# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO DENTAL ASSISTANTS.

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that, according to a 2016
- 2 report by the department of health, nearly one in four third
- 3 graders in Hawaii has untreated tooth decay: the highest rate
- 4 in the nation. More than sixty per cent of all children in
- 5 Hawaii lack protective dental sealants, which are a safe and
- 6 cost-effective intervention to prevent tooth decay in molar
- 7 teeth.
- 8 The legislature further finds that this lack of access to
- 9 sufficient dental care has led to devastating health outcomes
- 10 among children, especially those in native Hawaiian and Pacific
- 11 Islander communities. The high rate of tooth decay among
- 12 Hawaii's keiki can lead to significant pain that interferes with
- 13 daily activities, such as eating, learning, and socializing.
- 14 Untreated cavities also increase the risk of more serious
- 15 infection in the mouth and body.
- 16 The legislature further finds that the State lacks adequate
- 17 and accessible dental public health infrastructure, especially



- 1 on the neighbor islands. The 2015 Hawaii Oral Health Key
- 2 Findings report by the department of health suggests multiple
- 3 strategies to address the lack of adequate dental public health
- 4 infrastructure, including the development of community and
- 5 school-based dental disease prevention programs for all age
- 6 groups, continued support and expansion of affordable and
- 7 accessible preventive dental care services to the State's low-
- 8 income population, and further exploration of innovative,
- 9 evidence-based strategies to expand access to underserved, high-
- 10 risk populations.
- 11 The legislature further finds that dental assistants could
- 12 play an important role in improving access to dental health care
- 13 across the State. Although the Hawaii Dental Practice Act
- 14 allows dental hygienists to practice under the general
- 15 supervision of a dentist in public health settings, dental
- 16 assistants are prohibited from providing auxiliary support
- 17 except under direct supervision. This undermines the efficacy
- 18 of dental assistants in public health settings and limits the
- 19 reach and sustainability of community dental programs.
- The legislature further finds that, according to the Oral
- 21 Health Workforce Research Center, eight states, including

- 1 Alaska, Arizona, Maine, Maryland, Nebraska, New Mexico, Oregon,
- 2 and Wyoming, allow dental assistants to perform some tasks under
- 3 indirect or general supervision without licensure, registration,
- 4 or representation on the state board of dentistry. Allowing
- 5 dental assistants to provide limited, but essential, auxiliary
- 6 support under general supervision while in public health
- 7 settings would contribute to the development and sustainable
- 8 implementation of community-based dental disease prevention
- 9 programs. It would also expand providers' ability to offer
- 10 adequate and accessible oral health services to rural
- 11 communities and the State's most vulnerable residents.
- 12 The purpose of this Act is to allow dental assistants to
- 13 perform limited, essential duties under the general supervision
- 14 of a dentist in public health settings.
- 15 SECTION 2. Chapter 448, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 16 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
- 17 and to read as follows:
- 18 "§448- Supervision in public health settings. (a) A
- 19 dental assistant may operate under the general supervision of
- 20 any licensed dentist providing support dental services in a
- 21 public health setting.

1	<u>(b)</u>	General supervision shall be permitted in a public	
2	health setting; provided that:		
3	(1)	The supervising licensed dentist is available for	
4		consultation;	
5	(2)	The dental assistant is working under the direction of	
6		a dental hygienist licensed under chapter 447; and	
7	(3)	The licensed dental hygienist is under the supervision	
8		of a licensed dentist.	
9	<u>(c)</u>	A dental assistant working under the general	
10	supervision of a licensed dentist and the direction of a		
11	licensed dental hygienist who is under the general supervision		
12	of a licensed dentist may perform the following supportive		
13	dental procedures:		
14	(1)	Taking intra-oral and extra-oral photographs, and	
15		recording or charting clinical findings as directed by	
16		the licensed dental hygienist;	
17	(2)	Exposing, processing, mounting, and labeling	
18		radiographs;	
19	(3)	Measuring and recording vital signs;	
20	(4)	Assisting the licensed dental hygienist who is	
21		performing a dental procedure on a patient, such as:	

1	(A)	Preparing procedural trays and armamentaria;		
2	(B)	Retracting a patient's oral tissues to maintain		
3		the field of operation during a dental procedure;		
4	<u>(C)</u>	Removing debris, as is normally created and		
5		accumulated during or after dental procedures by		
6		the dental hygienist; and		
7	(D)	Transferring dental instruments or any other		
8		concept of four-handed dentistry the dental		
9		hygienist requires to perform the procedure; and		
10	(5) Assi	sting the licensed dental hygienist in the		
11	perf	ormance of the duties of the dental hygienist as		
12	requ	ested; provided that the assistance does not		
13	incl	ude procedures listed in Hawaii Administrative		
14	Rule	s, sections 16-79-69.5 and 16-79-69.10;		
15	provided furth	er that the dental assistant, licensed dental		
16	hygienist, and licensed dentist are providing dental services in			
17	a public health setting.			
18	(d) The	supervising licensed dentist shall be responsible		
19	for all delega	ted acts performed by the dental assistant.		
20	(e) As u	sed in this section, "public health setting" has		
21	the same meani	ng as defined in section 447-3."		

- 1 SECTION 3. New statutory material is underscored.
- 2 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on January 1, 2023.
