NAOMI KUWAYE GM754 – PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION

(1) Why do you wish to be a member of the Public Utilities Commission?

First, I believe my background and skills as an administrative law, environmental and land use attorney will assist the Commission in navigating through some of the myriad of laws that the Commission must consider when making decisions on matters before them. The standards by which the Commission must consider when approving a project are vast and the procedural requirements are extensive. I hope that my experience will assist the Commission to avoid the extensive legal requirements that are often subject to judicial review.

Second, I would bring a more holistic approach to serving on the Commission. While I do represent smaller companies before the Commission, my focus has been on land use and environmental law — and helping companies navigate compliance with the federal, state and county laws that they need to comply with in order to operate or develop in the state of Hawaii. While I have represented independent power producers, I have worked for them on the due diligence end — advising them on what it takes to build their desired project and the anticipated pitfalls they may face. These clients are trying to balance compliance, not just with the Commission's rules and regulations, but also with the DOH, EPA, and county agencies that oversee their operations. I believe this practical perspective of working on projects from their inception to operation will be helpful in deliberating on matters before the Commission.

This leads me to my next reason for wanting to serve on the Commission. In the past few years, especially during COVID, it has become more difficult to communicate with the Commission to get simple questions answered. If this is occurring in the private sector, it cannot be easy for the everyday public to be involved or obtain information. I hope to make the commission more consumer friendly and transparent.

Finally, I have always wanted to return to public service. When I went to law school, it was with the intent to work for state or county as an attorney. However, the economy had different plans for me and I was lucky to be one of the few graduates with a secured position with a law firm. It's been more than 25 years and I can now get back to my desire to serve my community. I believe that the commission would be great way to utilize my experience and legal background to best serve the State.

(2) How do you perceive the role and responsibilities of a member of the Public Utilities Commission?

The Commission is a quasi-judicial agency. As such, I understand that I will be sitting in a "judge" like position and evaluating projects against the standards set forth by state law.

To this end, through the decisions that the Commission issues, I will need to balance the interests of the state from different perspectives – our need to reach our energy goals (for energy projects), environmental impacts, social and economic impacts as well. I take this task seriously and believe that as a commissioner, my responsibility will be to apply the facts to the law, but also to balance all perspectives to determine what is in the best interests of the State as a whole.

(3) Given your understanding of the role and responsibilities of a member of the Public Utilities Commission, why do you believe that you are qualified for the position? Please include a brief statement of your skills, expertise, or knowledge that would aid in your decision-making ability as a member of the Public Utilities Commission.

I have been an attorney specializing in administrative, environmental and public utilities law for over 25 years. I bring a holistic and practical view of what it means for companies to operate in Hawaii and the requirements and challenges they face having practiced before various state, county and federal agencies. I also have practiced before the Commission and understand some of the frustrations that both the public and applicants face when they have matters before the Commission. I would hope to rely on these experiences to guide my decisions as a Commissioner.

(4) What do you hope to accomplish during your term of service?

First, we need to bring some predictability to the agency's decisions. Second, improve timeliness of its decision-making. Third, further state's goals to achieving energy independence while balancing the impact to consumers. Finally, make the agency more consumer friendly.

(5) Name three qualities that best describe you and that would make you stand out. How would these qualities benefit the Public Utilities Commission?

Logical, detail oriented and balanced. The Commission's decisions need to make sense legally and in practice. The decisions need to be supported by a strong record in order withstand judicial scrutiny. Finally, I think it is important to understand the perspectives of the all the parties involved and balance those viewpoints in the Commission's decisions.

(6) Name one previous experience that would make you stand out. How would this benefit the Public Utilities Commission?

Working in County government gave me a good understanding of the challenges and difficulties involved in public policy making and governing and trying to balance the public's concerns.

(7) Can you foresee any possible conflicts of interests that could arise during your service on the Public Utilities Commission? How would you overcome any possible conflicts of interest?

As someone who has done work before the Commission, the potential for conflicts of interest will likely arise. The source of potential conflicts given my experience would come from representation of past clients or clients of Ashford & Wriston.

Those dockets are completed, and I have no pending matters before the Commission. If confirmed, I will take each docket on its own merit. I will consult with PUC counsel and the other commissioners on appropriate action to take should a potential conflict arise, and would recuse myself from participating in any matter if it is determined that a conflict exists

On behalf of our 20,000 members and supporters, the Sierra Club of Hawai'i **offers the following comments and concerns regarding GM754**, and urges the Committee members as well as the nominee to consider the critical need for the Public Utilities Commission ("PUC") to continue to institutionalize environmental justice and equity in its procedures, policies, and decisionmaking.

The PUC has the important responsibility to oversee and regulate the provision of vital services to the public, including with respect to the delivery of energy, water, and wastewater services. Unfortunately, the essential nature of these services; the environmental, cultural, and public health impacts that they often have on surrounding areas; and the failure to incorporate equity and environmental justice considerations by government regulators have all contributed to the real and ongoing harms and burdens disproportionately borne by particular, politically disenfranchised communities, including predominantly Native Hawaiian and rural communities. The Sierra Club has been long concerned that the continued failure of regulators to understand and address past and potential future environmental injustices will not only further erode our islands' environmental, cultural, and moral integrity, but also inhibit our much-needed and timely transition to a cleaner, more sustainable, and more just future.

