A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PSYCHOLOGY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	PART I
2	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that properly licensed
3	school psychologists provide effective services to help children
4	and youth succeed academically, socially, behaviorally, and
5	emotionally by providing direct educational and mental health
6	services for children and youth, as well as working with
7	parents, educators, and other professionals to create supportive
8	learning and social environments for all children.
9	Currently, Hawaii is the only state without certification
10	or licensure for school psychologists. Without licensing, the
11	State cannot ensure that functioning school psychologists are
12	properly qualified and delivering appropriate services. In
13	addition, the State's failure to properly license school
14	psychologists means that, by law, the State is unable to seek
15	reimbursements from the federal medicaid program for the use of
16	school psychologists in an educational setting. Consequently,
17	it is necessary to establish a licensure program to ensure the

- 1 employment of qualified school psychologists and to allow
- 2 schools using school psychologists to properly seek available
- 3 federal medicaid funds.
- 4 The legislature further finds that a proper licensing
- 5 program requires establishing meaningful criteria and guidelines
- 6 for the licensure of school psychologists. The National
- 7 Association of School Psychologists' Standards for the
- 8 Credentialing of School Psychologists provides a model upon
- 9 which these guidelines may in part be based. The National
- 10 Association of School Psychologists' Standards create a set of
- 11 national standards that can serve to regulate the credentialing
- 12 of school psychologists. School psychologists who hold a
- 13 National Association of School Psychologists credential have met
- 14 these national standards.
- 15 The legislature finds that accredited school psychologists
- 16 should be licensed by, and registered with, the board of
- 17 psychology to ensure the delivery of quality services to
- 18 students and the community. The legislature additionally finds
- 19 that school psychologists and the practice of school psychology
- 20 should be subject to regulation and control to protect the
- 21 public from the unqualified practice of school psychology and

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- 2 school psychology.
- 3 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to:

Psychologists' Standards; and

- 4 (1) Establish the recommended criteria for the interim

 5 licensure of school psychologists, including graduate

 6 coursework, practica, and internship requirements

 7 based in part on the National Association of School
- 9 (2) Require the board of psychology and the department of
 10 education to collaborate to develop a permanent
 11 licensing scheme for school psychologists in the State
 12 and to submit a report to the legislature of their
 13 findings and recommendations.
- 14 SECTION 2. Chapter 465, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
 15 amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and
 16 to read as follows:
- 17 "PART . SCHOOL PSYCHOLOGISTS
- 18 §465- Findings and declaration of necessity. It is the
 19 intent of the legislature to establish standards for the
 20 licensing of school psychologists to address the present and
 21 critical need for ensuring that individuals requiring the

- 1 services of a licensed school psychologist receive appropriate
- 2 services by highly qualified and licensed professionals. The
- 3 special state interest for creating this part is recognized,
- 4 notwithstanding the requirements of section 26H-6.
- 5 §465- Definitions. As used in this part:
- 6 "Accredited educational institution" means a university or
- 7 college accredited by the Western Association of Schools and
- 8 Colleges or a comparable regional body.
- 9 "Approved private school" means any educational institution
- 10 that is licensed or accredited by the Hawaii Association of
- 11 Independent Schools.
- "Developmental center" means any facility that offers
- 13 developmentally appropriate psychological, educational, social,
- 14 adaptive, language, or motor skills training or
- 15 psychoeducational and multidisciplinary diagnostic services to
- 16 special needs children or developmentally disabled adults.
- 17 "Practice of school psychology" means the application of
- 18 principles, methods, and procedures of measurement, prediction,
- 19 evaluation, testing, counseling, consultation, and instruction
- 20 related to, and consistent with, the national standards
- 21 articulated by the most current Model for Comprehensive and

- 1 Integrated School Psychological Services, as published by the
- 2 National Association of School Psychologists or its successor,
- 3 in a school setting. "Practice of school psychology" does not
- 4 include private practice.
- 5 "School psychologist" means a person licensed by the board
- 6 who engages in the practice of school psychology consistent with
- 7 the national standards articulated by the most current Model for
- 8 Comprehensive and Integrated School Psychological Services as
- 9 published by the National Association of School Psychologists or
- 10 its successor. "School psychologist" includes a school
- 11 psychologist-doctorate and a school psychologist-specialist.
- 12 §465- School psychologists; regulation; qualifications.
- 13 (a) Notwithstanding any other law, school psychologists in the
- 14 State shall be licensed by the board and regulated pursuant to
- 15 this part.
- 16 (b) No applicant shall be licensed to engage in the
- 17 practice of school psychology unless the applicant meets the
- 18 following qualifications:
- 19 (1) Has received a specialist-level degree or doctoral
- 20 degree from an organized program of study in school
- 21 psychology within an accredited educational

