LEGISLATIVE ACCOMPLISHMENTS

I was happy to have these bills that I authored/co-authored or supported pass this legislative session. These bills focus on addressing our community concerns by reinvesting in our safety net, improving our educational needs, food sustainability, kupuna care, housing availability, and honoring our veterans.

HB 1911 — Authorizes the Department of Health to investigate care facilities reported to be operating without an appropriate certificate or license issued by the Department. Establishes penalties for violations and for knowingly referring or transferring patients to uncertified or unlicensed care facilities, with certain exceptions.

HB 2442 — Requires the counties to take into custody any abandoned vehicle on a public road within ten business days. Amends the conditions that constitute a derelict vehicle. Allows, rather than requires, that abandoned vehicles be disposed of by public auction.

HB 2538 — This measure appropriates \$4.95 million to the construction and equipment for the establishment of a feed mill to be located on Oahu. The livestock feed will help in recycling projects and the ability to work toward our food sustainability goals.

HB 2607 — Requires the Department of Education to develop and implement a statewide computer science curricula plan for public school students in K-12 that may include design thinking as part of the curricula and ensure each public high school offers at least one computer science course each school year.

HB 2697 — Requires the Office of Veterans' Services to organize, coordinate, and conduct a biennial Hawaii Veterans Summit.


HB 2748 — Requires the Hawaii Housing Finance and Development Corporation to conduct a study of the housing waitlists in the State and in each county to gain a better understanding of the current and future demand and supply of affordable housing suitable for individuals with access and functional needs. The bill provides \$570 million to generate more than 25,000 affordable units by 2030. It will also fulfill the state's goal of 22,500 affordable housing units set by the Legislature's 2016 Act 127.

SB 3095 — Requires all users of restricted use pesticides to be subject to a requirement to report on their use of restricted use pesticides to the Department of Agriculture. Prohibits the use of a restricted use pesticide on or within 100 feet of a school during normal school hours.

SB 2524 — For a county with a population of 750,000 or more: for planned community associations, requires the owner of any parcel of land subdivided as a condominium property regime in agricultural or preservation lands to provide public notice of the sale no later than ninety days after the sale of the parcel; Prohibits residential use of sheds or other structures on agricultural lands unless permitted under county ordinances and rules; allows for county enforcement and fines for violations of the prohibition; and other requirements of county ordinances and rules.







CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS (CIP) IMPORTANT TO OUR DISTRICT

House District 39 was very fortunate to benefit from a total of \$1,488,494,000 in appropriations from the Legislature in the 2018 budget for our schools, roads and other infrastructure projects. I will work diligently to get these monies released and projects completed.

BUILDING FOR OUR FUTURE



School infrastructure continues to be a top priority in our district. Over the past two years we were able to secure funding for the first phase of the new East Kapolei Middle School, and this year we broke ground on May 10, 2018.

The project's first phase is projected to be completed in the 2020-21 academic school year and welcome 1,050 students. Most importantly, this new school will allow Kapolei Middle School to return to a traditional academic calendar and no longer be multi-track.



RELEASE OF CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT FUNDS Getting the Work Done

Through my persistent work over the past year with neighboring Representatives, the Governor's Office and State Departments, we were able to release funding for Capital Improvement Projects totaling \$132,560,000 for our community:

- East Kapolei Middle School Construction for a New School, Grounds Improvements\$90,000,000
- August Ahrens Elementary School New Classroom Building, Grounds Improvements \$2,240,000
- Waipahu Elementary School Design for Cafeteria and Kitchen Renovation and Expansion ... \$275,000
