A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AGRICULTURAL COMMODITIES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that agricultural
- 2 commodity industries are vital elements of the state economy,
- 3 employ residents, produce tax revenues, encourage responsible
- 4 stewardship of valuable resources, and produce substantial food
- 5 for the State, nation, and world.
- 6 The legislature also finds that adequate protection should
- 7 be given to agricultural commodities and commodity uses,
- 8 activities, and operations. Each viable commodity should be
- 9 promoted individually and as part of a stabilized comprehensive
- 10 industry by increasing consumption of commodities in the State,
- 11 nationally, and internationally.
- 12 The legislature further finds that agricultural commodity
- 13 commissions may support commodity industries and enhance and
- 14 preserve the economic interests of the State. These commissions
- 15 could be funded by the public through fees assessed according to
- 16 the relationship of the fee payer to a particular program.
- 17 Mandated cooperative efforts by commodity commissions can



- 1 provide effective ways to avoid economic waste and maintain
- 2 stable agricultural markets. Agricultural commodity commissions
- 3 would not benefit individual persons engaged in commodity
- 4 industries, instead they would improve overall conditions for
- 5 the particular commodities for which commissions are
- 6 established, and thereby benefit the overall economy of the
- 7 State.
- 8 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to authorize the
- 9 department of agriculture to establish agricultural commodity
- 10 commissions for agricultural commodities produced in the State.
- 11 SECTION 2. The Hawaii Revised Statutes is amended by
- 12 adding a new chapter to title 11 to be appropriately designated
- 13 and to read as follows:
- 14 "CHAPTER
- 15 AGRICULTURAL COMMODITY COMMISSIONS
- 16 § -1 Definitions. For the purposes of this chapter,
- 17 unless the context requires otherwise:
- 18 "Agricultural commission" or "commission" means any
- 19 commission established by the department pursuant to this
- 20 chapter.

- 1 "Agricultural commodity" means any distinctive type of 2 agricultural, horticultural, viticultural, vegetable, animal, or 3 seafood product, or any class, variety, or use thereof, in a 4 natural or processed state. 5 "Applicable commodity" means the agricultural commodity 6 that is under a particular agricultural commission's purview. 7 "Chairperson" means the chairperson of the board of 8 agriculture. 9 "Department" means the department of agriculture. 10 -2 Agricultural commodity commissions; established; 11 duties; powers. (a) The department, by administrative rules
- 14 integral to the economy of the State and that enhance and

adopted pursuant to chapter 91, may establish agricultural

commodity commissions to support commodity industries that are

- 17 (1) Participate in the formulation and implementation of public policy through expressive activities;

2		dietetic value, or other positive aspects of the
3		applicable commodity; and
4	(9)	Support and engage in research programs and activities
5		that benefit the planting, production, harvesting,
6		handling, processing, marketing, and use of the
7		applicable commodity.
8	(c)	Each commission may:
9	(1)	Request that the department collect assessments levied
10		by the commission; provided that the assessments are
11		approved by the department;
12	(2)	Study state and federal tariffs, duties, reciprocal
13		trade agreements, import quotas, and other matters
14		affecting commodity industries and the State;
15	(3)	Represent and protect the interests of a commodity
16		industry regarding any legislation, proposed
17		legislation, or executive action affecting the
18		applicable commodity industry;
19	(4)	Participate in federal and state hearings or other
20		proceedings concerning regulation of the manufacture,
21		distribution, sale, or use of pesticides or other

1		chemicals that are of use or potential use to
2		producers of the applicable commodity; provided that
3		this paragraph shall not be construed to authorize any
4		commodity commission to regulate the use of
5		pesticides;
6	(5)	To the extent consistent with the duties of the
7		commission, participate in and cooperate with local,
8		state, national, and international private
9		organizations or governmental agencies that engage in
10		work similar to that of the commission;
11	(6)	Gather, publicize, and disseminate information that
12		shows the importance of the consumption or other use
13		of the applicable commodity to public health, the
14		environment, the economy, and the proper nutrition of
15		children and adults; and
16	(7)	Propose to the department the adoption, amendment, or
17		repeal of rules pursuant to chapter 91 that relate to
18		the purposes of the chapter.
19	(d)	The department may adopt administrative rules,

pursuant to chapter 91, that authorize any commission to:

(1) Levy assessments relating to commodities;

1	(2)	Borrow money for certain commission purposes, as
2		specified by the department;
3	(3)	Enter into contracts for carrying out certain duties
4		of the commission, as specified by the department;
5	(4)	Sue and be sued in the name of the commission, to the
6		extent authorized by the department;
7	(5)	Provide mechanisms for maintaining and expanding
8		existing markets and developing new domestic and
9		foreign markets for a commodity, including:
10		(A) Public relations programs;
11		(B) Media relations programs;
12		(C) Paid print, electronic and position advertising;
13		(D) Point of sale promotion and merchandising;
14		(E) Paid sales promotions and coupon programs; and
15		(F) Activities that prevent, modify, or eliminate
16		trade barriers that obstruct the free flow of a
17		commodity to market.
18	(6)	Conduct and fund research to:
19		(A) Enhance the commercial value of a commodity and
20		products derived from the commodity;

1		(B)	Identify potential benefits to public health, the
2			environment, or the economy of consuming or
3			otherwise using a commodity;
4		(C)	Improve production, harvesting, irrigation,
5			processing, transportation, handling, marketing,
6			and uses of a commodity;
7		(D)	Control or eradicate hazards to a commodity,
8			including hazards from animals, pests, and
9			plants;
10		(E)	Develop viable alternatives for the rotation of
11			crops;
12		(F)	Determine new or potential demand for a commodity
13			and develop appropriate market development
14			strategies for capturing that demand; and
15		(G)	Measure the effectiveness of marketing,
16			advertising, or promotional programs; and
17	(7)	Fund	scholarships for or provide financial assistance
18		to p	ersons or entities interested in the applicable
19		comm	odity; and
20	(8)	Take	other appropriate actions for the purposes of
21		this	chapter.