1		institution, consisting of a minimum of sixty semester
2		hours consistent with the National Association of
3		School Psychologists' standards for graduate
4		preparation of school psychologists, and:
5		(A) Has completed one thousand two hundred hours of
6		supervised internship in school psychology with
7		not less than six hundred hours completed within
8		a school setting; and
9		(B) Has passed the School Psychology Praxis
10		examination with a minimum score of one hundred
11		forty-seven or the most current standard of the
12		National Association of School Psychologists; or
13	(2)	Holds a current, unencumbered certificate as a
14		nationally certified school psychologist or a valid
15		license or credential in school psychology in another
16		state or United States territory prior to January 1,
17		2023; provided that for those employed as a school
18		psychologist in Hawaii as of January 1, 2023, an out-
19		of-state license or credential that has been expired
20		for not more than ten years from January 1, 2023,
21		shall also be accepted.

- 1 (c) Before any applicant shall be eligible for licensure
- 2 under this part, the applicant shall file an application in a
- 3 form prescribed by the board and pay an application fee and all
- 4 other applicable fees.
- 5 §465- Fees; disposition. (a) Upon application for a
- 6 new license and at each biennial renewal, each applicant shall
- 7 pay a license fee of \$ and a compliance resolution
- 9 part shall not be refundable. Fees collected pursuant to this
- 10 section shall be deposited into the compliance resolution fund
- 11 established pursuant to section 26-9(o).
- 12 (b) Every school psychologist holding a license under this
- 13 part shall renew the license with the board no later than
- 14 June 30 of each even-numbered year. Every school psychologist
- 15 shall pay a renewal fee and comply with the continuing education
- 16 requirements provided in rules adopted by the board pursuant to
- 17 chapter 91.
- 18 (c) A school psychologist shall meet the continuing
- 19 education requirements by obtaining twenty-five credit hours,
- 20 with not less than ten of those hours accredited by the National
- 21 Association of School Psychologists annually, as provided in the

- 1 board's rules. To determine compliance, the board may conduct a
- 2 random audit. A school psychologist selected for audit shall be
- 3 notified by the board. Within sixty days of notification, the
- 4 school psychologist shall provide to the board documentation to
- 5 verify compliance with the continuing education requirements.
- 6 (d) Failure to renew, pay the renewal fee, or provide
- 7 documentation of compliance in the case of an audit shall
- 8 constitute a forfeiture of license, which may be restored only
- 9 upon the submission of written application therefor, payment to
- 10 the board of a restoration fee, and, in the case of audited
- 11 school psychologists, documentation of compliance.
- 12 §465- Description of services. (a) A person practices
- 13 as a school psychologist if the person delivers services to
- 14 children and students from birth through college who are
- 15 eligible to be enrolled in educational and intermediate
- 16 educational units, special education programs, universities and
- 17 colleges, early intervention programs, developmental centers,
- 18 and approved private schools. School psychologists are limited
- 19 to practicing within these settings, and licensure does not
- 20 allow for private practice.

1 Services delivered pursuant to this section are 2 articulated under the domains of the National Association of School Psychologists' Model for Comprehensive and Integrated 3 4 School Psychological Services, as may be amended, which 5 represents the National Association of School Psychologists' 6 official policy regarding the delivery of school psychological 7 services and the ethical standards developed and published by 8 the National Association of School Psychologists. 9 Practice of school psychology; interim license 10 (a) Beginning on January 1, 2023, no person shall required. 11 engage in the practice of school psychology or represent, 12 announce, or advertise oneself, publicly or privately, as a 13 "licensed school psychologist" or "school psychologist" or affix any other words, letters, abbreviations, or insignia to the 14 person's name indicating or implying that the person is engaged 15 16 in the practice of school psychology, without having first 17 obtained an interim license as provided in this part; provided 18 that all school psychologists employed by the department of 19 education shall be licensed under this part by January 1, 2025. 20 A person who is a student in an accredited school 21 psychology program may use a title of "school psychology intern"

