A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that transparency and
2	accountability are critical to ensuring public agencies are
3	effective, efficient, and successfully provide services in the
4	public interest. The legislature further finds that departments
5	of transportation throughout the country typically spend more
6	than any other state agency on public infrastructure. As a
7	result, most departments of transportation throughout the
8	country have mechanisms such as oversight commissions and
9	requirements for robust reporting to ensure public transparency
10	and accountability for the billions of dollars they spend. This
11	enables elected leaders and the public to evaluate and track
12	transportation projects and ensure they successfully achieve
13	state goals as quickly and efficiently as possible.
14	The legislature further finds that no commission currently
15	exists in Hawaii to provide meaningful transparency and
16	accountability regarding transportation efforts. There is also
17	no public means of evaluating proposed or ongoing projects to

- 1 determine if or how much they will help change outcomes. There
- 2 are few readily available metrics to track whether overall
- 3 progress is being made toward many state transportation quals.
- 4 In some cases, planned projects are projected to reverse
- 5 progress toward some state goals.
- 6 Hawaii has among the worst traffic fatality rates in the
- 7 country, including the worst senior citizen pedestrian fatality
- 8 rate. Hawaii also has among the worst traffic congestion in the
- 9 country, and among the highest cost of transportation, which
- 10 greatly increases the cost of living for residents.
- 11 Unfortunately, Hawaii has held these distinctions for some time
- 12 with little change.
- 13 The purpose of this Act is to help improve transportation
- 14 outcomes by enabling basic transparency and accountability for
- 15 transportation efforts by:
- 16 (1) Amending the duties and membership of the state
- 17 highway safety council and renaming it the
- transportation safety and modernization council to
- help ensure that the department of transportation
- achieves state goals and outcomes; and

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(2) Improving reporting to provide better transparency to 2 elected leaders and the public. 3 SECTION 2. Section 286-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 4 amended to read as follows: 5 "§286-5 [State highway] Transportation safety and 6 modernization council. (a) There is established the [Hawaii highway] transportation safety and modernization council. 8 director of transportation shall serve as its chairperson. 9 following or their designated representatives shall be members 10 of the council: the chief justice, the attorney general, the 11 director of health, the superintendent of education, the 12 [president] chair of the University of Hawaii[7] at Manoa 13 department of urban and regional planning, the co-chairs of the 14 Hawaii climate change mitigation and adaptation commission, the 15 director of the office of planning and sustainable development, 16 the executive director of the State energy office, the chair of 17 the senate standing committee with jurisdiction over 18 transportation, the member of the senate with jurisdiction over 19 capital improvement projects, the chair of the house of

representatives standing committee with jurisdiction over

transportation, the member of the house of representatives with

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1	jurisaict	ion over capital improvement projects, the chairperson
2	of each o	f the county highway safety councils established under
3	section 2	86-6, and not more than [twenty] ten other persons who
4	shall be	appointed by the governor for a three-year term as
5	follows:	
6	(1)	One member from an organization representing senior
7		citizens;
8	(2)	One member from an organization representing
9		bicyclists;
10	(3)	One member from an organization with a focus on urban
11		<pre>planning;</pre>
12	(4)	One member from an organization with a focus on
13		transportation, planning, and improvement;
14	(5)	One member from an organization that serves low-income
15		communities;
16	(6)	One member from an organization representing labor and
17		<pre>construction;</pre>
18	(7)	One member from an organization representing trucking
19		and cargo carriers; and
20	(8)	Up to three members on the basis of their interest in

[highway] transportation safety[-] and modernization.

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1	The	[state highway] transportation safety and modernization
2	council s	shall [advise]:
3	(1)	Provide direction to help the department of
4		transportation achieve progress toward ground
5		transportation, safety, modernization, and other state
6		goals;
7	(2)	Establish metrics and benchmarks, and regular
8		reporting to help the department of transportation
9		achieve state goals; and
10	(3)	Advise the governor, legislature, and public on
11		matters relating to the programs $[and]_{\underline{t}}$ activities.
12		and of the State in the field of [highway]
13		transportation safety[-] and modernization.
14	<u>(b)</u>	The department of transportation shall provide
15	informati	ion on ground transportation plans, projects, and any
16	other rel	levant information to the transportation safety and
17	moderniza	ation council.
18	<u>(c)</u>	The members of the council shall serve without pay but
19	shall be	entitled to reimbursement for necessary expenses while
20	attending	g meetings and while in discharge of their duties."

- 3 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2022.
