## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HOMELESSNESS.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that homelessness in
- 2 Hawaii is a long-term problem. The legislature acknowledges
- 3 that homelessness requires greater collaboration and
- 4 coordination among diverse government entities, businesses,
- 5 nonprofits, and faith-based organizations. Accordingly, the
- 6 legislature enacted Act 105, Session Laws of Hawaii 2012 (Act
- 7 105). Act 105, in part, formally established the Hawaii
- 8 interagency council on homelessness, which was temporarily
- 9 created through Executive Order No 11-21, and allowed the
- 10 council to continue identifying critical strategic goals and
- 11 initiatives that would mitigate homelessness while ensuring that
- 12 persons experiencing homelessness obtain permanent housing and
- 13 become reintegrated into the community. As one of its statutory
- 14 duties, the council adopted a ten-year plan on September 10,
- 15 2012. At that time, the point-in-time count or the annual one-
- 16 day unduplicated count of sheltered and unsheltered individuals
- 17 and families experiencing homelessness in the State totaled

- 1 7,921 statewide. Eight years later, in 2020, the point-in-time
- 2 count totaled 6,458.
- 3 While the Hawaii interagency council on homelessness has a
- 4 ten-year plan, the legislature further finds that the State
- 5 lacks a long-term commitment to reduce, prevent, and end
- 6 homelessness. Various state agencies and programs that address
- 7 homelessness have been built up on a piecemeal basis and have
- 8 approached homelessness in a similar manner. There is no
- 9 central agency tasked to find solutions to homelessness through
- 10 reduction and prevention by coordinating state and local
- 11 government agencies and private entities.
- The legislature recognizes that year-to-year funding,
- 13 rather than consistent funding in the base budget, creates
- 14 uncertainty for the staff of a program to continue their duties
- 15 and responsibilities. For example, in 2019, the legislature
- 16 enacted Act 81, Session Laws of Hawaii 2019, which appointed the
- 17 governor's coordinator on homelessness to administer and enforce
- 18 the duties and responsibilities of the council. The coordinator
- 19 is currently funded as a special project under the department of
- 20 human services, while the coordinator's full-time staff of four
- 21 are not permanent employees. In addition, year-to-year funding

- 1 among agencies and providers for homeless services threatens
- 2 already potentially sporadic and fragmented services, instead of
- 3 providing consistent support that will help permanently house
- 4 persons experiencing homelessness in the State.
- 5 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to:
- 6 (1) Establish the office on homelessness and housing
- 7 solutions; and
- 8 (2) Make an appropriation.
- 9 SECTION 2. Chapter 346, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 10 amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and
- 11 to read as follows:
- 12 "PART . OFFICE ON HOMELESSNESS AND HOUSING SOLUTIONS
- 13 § -1 Definitions. As used in this part, unless the
- 14 context clearly indicates otherwise:
- "Coordinator" means the governor's coordinator on
- 16 homelessness as provided in section 346-381.5.
- 17 "Fund" means the homelessness and housing solutions special
- 18 fund.
- 19 "Office" means the office on homelessness and housing
- 20 solutions.

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-2 Office on homelessness and housing solutions; 1 establishment. There is established within the department of 2 human services, for administrative purposes only, an office on 3 4 homelessness and housing solutions that shall: 5 (1) Work with state, county, and community agencies to develop solutions that prevent and end homelessness 6 7 through transitional and permanent housing and supportive or assisted services, or both; and 8 9 (2) Test innovative solutions to prevent and end 10 homelessness. -3 Administration. (a) The office on homelessness 11 and housing solutions shall be headed by the governor's 12 coordinator on homelessness, appointed under section 346-381.5, 13 for the proper administration and enforcement of this part. 14 The coordinator shall report directly to the governor 15 (b) and appoint staff as may be necessary. 16 (c) The employees of the office shall be exempt from 17 18 chapter 76.