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- 1 or "school psychology practicum student" that indicates the
- 2 person's training status; provided that the person shall not
- 3 identify the person's self as a "licensed school psychologist"
- 4 or "school psychologist" or imply that the person is licensed to
- 5 practice school psychology.
- 6 (c) Any person who violates this section shall be subject
- 7 to a fine of not more than \$1,000 for each separate offense.
- 8 Each day of each violation shall constitute a separate offense.
- 9 §465- Advising the board of psychology. The board shall
- 10 receive advice and review proposals from the Hawaii Association
- 11 of School Psychologists regarding issues relating to school
- 12 psychologists and the practice of school psychology.
- 13 §465- Grounds for refusal to renew, reinstate, or
- 14 restore a license and for denial, revocation, suspension, or
- 15 condition of licenses. (a) In addition to other acts or
- 16 conditions provided by law, the board may refuse to renew,
- 17 reinstate, or restore, and may deny, revoke, suspend, or
- 18 condition in any manner any license for any one or more of the
- 19 following acts or conditions on the part of a licensee or an
- 20 applicant for a license:

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1	(1)	ratifing to meet of maintain the conditions and
2		requirements necessary to qualify for the granting of
3		a license;
4	(2)	Engaging in false, fraudulent, or deceptive
5		advertising, or making untruthful or improbable
6		statements;
7	(3)	Engaging in the practice of school psychology while
8		the ability to do so is impaired by alcohol, drugs,
9		physical disability, or mental instability;
10	(4)	Procuring a license for the practice of school
11		psychology through fraud, misrepresentation, or
12		deceit;
13	(5)	Aiding and abetting an unlicensed person to directly
14		or indirectly perform activities requiring a license;
15	(6)	Engaging in professional misconduct, incompetence,
16		gross negligence, or manifest incapacity in the
17		practice of school psychology;
18	(7)	Engaging in conduct or practice contrary to recognized
19		standards of ethics for the practice of school
20		psychology;

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1	(0)	violating any condition of limitation imposed on a
2		license for the practice of school psychology by the
3		board;
4	(9)	Engaging in the practice of school psychology in a
5		manner that causes injury to one or more members of
6		the public;
7	(10)	Failing to comply with, observe, or adhere to any law
8		in a manner such that the board deems the applicant or
9		holder to be an unfit or improper person to hold a
10		license;
11	(11)	Revocation, suspension, or other disciplinary action
12		by another state or federal agency against a licensee
13		or applicant for any reason provided by the licensing
14		laws or this section;
15	(12)	Criminal conviction, whether by nolo contendere or
16		otherwise, of a penal crime directly related to the
17		qualifications, functions, or duties of school
18		psychology, notwithstanding any statutory provision to
19		the contrary;
20	(13)	Failing to report to the board, in writing, any
21		disciplinary decision issued against the licensee or

1		the applicant in another jurisdiction within thirty
2		days after the disciplinary decision is issued;
3	(14)	Employing, using, or attempting to employ or use at
4		any time any person not licensed under this chapter
5		where licensure is required; or
6	(15)	Violating this part, chapter 436B, or any rule or
7		order of the board.
8	(b)	Any licensee or applicant who violates this section
9	may also	be fined not less than \$100 and not more than \$1,000.
10	§ 4 65	- Exemption. This part is not intended to restrict
11	the pract	ice of other licensed or credentialed practitioners
12	practicin	g within their own recognized scopes of practice in
13	education	al settings. This part shall not apply to any person
14	working w	ithin the scope of practice or duties of another
15	licensed	profession that overlaps with the practice of school
16	psycholog	y; provided that the person does not use the title
17	"school p	sychologist" or "licensed school psychologist"."

3	"(a)	This chapter shall not apply to:
4	(1)	Any person teaching, lecturing, consulting, or
5		engaging in research in psychology insofar as the
6		activities are performed as part of or are dependent
7		upon employment in a college or university; provided
8		that the person shall not engage in the practice of
9		psychology outside the responsibilities of the
10		person's employment;
11	(2)	Any person who performs any, or any combination of the
12		professional services defined as the practice of
13		psychology under the direction of a licensed
14		psychologist in accordance with rules adopted by the
15		board; provided that the person may use the term
16		"psychological assistant", but shall not identify the
17		person's self as a psychologist or imply that the
18		person is licensed to practice psychology;
19	(3)	Any person employed by a local, state, or federal
20		government agency in a [school psychologist or]
21		psychological examiner position, or a position that

