
19		personnel; and
20	(12)	Serve as the state representative to the National
21		Council of Statewide Interoperability Coordinators."

12	(6)	Positions filled by popular vote;
13	(7)	Department heads, officers, and members of any board,
14		commission, or other state agency whose appointments
15		are made by the governor or are required by law to be
16		confirmed by the senate;
17	(8)	Judges, referees, receivers, masters, jurors, notaries
18		public, land court examiners, court commissioners, and
19		attorneys appointed by a state court for a special
20		temporary service;

(9)	One bailiff for the chief justice of the supreme court
	who shall have the powers and duties of a court
	officer and bailiff under section 606-14; one
	secretary or clerk for each justice of the supreme
	court, each judge of the intermediate appellate court,
	and each judge of the circuit court; one secretary for
	the judicial council; one deputy administrative
	director of the courts; three law clerks for the chief
	justice of the supreme court, two law clerks for each

9			or temporary public service employment that are
10			filled by persons entering the workforce or
11			persons transitioning into other careers under
12			programs such as the federal Workforce Investment
13			Act of 1998, as amended, or the Senior Community
14			Service Employment Program of the Employment and
15			Training Administration of the United States
16			Department of Labor, or under other similar state
17			programs;

(16)	Positions of first deputies or first assistants of
	each department head appointed under or in the manner

	airports divisions or other functions within the
	department of transportation as may be assigned by the
	director of transportation, with the approval of the
	governor; four additional deputies in the department
	of health, each in charge of one of the following:

	and health resources administration, including other
	functions within the department as may be assigned by
	the director of health, with the approval of the
	governor; an administrative assistant to the state

3	(17)	Positions specifically exempted from this part by any
4		other law; provided that:
5		(A) Any exemption created after July 1, 2014, shall
6		expire three years after its enactment unless
7		affirmatively extended by an act of the
8		legislature; and
9		(B) All of the positions defined by paragraph (9)
10		shall be included in the position classification
11		plan;
12	(18)	Positions in the state foster grandparent program and
13		positions for temporary employment of senior citizens
14		in occupations in which there is a severe personnel
15		shortage or in special projects;
16	(19)	Household employees at the official residence of the
17		president of the University of Hawaii;
18	(20)	Employees in the department of education engaged in
19		the supervision of students during meal periods in the
20		distribution, collection, and counting of meal

1		tickets, and in the cleaning of classrooms after
2		school hours on a less than half-time basis;
3	(21)	Employees hired under the tenant hire program of the
4		Hawaii public housing authority; provided that not
5		more than twenty-six per cent of the authority's
6		workforce in any housing project maintained or
7		operated by the authority shall be hired under the
8		tenant hire program;
9	(22)	Positions of the federally funded expanded food and
10		nutrition program of the University of Hawaii that
11		require the hiring of nutrition program assistants who
12		live in the areas they serve;
13	(23)	Positions filled by persons with severe disabilities
14		who are certified by the state vocational
15		rehabilitation office that they are able to perform
16		safely the duties of the positions;
17	(24)	The sheriff;
18	(25)	A gender and other fairness coordinator hired by the
19		judiciary;
20	(26)	Positions in the Hawaii National Guard youth and adult
21		education programs;

1	(27)	In the state energy office in the department of
2		business, economic development, and tourism, all
3		energy program managers, energy program specialists,
4		energy program assistants, and energy analysts;
5	(28)	Administrative appeals hearing officers in the
6		department of human services;
7	(29)	In the Med-QUEST division of the department of human
8		services, the division administrator, finance officer,
9		health care services branch administrator, medical
10		director, and clinical standards administrator;
11	(30)	In the director's office of the department of human
12		services, the enterprise officer, information security
13		and privacy compliance officer, security and privacy
14		compliance engineer, and security and privacy
15		compliance analyst;
16	(31)	The Alzheimer's disease and related dementia services
17		coordinator in the executive office on aging;
18	(32)	In the Hawaii emergency management agency, the
19		executive officer, public information officer, civil
20		defense administrative officer, branch chiefs, and
21		emergency operations center state warning point

1	personnel; provided that, for state warning point
2	personnel, the director shall determine that
3	recruitment through normal civil service recruitment
4	procedures would result in delay or noncompliance;

15	service status of any incumbent as it existed on July 1, 1955."
16	SECTION 4. Chapter 128A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
17	amended by designating sections 128A-1 to 128A-5 as follows:
18	"PART I. GENERAL PROVISIONS"
19	SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
20	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
21	SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
