### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ACUPUNCTURE.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the regulation of
- 2 medical professionals is important to ensure public safety and
- 3 promote access to quality care. Acupuncture is one of the
- 4 fastest growing fields in American health care due to expanded
- 5 benefits under health insurance policies and medicare and is a
- 6 popular treatment among patients seeking an alternative to
- 7 prescription opioids and those with other medical conditions.
- 8 The legislature further finds that a number of state laws
- 9 regarding acupuncturists have not been updated in over twenty
- 10 years, despite the growing demand for acupuncturists, changes to
- 11 standards for national certifications, and expanded accredited
- 12 educational programs, which now include master's and doctoral
- 13 level degrees.
- 14 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to make
- 15 comprehensive updates to chapter 436E, Hawaii Revised Statutes,
- 16 regarding acupuncture practitioners to reflect modernized scopes
- 17 of practice and licensing requirements.

1	SECTION 2. Chapter 436E, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended by adding three new sections to be appropriately
3	designated and to read as follows:
4	"§436E-A Requirements for initial licensure. (a) To
5	qualify for licensure after July 1, 2023, an applicant shall
6	submit evidence satisfactory to the board that the applicant
7	meets the following educational and examination requirements:
8	(1) An individual applying for initial licensure shall
9	have successfully completed an acupuncture medicine
10	program from an accredited acupuncture medicine
11	institution; provided that those applicants who
12	graduated with an earned master's degree may apply to
13	the board for the "L.Ac." license designation, and
14	those applicants who graduated with an earned
15	doctorate degree may apply to the board for the
16	"D.Ac." license designation; and
17	(2) All new applicants shall pass examinations and be
18	certified by the National Certification Commission for
19	Acupuncture and Oriental Medicine, or its successor
20	entity.

1	(b) Applicants who have earned a bachelor's, master's, or
2	doctoral degree from a foreign university or college shall
3	demonstrate curricula and standards equivalent to or higher than
4	accredited acupuncture medicine institutions in the United
5	States, which have been recognized and approved by the board.
6	The board may contract with a third-party agency to determine
7	equivalency, at cost to the applicant.
8	§436E-B Legacy exemptions. Any current acupuncture
9	licensees in the State as of July 1, 2023, shall be designated
10	legacy status by the board for their current license
11	designation, allowing for the practice of acupuncture medicine.
12	If a license that was issued before July 1, 2023, lapses and is
13	not restored within two years of its expiration date, the
14	licensee shall be subject to the licensure requirements pursuant
15	to section 436E-A.
16	§436E-C Reciprocity. (a) The board may issue a license
17	by reciprocity if the applicant:
18	(1) Files an application and pays fees as prescribed by
19	the board;
20	(2) Holds a current, unencumbered, active license pursuant
21	to the laws of any state or territory of the United

1		States with qualifications for licensure that are
2		equal to or exceed those of this State, as specified
3		in section 436E-A; and
4	(3)	Holds a current certification with the National
5		Certification Commission for Acupuncture and Oriental
6		Medicine, or its successor entity.
7	(b)	For applicants who graduated before September 1, 2000,
8	the board	may issue a license by reciprocity if the applicant:
9	(1)	Files an application and pays fees as prescribed by
10		the board;
11	(2)	Holds a current, unencumbered, active license from any
12		state or territory of the United States; and
13	(3)	Holds a current certification with the National
14		Certification Commission for Acupuncture and Oriental
15		Medicine, or its successor entity."
16	SECT	ION 3. Section 436E-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
17	amended t	o read as follows:
18	"[+]	§436E-1[+] Declaration of necessity for regulation and
19	control.	The legislature hereby finds and declares that
20	acupunctu	re medicine is an evidence-based medicine rooted in
21	tradition	al and modern modalities and that the practice of

- 1 acupuncture [is a theory and method for] medicine includes
- 2 examination, evaluation, diagnosis, and treatment of [illness
- 3 and disability and for strengthening and invigorating the body
- 4 and as such affects] the patient, therefore requiring regulation
- 5 and control for public health, safety, and welfare [, and
- 6 therefore there is a necessity that individuals practicing
- 7 acupuncture be subject to regulation and control]."
- 8 SECTION 4. Section 436E-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 9 amended as follows:
- 10 1. By adding eight new definitions to be appropriately
- 11 inserted and to read:
- ""Accredited acupuncture medicine institution" means a
- 13 school or college accredited or recognized as a candidate for
- 14 accreditation by an acupuncture medicine accrediting body
- 15 recognized by the United States Department of Education.
- "Acupuncture" means the integrative examination,
- 17 evaluation, diagnosis, prevention, and treatment of a physical,
- 18 mental, or emotional disease in the patient by stimulating
- 19 tissue by puncturing with a needle approved by the United States
- 20 Food and Drug Administration to various depths or utilizing
- 21 other means to achieve a response.

