HOUSE BILL NO. 1382 RELATING TO MEAT DONATION

Chairpersons Nakashima and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on House Bill 1382. The bill amends Section 145D-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes to add the donation of livestock or wild game meat; provided that the good-faith donor harvested the meat in a food safe manner, processed the meat in accordance with section 159-25 and the distributor reasonably believes that the food is fit for human consumption, as an exception from liability. The measure also establishes a meat processing taskforce and appropriates funds.

The Department supports this measure and provides comments. The definition of "donor" in 145D-2, HRS includes that the food in question has been prepared and packaged in a facility meeting all relevant food safety guidelines, certifications, and requirements and has passed all food safety inspections. Therefore, inspection of the food is still needed. If the intent is to provide state inspection, the state currently does not have meat inspection capabilities and it will take time to restart that program. The meat processing taskforce should be able to create a masterplan that takes this into account.

Chair Nakashima and Members of the Committee:

The Department of the Attorney General provides the following comments regarding this bill.

This bill, among other things, establishes a meat processing task force to develop and implement a plan to expand the meat processing capacity in the State to allow for meat from axis deer and other wild game to be processed for distribution by a nonprofit food distribution service.

Article V, section 6, of the Hawai'i State Constitution provides that all executive and administrative offices, departments, and instrumentalities of the State shall be allocated by law among and within its principal departments. Temporary commissions for special purposes may be exempted. This bill does not place the meat processing task force within any designated department or set a sunset date. Therefore, it may be subject to constitutional challenge.

We therefore recommend that this bill either add a sunset date or be amended at page 3, line 10-11, as follows:

(a) There is established <u>within the department of agriculture for</u> <u>administrative purposes</u> a meat processing task force . . .

My name is Lui Kamoshita-Langan and I am a student at Hawai'i Preparatory Academy and also a concerned Big Island resident. Over the past 6 months, I have interviewed the DLNR and other community members impacted by the rising ungulate populations on the Big Island as a part of my Capstone Project. A Capstone Project is a year-long project where a senior attending Hawai'i Preparatory Academy collaborates with the school to focus on a specific topic to work on, ranging from artistic efforts to public policy and implementation. My goal this year was to research the crisis on the Big Island of the rising ungulate population and see what I could do to help.

As a Big Island resident myself, I have seen firsthand the population explosion of sheep and goats, and the dangers they pose to drivers as they roam around roads. Hearing about the negative impact these invasive species have on native ecosystems, endemic species, agriculture, and ranching in my interviews has inspired me to further support the efforts to manage these feral ungulates.

I wholeheartedly support HB1382 HD1, as it provides an incentive to manage the booming population of the feral ungulates, along with allowing people to take advantage of this abundant resource, similar to how Axis deer are being used on the island of Maui.

I believe that in Hawaii, we ought to take measures to both listen to the voices of all community members and also give back to the community at the same time, especially to those of low socioeconomic status. This bill is parallel to both of these virtues, and I believe it would be a step in the right direction.

Aloha Chair Nakashima, Vice-Chair Sayama, and Members of the Committee:

I am Brian Miyamoto, Executive Director of the Hawai'i Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide and serves as Hawai'i's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic, and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawai<sup>•</sup>i Farm Bureau supports HB 1382, HD1, which provides for donation of wild game to under-resourced communities and establishes a task force for development and implementation to expand meat processing capacity in the State.

Across the State, various invasive species are creating havoc in agriculture as well as the ecosystems in which they exist. Maui County's Axis Deer population is a good example of nature getting out of control with populations exploding due to abundant forage following rainfall events. They continue to destroy crops and pasture lands by devouring any living vegetation as they continue to spread. Feral pigs damage crops by consuming them or by their rooting and trampling of crops. They will eat almost any crop. Feral pigs damage pasture grasses, killing desired plant species and often encouraging the growth of undesired weed species. They can also devastate orchards by consuming fruit, citrus, and nuts and their rooting can severely damage, or even kill saplings, shrubs, and vines directly or by facilitating the spread of soil-based fungal diseases. Feral pigs can also break irrigation lines, rip or tear nets, drying racks, and other agricultural structures and equipment.

These and other feral populations can pose a danger, especially as populations grow and their health is put into jeopardy due to inadequate food. Diseases that they normally tolerate will become serious debilitating illnesses that could put our domestic livestock industry in jeopardy. Such fears are not unreasonable, as incidences such as bovine tuberculosis spread from feral pigs have been documented in Molokai.

Hawai'i's farmers and ranchers are working to provide Hawai'i with an increased level of self-sufficiency, but will not be able to do so if their products are consumed or damaged

by feral animals. Axis Deer, feral pigs, and other invasive species can cause major damage to property, agriculture (crops and livestock), Hawai'i's native species and ecosystems, and Hawai'i's cultural and historic resources. They can also threaten the health of people, wildlife, pets, and other domestic animals. As Hawai'i's feral animal populations continue to expand, these damages, costs, and risks will only keep rising

Current state law specifically prohibits the inclusion of meats as a donation. Wild game can be a significant source of protein for Hawai'i's residents in need. Wild game can provide a beneficial outlet for meat harvested from invasive species and provide a tool for long-term sustainable invasive management for Axis Deer and Feral Pigs.

Several states have amended their Good Samaritan laws to use as a tool for invasive white-tail deer management programs. Wild game meat donated under this provision does not need to undergo antemortem inspection requirements as long as stated conditions are met. Conditions for donations can be specified to allow the donation of this important protein source for our neighbors in need. Utah is the most recent state that passed such a measure and can be used as a model for Hawai'i.
