The Hawaii State Aha Moku (Aha Moku) works under the **Foundation** of:

Malama I Ke Akua – To serve and honor our Akua (Our God);

Malama I Ka'Aina - To serve and honor our 'Aina (Our lands, oceans, wetlands, water);

Malama I Na Iwi Hanau O Ka 'Aina – To serve and honor one another, the people born of the land.

Our <u>Mission</u> is to bring the people/Na Iwi Hanau O Ka 'Aina and their voices and decisions forward to all policy makers regarding the sustainability and perpetuation of all natural and cultural resources connected to the Akua that created the Aina/Land, and the 'Aina from which the Kanaka was born and the Kanaka Iwi Hanau O Ka 'Aina.

The nominees understand the mandates attached to AMAC in the Aha Moku Act, Act 288, SLH 2012 – "There is established the aha moku advisory committee to be placed within the department of land and natural resources for administrative purposes. The committee may advise the chairperson of the board and natural resources in carrying out the purposes of this section. §171-4.5 Section 2. (a).

As stated in §171.4-5, (d) the AMAC may provide advice on the following:

- 1. Integrating indigenous resource management practices with western management practices in each moku;
- 2. Identifying a comprehensive set of indigenous practices for natural resource management;
- 3. Fostering the understanding and practical use of Native Hawaiian resource knowledge, methodology, and expertise;
- 4. Sustaining the State's marine, land, cultural, agricultural, and natural resources.
- 5. Providing community education and fostering cultural awareness on the benefits of the aha moku system;
- 6. Fostering protection and conservation of the State's natural resources; and
- 7. Developing an administrative structure that oversees the aha moku system.

A heavy kuleana for each of the nominees, but the people of each of their islands know them and respect them for their incredible generational knowledge of the natural and cultural resources. Because of this, they can, and do fulfill the mandates of the Aha Moku Act. Additionally, we respect each one for their compassion, their courage and their individual and specific love for God, their 'Aina and the Na Iwi O Hanau O Ka'Aina, the people born of the land. They share all of this with the Public Trust.

Aloha Chair Inouye, Vice Chair Agaran, and Committee Members:

The Ko`olau Foundation strongly supports the appointment of Frances Leialoha "Rocky" Kaluhiwa to serve again on the Aha Moku Advisory Committee for the State of Hawai`i.

Our Foundation is dedicated to the preservation of Hawaiian history, traditional practices, cultural landscapes and Hawaiian values. It is our hope that a renewed recognition of the importance of the Aha Moku practice of good stewardship for the `aina and natural resources will result in wiser decisions both within the Hawaiian community as well as among decision-makers in the local, state and federal governments.

In fact, it has been our great disappointment over these past few years that more support from the state government has been lacking; however, we are pleased to see that the Governor has finally brought this list of nominees forward for consideration by our State Legislature. We would like to urge that the Legislature include in its budget adequate funding for operations of the AMAC and also a proviso in your budget with language calling for the Department of Land and Natural Resources that ensures funding for this group is properly released to the executive director chosen by the Advisory Committee. This has not been the case in past years.

As for the qualifications of Rocky Kaluhiwa, we hold her in high esteem as a community and cultural leader, and are fully confident that she will provide wise and sound advice to the State of Hawai`i – and all of its agencies, not just DLNR – on matters pertaining to stewardship of natural resources and Hawaiian cultural perspectives.

She is a member of our board of directors and our second vice president, and is currently president of the Ko`olaupoko Hawaiian Civic Club. She has spent a lifetime advocating for our communities and would be a strong asset and advisor to the State of Hawai`i.

We urge your approval of her nomination to this position on the Aha Moku Advisory Committee. Mahalo for considering our mana`o.
