A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON PESTICIDES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The advisory committee on pesticides is tasked with advising and assisting the department of agriculture in 2 developing or revising laws and rules to carry out and 3 effectuate the purposes of chapter 149A, Hawaii Revised 4 Statutes, and with advising the department in pesticide 5 problems. At the time of the advisory committee's 6 establishment, the sugar and pineapple industries were major 7 8 stakeholders in the State's agricultural landscape. In 1980, 9 Hawaii was home to fourteen sugar and four pineapple plantations 10 that covered more than 300,000 acres. In 2017, these two crops 11 accounted for less than 5,000 acres. According to a 2017 U.S. Department of Agriculture report, diversified agriculture 12 accounted for over \$84 million in production while the coffee 13 14 industry provided the State over \$43 million. It is therefore the purpose of this Act to remove the statutory requirement that 15 the sugar and pineapple industries be represented on the 16 advisory committee on pesticides and to update the committee to 17

1 include representatives of the coffee and diversified 2 agricultural industries. SECTION 2. Section 149A-51, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 3 4 amended to read as follows: 5 "\$149A-51 Advisory committee. There shall be an advisory 6 committee on pesticides composed of but not limited to the 7 chairperson, or the chairperson's designated representative, who 8 shall head the committee and one representative each from the 9 department of health, department of land and natural resources, 10 University of Hawaii college of tropical agriculture and human 11 resources, [sugar industry, pineapple industry,] coffee 12 industry, diversified agriculture industry, Hawaii Farm Bureau 13 Federation, pesticide industry, structural pest control 14 industry, an environmental organization, a citizen group, and a 15 landscape professional. Members of the advisory committee shall 16 be appointed by the governor from a list of persons recommended 17 by the respective agencies and industries in accordance with 18 section 26-34. The committee shall advise and assist the 19 department in developing or revising laws and rules to carry out

and effectuate the purposes of this chapter and in advising the

department in pesticide problems."
