A BILL FOR AN ACT

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE I, SECTION 25, OF THE HAWAII CONSTITUTION REGARDING CRIMES AGAINST MINORS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The purpose of this Act is to propose an
- 2 amendment to article I, section 25, of the Constitution of the
- 3 State of Hawaii to provide that the legislature may define what
- 4 behavior constitutes a continuing course of conduct in
- 5 continuous sexual assault crimes against minors younger than
- 6 sixteen years of age; what behavior constitutes a continuing
- 7 course of conduct in continuous abuse of a minor younger than
- 8 sixteen years of age; and what constitutes the jury unanimity
- 9 that is required for a conviction under these two charges.
- 10 In 2006, Hawaii voters authorized the legislature to define
- 11 what behavior constitutes a continuing course of conduct in
- 12 continuous sexual assault crimes against minors younger than
- 13 fourteen years of age. This authority was needed to address the
- 14 difficulty in prosecuting those persons who repeatedly sexually
- 15 assault a child, given the difficulty that children have in
- 16 remembering the individual dates on which they were sexually



- 1 assaulted. The amendment proposed by this Act would allow the
- 2 legislature to enact a law that would permit juries to convict a
- 3 person of the continuous abuse of a minor younger than sixteen
- 4 years of age, if each member of the jury were convinced beyond a
- 5 reasonable doubt that the defendant had abused the child the
- 6 required number of times, such as three, even if there was not
- 7 unanimity as to which individual incidents constitute the
- 8 requisite number. This change in the law would make it easier
- 9 to prosecute those persons who repeatedly abuse a child.
- 10 In 1997, the legislature passed a law to prohibit
- 11 continuous sexual assault of a minor under the age of fourteen
- 12 years, but that law was invalidated by the Hawaii supreme court.
- 13 A constitutional amendment similar to this proposed amendment
- 14 was passed by voters in 2004 but was invalidated by the Hawaii
- 15 supreme court; the present version of article I, section 25, of
- 16 the Constitution of the State of Hawaii was passed by voters in
- 17 2006. The amendment proposed by this Act would allow the
- 18 legislature to expand the offense to include continuous sexual
- 19 assault of a minor under the age of sixteen years, from the
- 20 existing statutory age of fourteen years. This change would be
- 21 consistent with the age at which minors may legally consent to

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- 1 sexual conduct, with the provision that it is not an offense if
- 2 the minor is at least fourteen years old but less than sixteen
- 3 years old, and the other person is less than five years older
- 4 than the minor or legally married to the minor.
- 5 SECTION 2. Article I, section 25, of the Constitution of
- 6 the State of Hawaii is amended to read as follows:
- 7 "[SEXUAL ASSAULT] CRIMES AGAINST MINORS
- 8 Section [f]25[f]. In continuous abuse crimes against
- 9 minors younger than sixteen years of age or continuous sexual
- 10 assault crimes against minors younger than [fourteen] sixteen
- 11 years of age, the legislature may define:
- 1. What behavior constitutes a continuing course of
- conduct; and
- 14 2. What constitutes the jury unanimity that is required
- for a conviction."
- 16 SECTION 3. The question to be printed on the ballot shall
- 17 be as follows:
- 18 "Shall the Constitution of the State of Hawaii be
- 19 amended to provide that with regard to continuous
- 20 abuse of minors younger than sixteen years of age or