§ -4 Duties and responsibilities. The office shall:

(1) Identify and address system gaps by:

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1	(A)	Developing and implementing homelessness and
2		housing strategies, including but not limited to
3		exemptions for homeless shelters, mental health
4		and substance abuse treatment facilities, and
5		supportive housing projects;
6	(B)	Developing a standard strategy for coordinated
7		entry, needs assessment, and allocation of
8		services and housing types to create pathways to
9		permanent assisted and independent housing;
10	(C)	Working with state departments and agencies to
11		develop and maintain multi-year strategic and
12		tactical plans and road maps as a part of the
13		Hawaii interagency council on homelessness' ten-
14		year statewide plan;
15	(D)	Coordinating matters relating to homelessness and
16		affordable housing between state and county
17		agencies and private entities; and
18	(E)	Developing and testing innovative solutions to
19		homelessness through collaboration with
20		appropriate agencies;

•	(2)	riovide administrative support for the hawair
2		interagency council on homelessness to develop its
3		unified ten-year statewide plan to address
4		homelessness in all counties of the State; and
5	(3)	Establish and maintain a statewide homelessness and
6		shelter and housing data clearinghouse, which may
7		include information on persons experiencing
8		homelessness, and available services, shelters, and
9		housing.
10	§	-5 Annual report. The coordinator shall submit an
11	annual re	port to the legislature on the progress of its
12	activitie	s, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of
13	each regu	lar session. The report shall also include:
14	(1)	Performance metrics relating to reducing the numbers
15		on homelessness;
16	(2)	Performance metrics relating to housing and services
17		inventory gaps, including but not limited to the
18		number of persons experiencing homelessness served and
19		placed into permanent housing and the cost per person
20		served;

1	(3)	Performance metrics to evaluate the State's
2		performance on homeless services, housing, care
3		coordination, and other needed services to end
4		homelessness; and
5	(4)	An inventory of available vacant land provided by
6		state agencies that administer public lands.
7	§	-6 Homelessness and housing solutions special fund.
8	(a) Ther	re is established in the state treasury the homelessness
9	and housi	ng solutions special fund, into which shall be
10	deposited	l:
11	(1)	Appropriations by the legislature to the fund; and
12	(2)	Gifts, donations, and grants from public agencies and
13		private persons.
14	(b)	All interest earned or accrued on moneys deposited in
15	the fund	shall become part of the fund.
16	(c)	Moneys in the fund shall be used for the following
17	purposes:	
18	(1)	Expanding tested solutions aimed at ending
19		homelessness, such as the homeless outreach and

navigation for unsheltered persons program, ohana

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1		zones, law enforcement assisted diversion, and	
2		community outreach courts;	
3	(2)	Providing financial assistance to public and private	
4		agencies in accordance with chapter 103F involved in	
5		homelessness and housing solutions other than those	
6		covered by this section;	
7	(3)	Testing, developing, and assessing innovative housing	
8		solutions; and	
9	(4)	Covering administrative and operational costs of the	
10		office."	
11	SECT	ION 3. There is appropriated out of the general fund	
12	revenues	of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$2,000,000 or so much	
13	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 to be		
14	deposited into the homelessness and housing solutions special		
15	fund; provided that any funds appropriated pursuant to this		
16	section shall be in addition to and shall not supplant any		
17	portion of the budget for the ohana zones fund, housing first		
18	fund, rental housing revolving fund, and any other existing		
19	fund.		
20	SECT	ION 4. There is appropriated out of the homelessness	
21	and housi	ng solutions special fund the sum of \$2,000,000 or so	

- 1 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2022-2023 for
- 2 the administration of the office of homelessness and housing
- 3 solutions; provided that each county shall provide support for
- 4 programs within their respective counties and the governor's
- 5 coordinator on homelessness shall seek matching funds from the
- 6 county in which any proposed capital improvements are built or
- 7 created.
- 8 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 9 human services for the purposes of this Act.
- 10 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2022.

## Report Title:

Office of Homelessness and Housing Solutions; Homelessness and Housing Solutions Special Fund; Appropriation

## Description:

Establishes the Office of Homelessness and Housing Solutions within the Department of Human Services to be headed by the Governor's Coordinator on Homelessness. Establishes the Homelessness and Housing Solutions Special Fund and appropriates \$2,000,000 out of the general fund revenues, to be expended by the Department of Human Services for the administration of the Office of Homelessness and Housing Solutions.