- 1 "Acupuncture medicine" means the evidence-based medicine 2 rooted in traditional theories and practices, integrated with 3 modern biomedical theories and practices. 4 "Acupuncture medicine doctor" means an acupuncture 5 practitioner engaged in the practice of advanced acupuncture 6 medicine. 7 "Licensed acupuncturist" or "L.Ac." means an acupuncture 8 practitioner who has complied with all educational and 9 professional examination requirements as determined by the board 10 and whose license remains in good standing with the board, 11 utilizing the license designation "L.Ac.". 12 "Licensed doctor of acupuncture" or "D.Ac." means an 13 acupuncture medicine doctor who has complied with all 14 educational and professional examination requirements as 15 determined by the board and whose license remains in good standing with the board, utilizing the license designation 16 17 "D.Ac.".
- 20 to manual, mechanical, electrical, light, sound,
- 21 electromagnetic, thermal therapy, herbal and nutraceutical

"Practice of acupuncture medicine" means the practice of

acupuncture with adjunctive therapies, including but not limited

- 1 medicines, lifestyle and nutritional counseling, movement, and
- 2 other traditional and modern techniques as further determined by
- 3 administrative rules.
- 4 "Practice of advanced acupuncture medicine" means the
- 5 practice of acupuncture medicine as further determined by
- 6 administrative rules."
- 7 2. By amending the definition of "acupuncture
- 8 practitioner" to read:
- 9 ""Acupuncture practitioner" means a person engaged in the
- 10 practice of acupuncture[-] medicine."
- 11 3. By repealing the definition of "practice of
- 12 acupuncture":
- 13 [""Practice of acupuncture" means stimulation of a certain
- 14 acupuncture point or points on the human body for the purpose of
- 15 controlling and regulating the flow and balance of energy in the
- 16 body. The practice includes the techniques of piercing the skin
- 17 by inserting needles and point stimulation by the use of
- 18 acupressure, electrical, mechanical, thermal, or traditional
- 19 therapeutic means."]
- 20 SECTION 5. Section 436E-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 21 amended to read as follows:

- 1 "§436E-3 [License required.] Licensure. Except as 2 otherwise provided by law, no person shall engage in the 3 practice of acupuncture medicine or engage in the practice of 4 advanced acupuncture medicine or use the title "acupuncturist" 5 in this State, either gratuitously or for pay, [or shall offer 6 to so practice, or shall announce themselves either publicly or 7 privately as prepared or qualified to so practice any method of 8 acupuncture] without having [a valid unrevoked license or] an 9 acupuncture medicine intern permit [from the State; provided 10 that the requirement for a permit shall not be enforced until 11 the board has initially adopted rules] pursuant to section 12 436E-3.6[+] or an L.Ac or D.Ac designation from the board." 13 SECTION 6. Section 436E-3.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 14 amended to read as follows: 15 "\$436E-3.5 Physicians and osteopaths not exempt. Persons 16 licensed under chapter 453 who desire to practice acupuncture 17 medicine shall be subject to licensing under this chapter." SECTION 7. Section 436E-3.6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 18 19 amended to read as follows: 20 "[{]\$436E-3.6[}] Acupuncture medicine intern permit 21 required. [(a) Except as otherwise provided by law, no] No
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1	person shall <u>engage in the</u> practice [ <del>as an</del> ] of acupuncture
2	medicine as an intern in this State, either gratuitously or for
3	pay, [without having first obtained a permit from the board.
4	This permit shall entitle the applicant to engage in the
5	practice of acupuncture for a period of four years under the
6	immediate supervision of a licensed acupuncturist duly licensed
7	under this chapter.
8	(b) An acupuncture intern permit may be reissued once, for
9	a period not to exceed one year, upon written request to the
10	board and payment of the required fee.
11	(c) The board shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91
12	defining the functions of an acupuncture intern, establishing
13	the requirements to be met by an applicant for an acupuncture
14	intern permit, and specifying the procedures for the immediate
15	supervision of the acupuncture intern by a licensed
16	acupuncturist.] unless the person:
17	(1) Is actively enrolled in a program with an accredited
18	acupuncture medicine institution;
19	(2) Has obtained a permit from the board, which shall be
20	valid for four years and may be renewed once for a
21	period not to exceed one year; and

