Rep. Todd's Bill Becomes Law

I am very thankful for the passage of Act 184, House Bill (HB) 1465, my first piece of legislation. HB 1465 cleans up language in our liquor licensing laws that placed an unfair burden on small businesses and made government less efficient. By working together with several of the State's liquor commissioners, we were able to pass this meaningful reform.

My hope is that these common sense changes will play a small role to help our local businesses thrive while also protecting our citizens. I wish to extend a big mahalo to Governor David Ige, Newton Chu, and everyone else who made this possible.

Five Key Bills Passed This Year

HB209: Establishes a state earned income tax credit, and extends the food tax credit for local families.

HB575: Helps existing local businesses to extend or renegotiate their state leases when nearing the end of their lease.

HB607: Establishes the Kupuna Caregivers Program to assist community members in obtaining care for elders while remaining in the workforce.

HB845: Assists inmates in acquiring identification documents (birth certificates, social security cards, etc.) prior to their release.

HB1325: This bill helps to preserve the legacy of the late Representative Clift Tsuji by making appropriations for a State biosecurity program, which would help prevent the spread of invasive species and help ensure the safety of our food crops and agricultural goods.

High Tech Youth Network: Build the capacity and presence of high tech youth network in the State of Hawaii with the objective of targeting underserved, at-risk and Native Hawaiian young people 8-18 and investing in after-school STEM learning and the development of a cyber-learning community that will lift educational and college to career outcomes for young people \$150,000

Hospice of Hilo: Capacity building for Hospice of Hilo's community based palliative care program, Kupu Care \$250,000

HURRICANE SUPPLY CHECK LIST

Hurricane season runs until November 30

Basic Disaster Supplies Kit

To assemble your kit, store items in airtight plastic bags and put your entire disaster supplies kit in one or two easy-to-carry containers such as plastic bins or a duffel bag.

- □ **Water** one gallon of water per person per day for at least three days, for drinking and sanitation
- Food at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food
- □ Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert
- □ Flashlight
- □ First aid kit
- Extra batteries
- Prescription medications
- □ Non-prescription medications such as pain relievers, anti-diarrhea medication, antacids or laxatives
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- Manual can opener for food
- □ Local maps
- □ Cell phone with chargers and a backup battery

Additional Emergency Supplies

- ☐ Glasses and contact lens solution
- Infant formula, bottles, diapers, wipes, diaper rash cream
- Pet food and extra water for your pet
- □ Cash or traveler's checks
- Important family documents such as copies of insurance policies, identification and bank account records saved electronically or in a waterproof, portable container
- □ Sleeping bag or warm blanket for each person
- Complete change of clothing appropriate for your climate and sturdy shoes
- □ Household chlorine bleach and medicine dropper to disinfect water
- □ Fire extinguisher
- Matches in a waterproof container
- Feminine supplies and personal hygiene items
- Mess kits, paper cups, plates, paper towels and plastic utensils
- Paper and pencil
- □ Books, games, puzzles or other activities for children