The Sierra Club has accordingly been encouraged by the PUC's recent actions to incorporate community concerns in its actions and procedures, and thereby mitigate the potential for environmental injustices to continue to be perpetrated on certain communities. It is vitally important for all of us that PUC members encourage and proactively support the continuation such progress. The Sierra Club therefore urges both the Committee members and the nominee to reflect on and commit to the need for additional changes, including updated PUC procedures and policies, that can provide communities with the resources, information, and opportunities needed to ensure meaningful safeguards against the perpetuation of environmental injustice in our islands. Such commitments may include: 1) requiring meaningful community outreach and educational resources to be provided to affected community members, including area residents and cultural practitioners, as a condition of regulatory approval; 2) requiring community benefits packages that are clearly vetted, understood, and accepted by community members as commensurate with any impacts or burdens they may

have to disproportionately bear; 3) requiring planning and decisionmaking that expicitly and comprehensively considers and mitigates environmental justice and public trust impacts, including impacts to existing socioeconomic disparities, cultural practices, subsistence resources, and cultural sites; 4) actively promoting distributed infrastructure development that can spread the burdens of utility services more equitably and regardless of communities' socioeconomic characteristics; and 5) ensuring that community-based energy development proposals are given sufficient opportunities and support to begin our shift towards community-driven and -owned utility infrastructure.

It is important that regulatory agencies like the Public Utilities Commission seriously consider environmental justice as part of PUC procedures and decision making. It is critical that nominee Naomi Kuwaye has a clear understanding of the long history of environmental injustices due to the repeated placement of undesirable facilities and infrastructure in and around Pana'ewa and Keaukaha (e.g., sewage plant, airport, landfill, etc.) and that she is committed to ensuring environmental justice.

Our homestead community of Pana'ewa most recently fought hard against an ill-planned organics facility and dangerous spaceport operational facility which took time, energy, and resources for us community members to shut down. No governmental agency stood beside us. The people alone shut down these hazardous projects. Then again, just this year at the legislature, HB 1403 proposed to consider our homestead as a possible alternate route, for a connector, running right through the heart of our community. Again, the people testified against detrimental impacts and we are grateful that this time DHHL stood alongside us beneficiaries. In addition, there are new issues our Pana'ewa community faces – the expansion of a quarry and the expansion of an abandoned vehicle facility – both in near proximity to our farm lots, the quarry within 1,000 feet of homes. Add to that the ongoing nerve-wracking live fire sounds from the nearby Keaukaha Military Reservation along with noise from low-flying military choppers at night. Where does it end?!

Environmental justice must be part of the Public Utilities Commission's decision making protocol. Because of Ms. Kuwaye's prior focus on fighting for special interest of large utility and development company she is unqualified to work without bias in the decision-making process of PUC.

Burning wood for power is a question that the PUC nominee will face. Burning wood for power is the dirtiest method of achieving energy as it produces more greenhouse gas emissions than burning coal for energy. The reason that the State has a policy of 100% renewable energy by 2045 is to eliminate dirty greenhouse gas emissions to avert enhancing the climate crisis.

Part of the PUC nominee's authority and decision-making includes considering the environmental risk of danger to the environment. However, looking at the Ms. Kawaye's work history in representing Hu Honua, among many other clients, the question becomes whether she can be fair and impartial in her role as PUC Chair, when she has represented companies such as Hu Honua, HECO in its Kamoku-Pukele Transmission Line (1973-2002); Kamehameha Schools Bernice Pauahi Bishop Estate in Waiahole I and II (2000-2001); HELCO in its Keahole Power Plant (2003); Kapolei Property Development, LLC, in rezoning 331 acres of agricultural land in Ewa before the Land Use Commission (2007); DR Horton in rezoning of 1553 acres of agricultural land before the Land Use Commission (2007); Shopoff Group, LP, in rezoning 127.94 acres agricultural land before the Land Use Commission (2007); NextEra with operating revenues of \$16M in its attempt to buy HECO, MECO, and HELCO (2014-2014); Hu Honua Bio Energy to evaluate land use and regulatory compliance issues associated with the future harvest and hauling operation from the Pinnacle and Pahala properties to supply Hu Honua with feedstock (2016); Molokai Public Utilities attempt to reorganize and expand water and waste water operations (2017), MPU ultimately withdrew its application; Waialea Maui Phase II Development community challenge to an EA for Waialea's second luxury home development project (2021), and most recently, the Kauai Water Transmission Line community appeal from a judgment in favor of Kaua'i County. She represented the County before the Hawai'i Supreme Court (2022). Ms. Kanaye's legal representation has mostly been in opposition to the will of the citizen stakeholders and in defense of the offending utility company or development company.

Most of her past clients have special-interests that contradict sound environmental practices. The purpose of the Public Utilities Commission (PUC) is to protect the public interest in regulating the 1,806 public utilities that it currently oversees. PUC Commissioners must have thorough knowledge of the myriad of technical details associated with the regulation of public utilities, along with an understanding of the issues surrounding them. But that is not enough.

