### Are you ready to Vote by Mail?

A welcomed change for the New Year for the state of Hawai'i will be its first all-mail voting system starting the 2020 primary elections. The statewide vote-by-mail system will mail all registered voters a ballot for local and national elections. The voter signs an affidavit on the exterior of the mailing envelope and returns the package via mail. Postage costs are prepaid. Ballots must be **RECEIVED**, **NOT POSTMARKED**, by

Election Day at 7:00pm. Limited polling stations will be open on election day for same-day registration and ballot drop-off.

#### **Voter Registration Deadlines:**

Primary: July 9, 2020 General: October 5, 2020

#### **Election Days:**

Primary: August 8, 2020 General: November 3, 2020 Voting closes at 7:00 p.m.

The 2020 Census

The 2020 Census is here folks! As mandated, the U.S. Constitution

requires every single person living in the United States to be

counted every ten years. To do this, the federal government

conducts a census to determine how many seats each state gets

in the U.S. House of Representatives and to award federal grants

to the states. In essence, it assigns money to States on a per

capita basis for programs like Medicare and Medicaid. By April 1,

2020, every home will have received an invitation to participate in

the 2020 Census. Once the form arrives, you should respond in

one of three ways: online, by phone, or by mail. The Census

Bureau will be deploying hundreds of canvassers, who will go door
