

packet to be delivered in the mail.

Aug 1 | Voter Service Center

Voter Service Centers are open through Election Day for voter registration and accessible in-person voting. Visit elections.hawaii.gov for locations and hours of operation.

Aug 3 | Voter Registration

Final day for first-time voters to submit a paper Voter Registration Application for the Primary Election.

Aug 13 | Primary Election

Voted ballots must be received by 7:00 pm.

2022 General Election

Oct 21 | Mail Ballot Packet

Look for your General Election ballot packet to be delivered in the mail.

Oct 25 | Voter Service Center

Voter Service Centers are open through Election Day for voter registration and accessible in-person voting. Visit elections.hawaii.gov for locations and hours of operation.

Oct 31 | Voter Registration

Final day for first-time voters to submit a paper Voter Registration Application for the General Election.

Nov 8 | General Election

Voted ballots must be received by 7:00 pm.

Need to vote absentee?

If you will be away from home during the elections, you can request your ballot be sent to an alternate address. Complete an Absentee Ballot Application and submit it to your County Elections Division no later than 7 days before the elections. Applications are available at elections.

Prefer to vote in person?

Voter Service Centers offer in-person accessible voting and voter registration, and are open 10 days before and on Election Day. For locations and hours, go to elections.hawaii.gov.