period not to exceed one year; and

I	(3) Is practicing under the immediate supervision of an
2	acupuncture practitioner or acupuncture medicine
3	doctor who is licensed in the State and contracted or
4	employed through an accredited acupuncture medicine
5	institution."
6	SECTION 8. Section 436E-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
7	amended to read as follows:
8	"\$436E-6 Board of acupuncture. (a) There shall be a
9	board of acupuncture, the members of which shall be appointed by
10	the governor.
11	The board shall consist of five persons, two of whom shall
12	be private citizens and three shall be [acupuncturists licensed
13	in accordance with this chapter.] licensed acupuncturists or
14	licensed doctors of acupuncture.
15	(b) [Commencing July 1, 1992, and thereafter, each] Each
16	person appointed to the board shall have a four-year term and
17	shall serve [ $not$ ] $not$ more than two consecutive terms. [ $not$ ]
18	appointed to the board prior to July 1, 1992, shall be permitted
19	to continue to serve on the board until such time when a maximum
20	of eight consecutive years from the date of initial appointment
21	has been attained.]"

1	SECTION 9. Section 436E-9, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended to read as follows:
3	"[+]\$436E-9[+] Biennial renewal[-]; continuing education.
4	(a) Every person holding a license under this chapter shall
5	register with the board and pay a biennial fee on or before
6	June 30 of each odd-numbered year. Failure to pay the biennial
7	fee shall constitute a forfeiture of the license as of the date
8	of expiration. Any license so forfeited may be restored within
9	[one year] two years after the expiration upon filing of an
10	application and payment of a restoration fee.
11	(b) Beginning with the renewal for the licensing biennium
12	commencing July 1, 2025, and every biennial renewal thereafter,
13	all licensees shall be in compliance with continuing education
14	requirements, as approved by the board, by obtaining at least
15	thirty credit hours, which shall include at least two credit
16	hours of ethics and at least two credit hours of safety. The
17	board shall adopt rules relating to the requirements and
18	standards that continuing education programs shall meet to
19	obtain recognition and approval from the board.
20	(c) To determine compliance with the continuing education
21	requirement under subsection (b), the board may conduct a random

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- 1 audit of licensees. A licensee selected for audit shall be
- 2 notified by the board. Within sixty days of notification, the
- 3 licensee shall provide the board documentation to verify
- 4 compliance with the continuing education requirements.
- 5 (d) Licensees shall hold a current and valid
- 6 cardiopulmonary resuscitation certification."
- 7 SECTION 10. Section 436E-10, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 8 amended to read as follows:
- 9 "\$436E-10 Revocation or suspension of licenses[-];
- 10 penalties. (a) In addition to any other actions authorized by
- 11 law, any license to engage in the practice of acupuncture
- 12 medicine or practice of advanced acupuncture medicine under this
- 13 chapter may be revoked or suspended by the board [of
- 14 acupuncture] at any time in a proceeding before the board for
- 15 any cause authorized by law, including but not limited to the
- 16 following:
- 17 (1) Obtaining a fee on the assurance that a manifestly
- incurable ailment can be permanently cured;
- 19 (2) The use of false, fraudulent, or deceptive advertising
- and making untruthful and improbable statements;

1	(3)	[Habitually using] <u>Using</u> any [habit-forming]
2		<pre>intoxicant or controlled substance[, such as opium or</pre>
3		<pre>any of its derivatives, morphine, heroin, or cocaine;]</pre>
4		that impairs or compromises a licensee's duties, as
5		determined by administrative rules;
6	(4)	Procuring a license through fraud, misrepresentation,
7		or deceit;
8	(5)	Professional misconduct [or], gross carelessness,
9		ethics violations, or manifest incapacity [in the
10		practice of acupuncture; ], as determined by
11		administrative rules; or
12	(6)	Violating any rules adopted under this chapter.
13	(b)	Any person, except a person licensed under this
14	chapter,	who practices, treats, or instructs in any phase of
15	acupunctu	re medicine, or uses any word or title to induce the
16	belief th	at the person is engaged in the practice of any type of
17	acupunctu	re medicine, without a license or permit issued by the
18	board, sh	all be guilty of a misdemeanor and subject to a fine of
19	no less t	han \$1,000 for each day of violation. The board may
20	also seek	all legal and equitable remedies available to it for

