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# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

**BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:**

1           SECTION 1. The legislature finds that there is a public  
2 benefit from substantial investment in high-quality,  
3 developmentally appropriate early learning programs. These  
4 investments have been driven by significant and continuing  
5 research affirming the positive effects of high-quality early  
6 learning programs on the physical, cognitive, linguistic,  
7 social, emotional, and economic outcomes of young children.  
8 Provided with such opportunities, children are more likely to  
9 succeed in kindergarten and beyond as well as grow into healthy,  
10 capable, and contributing adults.

11           Longitudinal studies have also proven that high-quality  
12 early learning programs are especially effective for high-risk  
13 children, including low-income and otherwise disadvantaged  
14 children, with great potential to alter their lifetime  
15 trajectories. Well-executed and well-targeted early learning  
16 programs have immediate and long-term benefits not only for the  
17 children participating in the programs but also for the



1 societies in which they live, which boast higher levels of  
2 educational attainment; reduced homelessness, crime, and  
3 substance abuse; improved health; and better overall social and  
4 economic well-being.

5 The legislature further finds that although there are pre-  
6 kindergarten education programs offered throughout the State,  
7 not all children have access to these programs. Also, the cost  
8 of private pre-kindergarten programs is out of reach for many  
9 families. Therefore, children from low-income homes that cannot  
10 afford certain pre-kindergarten programs may never have access  
11 nor be able reap their benefits. Therefore, it is critical to  
12 have universal no cost pre-kindergarten programs so that every  
13 child in the State has equal access to early learning education.

14 The purpose of this Act is to require the legislative  
15 reference bureau to conduct a study on the feasibility of the  
16 State establishing a universal no cost pre-kindergarten program.

17 SECTION 2. (a) The legislative reference bureau shall  
18 conduct a study on the feasibility of the State establishing a  
19 universal no cost pre-kindergarten program. As a part of the  
20 study, the legislative reference bureau shall:




- 1           (1) Research other states that have implemented a  
2           universal pre-kindergarten program, including how they  
3           have addressed transportation, the provision of school  
4           lunches, and other ancillary service for students;
- 5           (2) Research other states that have plans to or are in the  
6           process of implementing universal pre-kindergarten  
7           programs;
- 8           (3) Explore the potential positives and negatives of  
9           implementing a universal pre-kindergarten program in  
10          the State;
- 11          (4) Work with the department of education and executive  
12          office of early learning on examining how universal  
13          pre-kindergarten may be implemented in the State;
- 14          (5) Explain the existing pre-kindergarten programs in the  
15          State and the efficacy of those programs;
- 16          (6) Examine how a universal pre-kindergarten program in  
17          the State may include the following:
  - 18               (A) Appropriate school staffing;
  - 19               (B) Fair teacher compensation;
  - 20               (C) Adequate credentialing requirements; and



- 1 (D) Staff professional development or continuing
- 2 education;
- 3 (7) Discuss child assessment requirements, appropriate
- 4 curriculum, and school schedules for a universal pre-
- 5 kindergarten program in the State;
- 6 (8) Provide fiscal analysis and projections, including
- 7 funding mechanisms that would be relevant to the
- 8 implementation of a universal pre-kindergarten program
- 9 in the State; and
- 10 (9) Propose draft legislation, if appropriate.
- 11 (b) The legislative reference bureau shall submit a report
- 12 of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed
- 13 legislation resulting from the study pursuant to subsection (a),
- 14 to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the
- 15 convening of the regular session of 2023.

16 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
