A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TOBACCO USE DISORDER TREATMENT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that, according to the
- 2 Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), a person with
- 3 a mental health issue, substance abuse disorder, or both, are
- 4 more likely to use tobacco than a person without these
- 5 behavioral health conditions and are more likely to die from a
- 6 smoking-related illness than from their behavioral health
- 7 conditions. According to the National Institute on Alcohol
- 8 Abuse and Alcoholism, over eighty per cent of alcoholics are
- 9 current smokers and most of these smokers are nicotine
- 10 dependent. Additionally, nicotine and opioid addiction have
- 11 been found to be mutually reinforcing, whereas smoking cessation
- 12 is associated with long-term abstinence after opioid treatment.
- 13 The legislature further finds that smoking cessation
- 14 reduces smoking-related disease risk and could improve mental
- 15 health and substance use disorder recovery outcomes. The CDC
- 16 research also shows that patients who are simultaneously treated
- 17 for tobacco use disorders while receiving addiction treatment



- 1 have a twenty-five per cent increase in the likelihood of
- 2 substance use abstinence one year after treatment compared to
- 3 those not treated for tobacco use disorders. Despite these
- 4 statistics, a 2016 CDC report revealed that sixty-four per cent
- 5 of substance abuse treatment facilities screened patients for
- 6 tobacco use, forty-seven per cent offered tobacco cessation
- 7 counseling, and only thirty-five per cent had smoke-free
- 8 campuses.
- 9 The purpose of this Act is to require special treatment
- 10 facilities, nonhospital facilities, or programs providing care
- 11 or treatment of alcohol dependent or drug dependent persons that
- 12 are certified or licensed by the department of health to assess
- 13 a patient or client for use of all tobacco products at the time
- 14 of the initial intake and take certain actions if the patient or
- 15 client has a tobacco use disorder.
- 16 SECTION 2. Chapter 334, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 17 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
- 18 and to read as follows:
- 19 "§334- Initial intake; tobacco assessment; requirements.
- 20 (a) A special treatment facility, nonhospital facility, or
- 21 program providing care or treatment of alcohol dependent or drug

1	dependent	persons that has been certified or licensed by the
2	department	shall assess each patient or client for use of all
3	tobacco pro	oducts at the time of the initial intake. This
4	assessment	shall include questions recommended in the most
5	recent version of the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of	
6	Mental Disorders under tobacco use disorder, or similar	
7	evidence-ba	ased guidance, for determining whether an individual
8	has a tobacco use disorder.	
9	(b) I	For a patient or client with a tobacco use disorder,
10	the facilit	y or program shall do all of the following:
11	<u>(1)</u> <u>F</u>	Provide information to the patient or client on how
12	<u>C</u>	continued use of tobacco products could affect their
13	<u>1</u>	long-term success in recovery from substance use
14	<u> </u>	disorder;
15	(2) F	Recommend treatment for tobacco use disorder in the
16	<u>t</u>	reatment plan; and
17	(3)	Offer either treatment, subject to the limitation of
18	<u>t</u>	the license or certification issued by the department,
19	<u>C</u>	or a referral for treatment for tobacco use disorder.
20	(c) F	or purposes of this section "tobacco products" has
21	the same me	eaning as defined in section 245-1."

Department of Health; Special Treatment Facilities; Mandatory Tobacco Assessment; Tobacco Use Disorder; Treatment

Description:

Requires facilities providing treatment for substance abuse disorders to assess a patient or client for use of all tobacco products at the time of their initial intake and take certain actions if the patient or client is determined to have a tobacco use disorder. Effective July 1, 2023.