1	the enforcement of the provisions of this chapter, including
2	injunctive relief."
3	SECTION 11. Section 436E-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
4	repealed.
5	["\$436E-5 Qualifications for examination. (a) No person
6	shall be licensed to practice acupuncture unless the person has
7	passed an examination and has been found to have the necessary
8	qualifications as prescribed in the rules adopted by the board
9	pursuant to chapter 91.
10	(b) Prior to September 1, 2000, and except as provided in
11	subsection (c), before any applicant shall be eligible for the
12	examination, the applicant shall furnish satisfactory proof to
13	the board that the applicant has received a total of not less
14	than one thousand five hundred hours of education and training
15	consisting of:
16	(1) A formal program in the science of acupuncture
17	(traditional oriental medicine) at an institute or
18	school approved by the board that:
19	(A) Shall be for a period of not less than two
20	academic years (not less than six hundred hours);
21	<del>and</del>

1		(B) Shall result in the award of a certificate or
2		diploma; and
3	<del>(2)</del>	One clinical year in a clinical internship program
4		(not less than twelve months and not less than nine
5		hundred hours) supervised by a licensed acupuncturist;

1	SECTION 12. Section 436E-12, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	repealed.
3	[" <del>[\$436E-12] Penalty.</del> (a) Any person except a person
4	licensed under this chapter who practices, treats, or instructs
5	in any phase of acupuncture without a license or permit issued
6	by the board, or uses any word or title to induce the belief
7	that they are engaged in the practice of any type of

Section 436E-13, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 6 repealed. 7 ["\$436E-13 Use of titles. (a) A licensee who has been 8 awarded a license to practice acupuncture by the board in this 9 State may use the title of "Licensed Acupuncturist" or 10 designation "L.Ac." with the licensee's name in an advertisement 11 for acupuncture or announce or append the designation to the 12 licensee's name. 13 (b) A licensee who has been awarded an earned doctoral 14 degree may use the designation "Ph.D." in an advertisement for 15 acupuncture or announce or append the designation to the 16 licensee's name if the degree was granted from a university or 17 college recognized by a regional or national accrediting body 18 recognized by the United States Department of Education. A 19 Ph.D. recognized by the board under this subsection shall 20 designate a nonpractitioner as opposed to a practitioner or 21 "doctor" of acupuncture as provided in subsection (c).

1 (c) A licensee who has been approved by the board to use the doctor of acupuncture title, may use the title "Doctor of 2 Acupuncture" or designation of "D.Ac.", after the licensee's 3 4 name, or the term "Doctor" or prefix "Dr." provided that the 5 word "Acupuncturist" immediately follows the licensee's name if the term "Doctor", or the prefix "Dr." is used alone. 6 7 (d) Before any licensee shall be eligible to use the doctor of acupuncture title, the licensee shall furnish 8 9 satisfactory proof to the board that the licensee has been 10 awarded an earned doctoral degree in acupuncture (traditional 11 oriental medicine). For licensees who graduated from an 12 institute, school, or college located in the United States or 13 any territory under the jurisdiction of the United States, the 14 institute, school, or college shall be accredited or recognized 15 as a candidate for accreditation by a regional or national 16 accrediting body that is recognized by the United States 17 Department of Education for the accreditation or pre-accreditation ("candidacy") of professional post-graduate 18 19 doctoral programs in acupuncture and oriental medicine. For 20 licensees who graduated from a foreign institute, school, or 21 college, the licensee, at the licensee's own expense, shall have 1

the licensee's transcripts and curriculum evaluated by a board 2 approved and designated professional evaluator who shall make a 3 determination on whether the transcripts and curriculum are at 4 least equivalent to the United States recognized doctoral program of study in acupuncture and oriental medicine, and that 5 6 the foreign institute is licensed, approved, or accredited by 7 the appropriate governmental authority or an agency recognized 8 by a governmental authority in the respective foreign 9 jurisdiction and whose curriculum is approved by the board. 10 (e) Except as provided in this section, use of other 11 titles, prefixes, or designations shall not be permitted."] 12 SECTION 14. Section 436E-14, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 13 repealed. 14 ["[\$436E-14] Foreign school curricula and standards. The 15 board of acupuncture shall not recognize and approve an earned 16 doctoral degree from a foreign university or college whose 17 curricula and standards are not equivalent to or higher than 18 institutions in the United States which have been recognized and 19 approved by the board in the study or practice of acupuncture."] SECTION 15. In codifying the new sections added by section 20 21 2 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute

- 1 appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating
- 2 the new sections in this Act.
- 3 SECTION 16. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 4 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 5 SECTION 17. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2060.

Beginning with the renewal for the licensing biennium commencing 7/1/2025, requires licensees to obtain thirty hours of continuing education per licensing biennium. Allows the board of acupuncture to issue licenses by reciprocity. Effective 7/1/2060. (HD1)