1	S	-3 Department duties relating to commissions. (a)
2	The depar	tment shall:
3	(1)	Carry out the assigned organizational procedures under
4		this chapter, including the appointment and removal of
5		members of any agricultural commodity commission;
6	(2)	Monitor the practices or methods used or proposed for
7		use by any agricultural commodity commission in
8		carrying out the goals and needs identified by the
9		budget of the commission;
10	(3)	Promote cooperation among the several commissions and
11		other relevant state agencies and assist in the
12		interchange of information and experience among those
13		commissions and agencies;
14	(4)	Review commission budgets;
15	(5)	Authorize and collect assessments approved by the
16		commissions; and
17	(6)	Adopt rules, pursuant to chapter 91, necessary for the
18		purposes of this chapter.
19	(b)	The department shall review, and may approve or
20	disapprov	e, plans, projects, and assessments recommended by a
21	commissic	n for commodity promotion, advertising, and research

- 1 and for the dissemination of consumer and commodity industry
- 2 information. In reviewing plans and projects recommended by a
- 3 commodity commission, the department shall consider whether the
- 4 plan or project information is:
- 5 (1) Factual;
- 6 (2) Not disparaging to commodities outside of the
- 7 commission's purview; and
- 8 (3) Consistent with the purposes of this chapter.
- 9 § -4 Commission members; appointment; removal. (a) The
- 10 chairperson of the board of agriculture and the dean of the
- 11 college of tropical agriculture and human resources at the
- 12 University of Hawaii at Manoa, or their respective designees,
- 13 shall serve as ex-officio non-voting members of each
- 14 agricultural commodity commission.
- 15 (b) The department shall determine the number, lengths of
- 16 terms, and geographic representation of the members of any
- 17 agricultural commodity commission; provided that the number of
- 18 voting members of any commission shall be an odd number, and the
- 19 lengths of the initial terms shall be varied to ensure staggered
- 20 rotation of members.

- 1 (c) Each member of an agricultural commodity commission
- 2 shall:
- 3 (1) Be a citizen of the United States;
- 4 (2) Be a bona fide resident of the State; and
- 5 (3) Have an active interest in the positive development
- 6 and economic growth of the applicable commodity
- 7 industry in the State.
- 8 (d) The majority of voting members of any commission shall
- 9 be producers of the applicable commodity. A producer member of
- 10 a commission shall have paid an assessment adopted by the
- 11 commission, if any, on the applicable commodity in each of the
- 12 preceding three calendar years in which the assessment was due.
- 13 At least one voting member shall be a handler of the applicable
- 14 commodity. A handler member of a commission shall have
- 15 collected an assessment adopted by the commission, if any, on
- 16 the commodity in each of the preceding three calendar years in
- 17 which the assessment was due.
- (e) Notwithstanding section 26-34(a) or any other law to
- 19 the contrary, each member of an agricultural commodity
- 20 commission, other than an ex-officio member, shall be appointed
- 21 by the chairperson of the board of agriculture; provided that:

1	(1)	Each appointee shall otherwise be subject to the
2		advice and consent of the senate pursuant to section
3		26-34(a);

- (2) Notwithstanding paragraph (1), the appointed member may serve as a temporary member of the commission, with all the rights, duties, and privileges of any other member; and
- (3) If the senate rejects the appointment of a temporary
 member of the commission, the member shall cease to be
 a temporary member.
- (f) Each commissioner confirmed by the senate is eligible for reappointment, unless otherwise provided by rules adopted by the department pursuant to chapter 91.
- 14 Notwithstanding section 26-34(d) or any other law to 15 the contrary, the chairperson of the board of agriculture may 16 remove or suspend for cause any member of any agricultural 17 commodity commission, other than an ex-officio member, after due 18 notice and public hearing. The chairperson shall immediately 19 declare the seat of any appointed producer or handler member of 20 a commission vacant whenever the chairperson finds that the 21 member has ceased to be an active producer or handler in this

- 1 State, is no longer a resident of the State, or is unable to
- 2 perform the duties of office.
- 3 (h) The voting members of a commission shall select one
- 4 member to serve as chairperson of the commission and may select
- 5 other members to serve as other commission officers, as
- 6 appropriate.
- 7 **§ -5 Compensation; expenses.** The members of a
- 8 commission shall serve without compensation but shall be
- 9 reimbursed for expenses, including travel expenses, necessary
- 10 for the performance of their duties."
- 11 SECTION 3. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
- 12 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
- 13 begun before its effective date.
- 14 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