Commissioners must also understand the public interest, with all of its subtleties, and how the public interest can be furthered in regulating public utilities. But even that is not enough. They must also be committed to advancing the public interest.

Naomi Kuwaye is undoubtedly knowledgeable about public utilities. She has supported and defended private interests in this area of law for much of her career. However, she lacks experience in the public interest component that is necessary as a PUC Commissioner. There is no indication that she will be able to transform herself into a champion of the public interest.

As an example of her work for private interests, Naomi Kuwaye represented Hawaiian Electric in its proposed high voltage power line project from the Pukele Substation in the mauka region of Palolo to the Kamoku Substation adjacent to Iolani School. The project was opposed by numerous community organizations, environmental organizations, and eight Neighborhood Boards. The public interest was at stake, and Naomi Kuwaye opposed it. Fortunately, the project was defeated.

Naomi Kuwaye also represented NextEra in its attempt to acquire Hawaiian Electric Industries. The case went before the PUC, which expressed serious concerns about the acquisition. The PUC ultimately rejected the proposed acquisition on the grounds that it did not serve the public interest. Again, when the public interest was at stake, Naomi Kuwaye opposed it.

Naomi Kuwaye's nomination is troubling because the PUC's mission is to protect the public interest, and she has had a history of fighting against it. Furthermore, her nomination is being considered at a time when government finds itself facing a crisis of distrust.

Distrust in government has received increased attention recently in Hawaii because of the admission of bribery by two former State Legislators. But bribery is not the only reason for distrust, which seems to be systemic.

Another reason for distrust is what has been described as a "revolving door" between regulatory agencies and the industries that they regulate. Studies show that one consequence of the revolving door is that regulators who are from the private sector may push for softer regulation that would benefit them later when the rejoin the private sector. Although the revolving door issue is most frequently raised at the federal level, this nomination shows that it is present at the State level, in Hawaii.

Trust in government has been eroded with the nomination of Naomi Kuwaye to the PUC because she lacks necessary qualifications. The Senate can and should help restore public trust in government by rejecting the nomination.

Aloha Chair Baker, Vice-Chair Chang, and members of the Committee,

We are writing to share our strong concerns in opposition regarding Governor Ige's recent nomination of corporate attorney Naomi Kuwaye to serve as a commissioner on the Hawai'i Public Utilities Commission for a six-year term, 2022-28. We urge you to consider voting down this nomination.

Although Kuwaye has a breadth of experience in energy litigation, mergers, and regulation, her track record of working on behalf of corporate utilities and private developers shows no commitment to or experience with environmental justice issues and community concerns; both are critically important in PUC decision-making.

Ms. Kuwaye has worked on controversial cases, which raise concerns about her commitment to environmental justice:

- Represented NextEra Energy in an attempted \$4.3 billion takeover of Hawaiian Electric Industries. This was rejected by the PUC because they felt the merger was not in the public interest and that the companies failed to demonstrate adequate benefits for residents and a commitment to Hawai'i's clean energy goals.
- Consulted Hu Honua Bionergy, to evaluate land use and regulatory compliance forestry issues associated with their operations, so Hu Honua could burn trees for electricity on Hawaii Island. Communities have been fighting the project due to the extensive pollutants, water needed, and emissions from these operations.
- Represented Hawaiian Electric Light Co. at the Supreme Court during a long community fight over HELCO's proposed Keahole Power Plant. The Board of Land and Natural Resources had a mixed vote for and against the project. The court <u>ruled</u> in favor of HELCO.
- Represented major corporate developer D.R Horton in their attempt to rezone 1553 acres of agricultural land to urban on Oʻahu; and Shopoff Group on Hawaiʻi Island when they wanted to urbanize 127.94 acres of agricultural land.
- More examples of Ms. Kuwaye's involvement in controversial energy projects <u>can be</u> <u>found here</u>.

Kuwaye's current employer, Ashford & Wriston LLP says they "have one of the most experienced practices focused on project development, project finance and construction. Our

firm has been engaged in a broad range of energy transactions involving utility-scale solar projects, hydro, geothermal and other significant renewable energy projects."

In recent years, the PUC has been putting pressure on our utility to consider broader public interests, and not just shareholders' profits. They even held historic listening sessions with community leaders in West Oʻahu and on Hawaiʻi Island to understand their concerns with utility-scale development that may come at a high cost to ʻāina and surrounding communities. The current Commissioners realize that our transition into renewable energy cannot take place by replicating the same injustices and ignoring disproportionate impacts to marginalized communities, like the AES wind farm in Kahuku or the toxic facilities that continue to burden communities in West Oʻahu and in Keaukaha and Panaʻewa.

The PUC's mission is to be "transparent, accessible, and timely regulatory oversight, while working collaboratively with customers, stakeholders, and the general public." As someone who has represented the very entities she should be regulating, there is little assurance that Ms. Kuwaye will provide the meaningful oversight the PUC is designed to provide.

Thank you for your deep consideration of this important request not to confirm Naomi Kuwaye to serve as commissioner.
