As this session heads into its final days, Senate members are appointed to and participate in conference committees on legislative measures reviewed and revised earlier this year by both chambers of the legislature. Conference can be a very suspenseful time for members, the public, and advocates alike. Tough decisions need to be made to advance the priorities and viewpoints of the two chambers, while at the same time legislators must remain mindful of the value of finding useful compromises. In addition to completing work on bills

and resolutions, the Senate alone is

constitutionally tasked to give "advise and consent" with respect to Governor's nominees to various state government boards and commissions, as well as newly appointed judges and justices. Senate confirmation hearings for each nominee must be conducted by the relevant subject matter committee for the area of expertise necessary for the appointment. It is an honor to participate in such hearings, and this year I was able to review the credentials and ask questions of prospective members of both the board of the Hawaii Tourism Authority as well as that of the University of Hawaii Board of Regents. I also was able to personally meet with appointees to the bench as well as to various other government boards and committees. I look forward to hearing your ideas and



meet in order to resolve the differences. These conference committees convene at a hectic pace over the last weeks of session on bills from all subject matter areas. Perhaps the most watched conference committee this year is that on HB1700, the executive budget bill. As in previous years, "Team WAM", composed of Senate Committee on Ways and Means members, is easily identifiable in the large conference room filled to the brim with staffers and stakeholders. Senate President Donna Mercado Kim, along with Ways and Means Chair Senator David Ige, and Vice Chair Senator Michelle Kidani (seated foreground, above) provide direction and establish priorities in balancing the state budget. Day-by-day through the conference committee period, various line-item appropriations are negotiated and agreed to between the Senate and the House for the operational needs of state government. New program appropriations, capital improvement projects and programmatic grants-in-aid are usually finalized near the end of the process. This can be exhilarating or deflating for the government agencies and stakeholders, as the last pieces of the budget jigsaw puzzle fall into place. The final product, however, always represents very hard work by the Senate and House committee members as well as their dedicated staff.




