# The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) strongly supports Governor's Message 686 nominating Wesley Yoon to the Board of Land and Natural Resources for a term to expire on June 30, 2026.

Aloha Chair Inouye, Vice-Chair Keith-Agaran, and Members of the Senate Committee on Water and Land,

Thank you for the opportunity to offer strong support for Governor Message 686, Wesley Yoon. This message is submitted for consideration and confirmation to the Board of Land and Natural Resources for a term to expire on June 30, 2026.

## Participants in the Hawaii State Aha Moku (Aha Moku) supports this submittal.

The Hawaii State Aha Moku works with participants of all of the main Hawaiian Islands – Moku O Keawe (Hawai'i), Moku O Pi'ilani (Maui), Moku O Kanaloa (Kaho'olawe), Nana'i Kaula (Lana'i), Moloka'i Pule O'o (Moloka'i), Moku O Kakuhihewa (O'ahu), Manokalanipo (Kaua'i) and Ka 'Aina O Kawelonakala (Ni'ihau). We strive to bring the voices of the communities of each island, including native Hawaiian generational families of the Ahupua'a encompassed within these islands. Our foundation is based on Mahalo Ke Akua (Trust in and honor God); Mahalo I Ka'Aina (Sustain and support the lands including watersheds and ocean); and, Mahalo Na 'Iwi Hanau O Ka'Aina (Honor and Support the people born of the land).

The Aha Moku is attached administratively to the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) via Act 288, SLH 2012. As such, we work closely with the divisions within DLNR on issues of natural and cultural resources. Mostly collaborative and sometimes where we must "agree to disagree", Aha Moku brings the voices of the people forward in issues that impact their cultural practices on natural resources which by law are protected. Because Aha Moku is mandated to bring these issues forward to the Chairperson of the Land Board, and to the Land Board itself, it is critically important that the Land Board is objective, fair and can honestly listen to the people.

We believe that Mr. Yoon fits the principles needed to be a sound member of the Land Board. He has proven to be a morally strong man who can integrate native Hawaiian cultural knowledge with state policy and opens the Land Board to mutual collaboration. We ask that this Committee Advise and Consent to Governor Message 686.

Aloha Chair Inouye, Vice Chair Keith-Agaran, and Members of the Senate Committee on Water and Land,

On behalf of our 20,000 members and supporters, the Sierra Club of Hawai'i offers the following **COMMENTS** on the nominees to the Board of Land and Natural Resources ("BLNR").

The Sierra Club appreciates the willingness of the nominated individuals to provide their time and expertise in service to the BLNR's important mission. The Sierra Club does emphasize the critical role of the BLNR in overseeing the management and protection of the lands and resources that provide the foundation of our islands' identity, social fabric, and ways of life. Accordingly, Sierra Club believes that this hearing provides a critical opportunity for the Committee, the nominees, and the general public to reflect on the nominees' knowledge, views, and commitment to make what may be difficult but necessary decisions to uphold their fiduciary and legal obligations under the constitution, statutes, and other laws of the state, with regards to our natural and cultural public trust resources and sites.

To assist in this process of reflection and assessment, the Sierra Club respectfully offers the following questions for the nominees before you today:

- 1) What expertise, knowledge, or skills do you possess that may be relevant to fulfilling the BLNR's fiduciary and legal obligations with respect to the conservation, protection, and use of our public lands and natural and cultural resources and sites?
- 2) Should stream diverters be allowed to dewater entire streams and waste millions of gallons of water per day, due to aging and leaky irrigation and reservoirinfrastructure?
- 3) Do you believe it is appropriate to issue long-term leases of ecologically or culturally significant lands and waters before DLNR staff can demonstrate sufficient expertise and capacity to provide consistent and timely oversight over lease terms and conditions?

- 4) What is your position on community-based fisheries management approaches, and should greater weight be given to the testimonies of Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practitioners and subsistence community members than outsiders who do not have a daily connection with the resources of their place?
- 5) What steps should the DLNR take to address the recommendations of the 2019 Audit of the Land Division's Special Land and Development Fund, which found a lack of an overarching plan for the Land Division's public land inventory, a lack of staff expertise and capacity to administer industrial and commercial leases, an overreliance on ground leases rather than more lucrative space leases in disposing of revenue-generating lands, and a lack of transparency and accountability, among other deficiencies, leading to significant opportunity costs to the DLNR and its mission?
- 6) Do you believe that the aquarium collection industry should be subject to stricter regulations based on evolving science regarding climate change impacts on our coral reef ecosystem, and the application of the precautionary principle?
- 7) What strategies should the BLNR employ to discourage shoreline hardening and encourage strategic retreat to mitigate the loss of our beaches and coastal areas?

The Sierra Club hopes and strongly believes that these questions will provide a much-needed understanding of the value that the nominees may bring to the BLNR, as it carries out its kuleana concerning matters of critical importance over the next several years.
