Testimony of Patricia Morrissey pertaining to GM 590 Submitting for consideration and confirmation to the Statewide Voters With Special Needs Advisory Committee, Gubernatorial Nominee, PATRICIA MORRISSEY

Before the Hawaii Senate Judiciary Committee

Chairman Rhoads and Committee Members:

Thank you for this opportunity to testify. I am honored to be considered for an appointment to the Hawaii Statewide Voters with Special Needs Advisory Committee. You are to be commended for introducing the legislation. The Hawaii Legislature is to be commended for enacting it with broad support. And, the Governor is to be commended for signing it. These actions are progressive and timely. More than ever civic engagement is critically important to this democracy. The central component of this engagement is voting. People with disabilities represent one out of every four individuals over 18 years of age in Hawaii. They, like all other voters, deserve the right to access independently the voting process and cast their ballots.

Until August 2020, I was Director of the Center on Disability Studies at the University of Hawaii. This is a nationally and internationally recognized resource. It conducts research, demonstrations, and training related to people with disabilities. Many individuals with disabilities and their families have benefited from the work of the center. As the result of this work, Hawaii residents with disabilities and their families have experienced greater opportunities and more inclusion in all aspects of community life.

Currently, I am an active volunteer. I am president of the U.S International Council on Disabilities, and also, serve on the board of two parent-directed nonprofit organizations in Hawaii, Leadership in Disabilities and Achievement of Hawaii and Fuller Lives. Prior to moving to Hawaii, I held numerous positions in the federal executive and congressional branches of government. I played a leadership role in drafting all major federal disability legislation from 1981 through 2000. Beginning in 2002 through 2008, I was the federal official responsible for overseeing the implementation of the disability provisions in the Help America Vote Act.

For the record, I have cerebral palsy, a mobility impairment, and use a scooter to get around. Thank you for allowing me to appear before you today via Zoom. I greatly appreciate the accommodation. In my testimony I would like to make three points.

First, the scope of the committee's mandate is clear. The legislation states "The purpose of the advisory committee is to ensure equal and independent access to voter registration, casting of ballots, and all other office of elections services." Nonetheless, some critical components require discussion and consensus in order to facilitate the committee's work.

The text of the legislation only refers to physical disabilities and references specifically visual and hearing impairments. I would hope the Committee's mission will be allowed also to address the needs of those with mental and cognitive disabilities.

The legislation indicates that for administrative purposes the Committee falls under the Office on Elections. Does that mean that the Committee will have staff and financial support from that office? Such support is vital to the credibility of the Committee and its ability to accomplish its purposes.

Second, the Committee needs to establish a baseline on the number of people with disabilities who are voters so we can measure progress thereafter. The federal Center for Disease Control and Prevention, CDC, based on data collected in 2019, estimates that there are 258,555 people with disabilities over 18 years of age living in Hawaii. This information is further broken down to show that 10% of those people have a mobility impairment, 10% have a cognition impairment, 5% have challenges living independently, 6% have a hearing impairment, 4% have a vision impairment, and 3% have challenges related to self-care. There is no data available to show how many of these individuals are registered voters. If the Statewide Voters with Special Needs Committee were to undertake a survey of people with disabilities in Hawaii, that would be an invaluable contribution to our understanding of how well our election process is accessible to people with disabilities.

Third, when we have secured the direct involvement of people with disabilities in the work of the committee, such as through a survey and other activities, we will have a foundation for dialogue between elected officials and voters with disabilities. We will improve civic engagement. Needed changes in state policies can be pursued through informed consensus and opportunities for people with disabilities can be expanded. Perhaps, what we implement here will be an attractive option for other states interested in increasing civic engagement among their voters with disabilities.

In closing, I would once again like to thank you for this opportunity and to also thank Daintry Bartoldus, Executive Administrator of the Governor's State Council on Developmental Disabilities, and Louis Erteschik, Executive Director, of the Hawaii Disability Rights Center, for nominating me to be a member of the Hawaii Statewide Voters with Special Needs Advisory Committee.

I am honored to be considered for a position on the Statewide Voters with Special Needs Advisory Committee. My answers to your questions are below and my resume accompanies this letter.

- 1. Please describe your understanding of the role and jurisdiction of the Statewide Voters with Special Needs Advisory Committee (Committee). I have read the text of Act 213, which authorizes the Committee, from the link sent to me by Leslee. There appears to be substantial text missing. I attempted to find the missing text, but was not successful. The text in the law skips from p. 3 to p. 59. I am not able to comment on the missing material. From the three pages I read, I understand the scope and role of the advisory committee. I am curious about the relationship of this Committee to the local Committees and what type of support the statewide Committee may expect from the Board of Elections.
- 2. How do you perceive the role and responsibilities of a member of the Committee? The Committee members are to determine if people with physical disabilities, including those with visual hearing and hearing impairments, are able to participate in all aspects of the voting process, and to the extent that they face challenges, offer recommendations to the Hawaii Board of Elections with regard to how to correct them.
- 3. Why do you wish to serve as a member of the Committee? Please note if you initially applied to be nominated to the Committee or if you were invited to apply. I was recommended for nomination by Daintry Bartoldus, Executive Director of the Governor's Council on Developmental Disabilities. I served on that Council from 2016 to 2020. I would like to serve on this new Committee because I have direct experience and professional skills that would facilitate the Committee in its fact finding and development of recommendations. I have cerebral palsy and have directly experienced challenges when voting in the past. I have 40+ years of experience in developing federal and state disability policies. For four years I was Director of the Center on Disability Studies at the University of Hawaii (2016-2020). From 2006 to 2009 I was the senior federal official responsible for implementing and evaluating the

disability provisions in the Help America Vote Act. I am currently president of the U.S. International Council on Disabilities; a board member of a Hawaiian nonprofit, Fuller Lives, which works to increase the amount of affordable, accessible housing for people with developmental disabilities; and I am a policy fellow with the Eastern Oregon Center for Independent Living.

- 4. Please describe why you believe that you are qualified to be a member of the Committee. Please discuss any skills, expertise, knowledge, or volunteer involvement that would aid in your decision-making ability. See answer to #3.
- 5. What do you hope to accomplish during your term as a member of the Committee? If I have one of the three-year terms, I would, working with other Committee members, develop questionnaires and conduct focus groups with the target populations throughout the state to learn in detail what their participation in the voting process has been, what changes they seek, and then work with the Board of Elections to implement needed recommendations. This would include clear messaging to the target populations. The critical question that could be answered by such an approach would be to determine to what extent in the past people in the target populations voted, and following implementation of needed changes, to what extent did participation among the target populations increase.
- 6. As this is a new Committee, what issues do you believe the Committee should address? The key is to document the extent to which people in the target population have voted in the past and to consider their recommendations and suggestions on how to improve participation in the voting process in the future. One likely key suggestion will be to ensure that someone in each of the voting centers is equipped to assist people in the target populations in an appropriate manner.
- 7. Can you foresee any possible conflicts of interests that could arise during your service on the Committee? How would you overcome any possible conflicts of interest? No.
- 8. Is there any other information regarding your experience and background that you believe should be considered for your nomination? No, although the breadth and depth of my leadership abilities as well as my experience in organizing and working in groups especially would be an asset to the Committee.
