

On January 25, Governor David Ige gave his first State of the State Address to a joint session of the Senate and the House of Representatives. Governor Ige spoke about building a home for our kupuna, ourselves, and our children, and the need for a solid financial foundation. He stressed the importance of fiscal responsibility, asserting two "sobering realities"—that his draft state budget funds existing programs and services, and the state is in danger of spending more money than we are taking in. He pledged to use our available resources wisely and be

more aggressive in obtaining federal funds and collecting taxes that are owed.