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1		does not involve diagnostic of creatment services, but
2		only at those times when that person is carrying out
3		the functions of such government employment;
4	(4)	Any person who is a student of psychology, a
5		psychological intern, or a resident in psychology
6		preparing for the profession of psychology under
7		supervision in a training institution or facility and
8		who is designated by a title as "psychology trainee",
9		"psychology student", "psychology intern", or
10		"psychology resident", that indicates the person's
11		training status; provided that the person shall not
12		identify the person's self as a psychologist or imply
13		that the person is licensed to practice psychology;
14	(5)	Any person who is a member of another profession
15		licensed under the laws of this jurisdiction to render
16		or advertise services, including psychotherapy, within
17		the scope of practice as defined in the statutes or
18		rules regulating the person's professional practice;
19		provided that, notwithstanding section 465-1, the
20		person does not represent the person's self to be a

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1	psychologist	or	does	not	represent	that	the	person	is
2	licensed to p	prac	tice	psyc	chology;				

- (6) Any person who is a member of a mental health profession not requiring licensure; provided that the person functions only within the person's professional capacities; and provided further that the person does not represent the person to be a psychologist, or the person's services as psychological;
- (7) Any person who is a duly recognized member of the clergy; provided that the person functions only within the person's capacities as a member of the clergy; and provided further that the person does not represent the person to be a psychologist, or the person's services as psychological;
- (8) Any psychologist employed by the United States

 Department of Defense, while engaged in the discharge
 of the psychologist's official duty and providing
 direct telehealth support or services, as defined in
 section 431:10A-116.3, to neighbor island
 beneficiaries within a Hawaii National Guard armory on
 the island of Kauai, Hawaii, Molokai, or Maui;

1	provided that the psychologist employed by the United
2	States Department of Defense is credentialed by
3	Tripler Army Medical Center; or
4	(9) Any supervisee of a licensed psychologist as defined
5	in section 465D-7."
6	SECTION 5. Section 465-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
7	amended to read as follows:
8	"§465-4 Board of psychology; appointment, qualifications,
9	term, expenses. There is created a board of psychology
10	consisting of [seven] <u>nine</u> members. There shall be five members
11	representing varied specialties of the profession, each of whom
12	shall be licensed to practice psychology under this chapter and
13	have a minimum of five years of post-doctoral professional
14	experience, two members who are licensed to practice school
15	psychology under part , and two lay members from the
16	community at large[-]; provided that, of the initial licensed
17	school psychologist appointees, one shall be appointed for a
18	three-year term. A lay member shall not be a psychologist, an
19	applicant, or former applicant for licensure as a psychologist."

- 1 SECTION 6. Section 26H-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 2 amended to read as follows:
- 3 "§26H-4 Repeal dates for newly enacted professional and
- 4 vocational regulatory programs. (a) Any professional or
- 5 vocational regulatory program enacted after January 1, 1994, and
- 6 listed in this section shall be repealed as specified in this
- 7 section. The auditor shall perform an evaluation of the
- 8 program, pursuant to section 26H-5, prior to its repeal date.
- 9 (b) Chapter 466L (appraisal management companies) shall be
- 10 repealed on June 30, 2023.
- 11 (c) Chapter 457J (midwives) shall be repealed on June 30,

- 16 SECTION 7. (a) The Hawaii board of psychology and the
- 17 department of education shall collaborate to develop a permanent
- 18 licensing scheme for school psychologists in the State. The
- 19 board of psychology and the department of education shall
- 20 further consider whether school psychologists shall be regulated
- 21 under a new board, or whether the existing board of psychology

- 1 shall be expanded to include membership of both clinical
- 2 psychologists and school psychologists.
- 3 (b) The Hawaii board of psychology and the department of
- 4 education shall submit a report of its findings and
- 5 recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the
- 6 legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of
- 7 the regular session of 2023.
- 8 PART IV
- 9 SECTION 8. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
- 10 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
- 11 begun before its effective date.
- 12 SECTION 9. If any provision of this Act, or the
- 13 application thereof to any person or circumstance, is held
- 14 invalid, the invalidity does not affect other provisions or
- 15 applications of the Act that can be given effect without the
- 16 invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions
- 17 of this Act are severable.
- 18 SECTION 10. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 19 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 20 SECTION 11. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2022.

Report Title:

School Psychologists; Licensure; Board of Psychology; Composition; Requirements

Description:

Establishes interim licensure requirements for school psychologists to be administered by the Board of Psychology. Requires all school psychologists to be licensed by January 1, 2023. Increases the composition of the Board of Psychology to include two school psychologists. Requires the Board of Psychology and the Department of Education to collaborate to determine a permanent licensing scheme for school psychologists in the State and to submit a report of their findings and recommendations to the Legislature.
