SUBJECT: HB 1308 – RELATING TO FINGERPRINTING.

**DEPARTMENT'S POSITION**: The Department of Human Services (DHS) opposes this measure and offers comments.

**PURPOSE**: The purpose of the bill is to prohibit the department of health from requiring an applicant, operator, employee, or adult volunteer at a healthcare facility or private residence, to consent to fingerprinting except upon initial licensing or certification of the applicant or health care facility. In a private residence, other adults living in the home, who were not living in the residence at the time of initial licensing or certification, shall not be required to be fingerprinted more than once. Also, "resets" the initial fingerprinting and background check requirements if the licensee terminates and reapplies for a new license. Thus, healthcare facility applicants, employees, volunteers, and private residence household members will be fingerprinted only once and if the licensee terminates, the prior fingerprinting is to be "reset" when the former licensee re-applies. The Departments of Human Services and Health have a joint Background Check System for healthcare employees, volunteers, and other adults living in private residences to ensure these adults are of reputable and responsible character.

Fingerprinting is the current biometrics used to positively identify adults. Limiting fingerprinting only upon the facilities' application and of new employees and volunteers or household members severely limits the departments from confirming the identities of adults who work, volunteer, and have daily access to our disabled and elderly adults who consider these facilities and residences their home. Confirmed identification of a facility's employees, volunteers, and household members allows the departments to immediately access the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) Fingerprint Check and Hawaii State Fingerprint Check to review these adults' histories further. Fingerprinting adults in facilities and private residences only once will reduce identifying who has regular contact and access to these disabled and elderly residents.

Facility employees turnover and household family members move in and out of private homes, but disabled and elderly residents remain in these facilities and private residences because they cannot live independently. These residents depend on the facility, private residence employees, and other adults in the household to keep them safe. Continued fingerprinting will help to keep disabled and elderly residents safe in their "home" in a facility and private home residences.

#### Re: Submitting Comments HB 1308, Relating to Fingerprinting

The Healthcare Association of Hawaii (HAH), established in 1939, serves as the leading voice of healthcare on behalf of 170 member organizations who represent almost every aspect of the health care continuum in Hawaii. Members include acute care hospitals, skilled nursing facilities, home health agencies, hospices, assisted living facilities and durable medical equipment suppliers. In addition to providing access to appropriate, affordable, high-quality care to all of Hawaii's residents, our members contribute significantly to Hawaii's economy by employing over 30,000 people statewide.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit **comments** on this measure, which seeks to require the Department of Health (DOH) to require an applicant, operator, employee, or adult volunteer at a healthcare facility (or, in the case of a private residence used as a healthcare facility, any adult living in the home other than the client) to submit fingerprints only in connection with their initial licensing or certification.

We appreciate efforts to reduce regulatory or administrative burden in the healthcare industry. However, we have some outstanding questions on whether this measure, as written, may impede the ability of healthcare facilities such as nursing homes or hospitals to conduct fingerprinting and background checks as needed. Currently, Hawaii Administrative Rules (HARs) requires all direct patient access employees and volunteers to be subject to a background check. These checks must happen within five working days of hire and must be done for each of the first two years of employment and biennially thereafter. The rules state that a "name inquiry" may be used for this check in lieu of fingerprint, but there may be cases where fingerprinting is necessary.

We would also request that this committee consider clarifying that employers may require fingerprinting if required to complete a background check to meet HARs and any other applicable federal rules and laws outside of the initial licensing or certification. We would also seek to discuss with the DOH on how annual certifications done by their agency and the background check requirements on facilities such as hospitals and nursing homes might be modified under this proposed bill.

We provide medicaid clients with their essential daily needs, as well as comfort, companionship, and supervision.

Licensed home providers have received no significant pay increases for medicaid recipient clients under our care for fourteen years (2008-2022). We are seeking fair compensation for those years and the years going forward. We are also seeking reimbursement for Covid-19 related expenses for ARCH and DDD licensed home operators/providers. Also, we seek the reinstatement of State funded "Respite Care" so that licensed home operators/providers could rest and recuperate for one week per year. Investment by the State in the improved compensation and fair treatment for our licensed home operators/providers will draw more interest in this profession and result in more new home operators/providers which will relieve some stress on hospital ER usage and reduce homelessness.

Licensed home providers are subject to unannounced inspections which could be any time of the day or night, and last for hours at a time. These unannounced inspections are very disruptive to our home environment and create tension and anxiety for home providers and clients/patients. Unannounced inspections should be limited to credible complaints of health or safety.

Licensed home providers (and our household family members) are also burdened with annual fingerprinting which is costly, inconvenient, and unnecessarily repetitive. Fingerprinting should be limited to initial licensing.

On behalf of our members, we, the executive board of ILWU Local 1000, ask for your support of the aforementioned Bills that promote fair treatment and compensation for all licensed home operators/providers in Hawaii.

Aloha! Please support this bill to stop requiring redundant and repetitive fingerprinting of licensed home operators and their household adult family members. Licensed home operators are currently being mandated to get fingerprinted every year or every two years (depending on what type of licensed home they operate). I know of no other profession which requires this. Not even released felons are felons are required to get annual fingerprinting. Fingerprinting costs around \$60-\$70 per person, and the licensed home operators have three to ten household family members living with them in the home. This creates recurring cost and time spent for yearly or bi-yearly fingerprinting. Fingerprints don't change, so why is it necessary to repeat it so often? There is also the issue of setting appointments and travel to and from fingerprinting locations which are few. Many of the licensed home operators don't drive so travel is an issue for them.

#### 1 Fiscal Implications: None.

Department Testimony: Thank you for the opportunity to testify in OPPOSITION to this
measure. With respect, this bill sends the wrong message to the public and establishes bad
public policy in state statute by failing to provide any other means to obtain information to
satisfy background check requirements aimed at protecting vulnerable elderly and disabled
persons who seek living arrangements and care from residential care homes and caregivers.
Moreover, this bill is not necessary.

This measure would amend HRS §321-15.2 and HRS §346-97 and require the
Department of Health (DOH) and the Department of Human Services (DHS) to limit the
frequency of fingerprinting of individuals to a single time in connection with required
background checks. The bill contains no exceptions or caveats to this strict requirement.
However, there is currently an alternative mechanism that provides relief from frequent
fingerprinting. It can be found in DOH's Chapter 11-106 Hawaii Administrative Rules (HAR).

1	These rules provide a mechanism to avoid repeated fingerprinting or other examination of
2	criminal history records. The mechanism is that the person must enroll in the state's rap back
3	program administered by the Hawaii Criminal Justice Data Center. Rap back enrollment is
4	currently free and is available to any person who completes a fingerprint criminal records check.
5	The program keeps a record of who completed the fingerprint criminal records check and will
6	alert the relevant state agency if the background-checked person is subsequently arrested or
7	convicted of a crime. But if the person does not enroll in rap back or disenrolls but remains a
8	licensee, primary or substitute caregiver, or non-client resident in a residential care home, the
9	person must be subject to repeated fingerprinting and criminal records checks to safeguard the
10	elderly, disabled, or vulnerable persons residing in residential care homes.
11	Finally, DOH has been working in partnership with DHS Med-Quest Division (MQD) on
12	a background check portal which is aimed at streamlining the background check process. DOH
13	will defer to DHS on this bill's impact on their programs.
14	Thank you for the opportunity to testify in OPPOSITION to this bill on those
15	requirements assigned to DOH and, respectfully, DOH requests this bill be deferred.
