
HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH TO ISSUE CERTIFICATES OF
STILLBIRTH.

1 WHEREAS, according to the Department of Health, all
2 products of conception require the reporting of either a fetal
3 death or a live birth in the State; and
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5 WHEREAS, birth certificates are not issued for stillbirths
6 in Hawaii; and
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8 WHEREAS, United States Standard of Certificates of Birth,
9 Death, and Fetal Death are mandated by federal law; and
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11 WHEREAS, under the National Center for Health Statistics,
12 reports of fetal deaths (US Standard Report of Fetal Death) are
13 completed separately from certificates of birth (U.S. Standard
14 Certificate of Live Birth) and certificates of death (U.S.
15 Standard Certificate of Death); and

17 WHEREAS, United States vital statistics are collected and
18 published through a decentralized, cooperative system; and
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20 WHEREAS, in the United States, there is no federal birth
21 registry, rather birth certificates are issued by the states,
22 which are obligated under law to report annual vital statistics
23 data to the federal government; and

25 WHEREAS, there is not a required standard birth certificate
26 document that states must issue to individuals, and as such,
27 states may produce their own birth certificate documents for
28 distribution to individuals; and

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1 WHEREAS, some states, including Colorado, Connecticut,
2 Kansas, New York, Oregon, and Pennsylvania, issue certificates
3 of stillbirth; and

5 WHEREAS, it is appropriate and necessary to issue birth
6 certificates for stillbirths in the State for several factors,
7 including:

9 (1) According to the Centers for Disease Control and
10 Prevention, stillbirth affects one in one hundred
11 sixty births, and each year about twenty-four thousand
12 babies are stillborn in the United States, the number
13 of which affects a significant number of lives;
14
15 (2) The sheer number of stillbirths in the United States
16 has a profound and long-lasting impact on bereaved
17 parents, health care professionals, and loved ones;
18
19 (3) According to a November 18, 2021, journal article,
20 "Depression, Anxiety, PTSD, and OCD After Stillbirth:
21 A Systematic Review", by the National Institutes of
22 Health, parents who experience stillbirth have a
23 considerably higher risk of reporting symptoms of
24 depression, anxiety, and PTSD compared with parents
25 with live births;
26
27 (4) The experiences, process, and connection of parents to
28 their unborn child through pregnancy and sometimes
29 labor, delivery, and birth are the same for liveborn
30 infants and stillborn infants;
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32 (5) Having only a certificate of fetal death is a constant
33 reminder of the death of a child, rather than the
34 duration of life of a child; and

36 (6) A certificate of stillbirth would acknowledge and
37 respect the existence of life and how fleeting it can
38 sometimes be to the baby, parents, and loved ones;
39 now, therefore,

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41 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the
42 Thirty-first Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session



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1 of 2022, the Senate concurring, that the Department of Health is
2 requested to issue certificates of stillbirth; and

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4 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Health is
5 requested to issue a certificate of stillbirth to the parent or
6 parents named on a fetal death certificate issued in the case of
7 a stillbirth, upon request of the parent or parents; and

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9 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Health is
10 requested to assess the feasibility of issuing certificates of
11 stillbirths in the State; and

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13 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Health is
14 requested to submit a report of its findings and
15 recommendations, including any proposed legislation, regarding
16 the implementation of certificates of stillbirths in the State,
17 to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the
18 convening of the Regular Session of 2023; and

20 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a certified copy of this
21 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Director of Health.
