I am Brian Miyamoto, Executive Director of the Hawai'i Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide and serves as Hawai'i's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic, and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawai'i Farm Bureau supports HB 1568, HD2, which changes the law requiring all state departments to ensure that a certain percentage of food purchased consists of fresh, local agricultural products or local value-added, processed, agricultural, or food products to apply only to the DOE, DOH, PSD, DOD, and UH System. It also requires each of those departments and the UH System to report to the legislature on its progress toward meeting these benchmarks and clarifies the information to be reported.

HFB strongly supports the increased use of locally grown agricultural products, fruits, vegetables, meats, dairy, poultry, and local value-added products in our state institutions.

HFB appreciates the intent of Act 176 SLH 2021 (HB 817, HD2, SD1) which established benchmarks to increase the required percentage of locally grown produce and valueadded food products that all departments must purchase. The changes proposed to ACT 176 SLH make the implementation of the local purchase requirement more practical.

We believe that policies, investments, and resources that support agriculture are necessary to ensure that Hawai'i's farmers and ranchers can supply the produce and food products to meet the goals established in Act 176 SLH and in this measure.

HB 1568 HD2 - RELATING TO AGRICULTURE

Chairs Gabbard and Moriwaki, Vice Chairs Nishihara and Dela Cruz, and members of the committees:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on HB 1568 HD2. The University supports the intent of HB 1568 HD2, but is compelled to oppose the bill because it could be interpreted to apply to concession arrangements across all campuses. This bill amends Act 176, SLH 2021, by changing the requirement of all state departments to ensure that a certain percentage of food purchased consists of fresh, local agricultural products or local value-added, processed, agricultural, or food products to apply only to the DOE, DOH, PSD, and UH System.

The University wholeheartedly supports the growth of local agriculture in our state in an effort to reduce our dependence on importing food and contribute to the State's economy. However, the legislature's intent with respect to the application of this bill to the University is unclear. The University would respectfully like to point out that the exclusions noted in Section 1 ("departmental or university staff travel expenses, office staff procurement, any other staff meals separate from each department's offered meal services or programs, or other staff meals separate from the university's offered meal services or programs") are not codified in Section 2. As such, the legislature's intent is not legally captured in the statutory language.

Furthermore, the University respectfully recommends that Section 2 of the bill be amended to exclude University concession agreements from the local food purchasing percentage requirement. Most, if not all, of the University's food contracts with vendors are concession-type agreements that support a business model in which the food service provider conducts business with the end consumer. As such, a strict requirement to purchase locally sourced food or agricultural products primarily impacts the end consumer, namely students, by passing on higher costs. Additionally, the University is concerned that its ability to source food locally will be restricted by the availability of the local food supply. As such, purchasing up to 50% of its food locally may be unachievable. Some of the University's contracts with vendors have already implemented a "local first" policy. However, at best, this results in approximately 30% of food purchased locally due to supply constraints. Additionally, there are a number of other challenges to purchasing food locally. For example, farms may not meet our vendors' required purchasing standards or be willing to complete the process to become an approved vendor, which is accompanied by insurance and distribution requirements; and the University's food needs are generally highest from Fall through Spring and lowest in the Summer, which is generally the peak of the local food supply.

To address these concerns, the University respectfully requests that the exclusions set forth in Section 1 and language excluding concession agreements be added to Section 2 of the bill to be properly codified and clarify the legislature's intent.

- Status of the department's progress in meeting the local percentage procurement goal
- Total spending on consumable foods
- Total spending on produce (as defined in the current statute)
- Total local purchase spending
- For departments that do direct purchasing and food preparation, total purchases and total local purchases by produce category, (as demonstrated by the exemplary and clear reporting by the Department of Public Safety). Namely:
  - Fruits & Vegetables
  - Coffee
  - Staple Starches
  - Eggs
  - Poultry & Poultry Products

- Livestock (Beef)
- Livestock (Pork)
- Milk & Milk Products
- Aquacultural and maricultural products
- For departments that only purchased food in the form of prepared meals from third-party vendors, an estimate use/purchase of local produce/products (as demonstrated in the reporting of the Department of Defense)
- If the department or UH did not meet the relevant benchmark, an explanation of why

Chairs Gabbard and Moriwaki, Vice Chairs Nishihara and Dela Cruz, and Members of both Committees:

The Department of Public Safety (PSD) offers comments on House Bill (HB) 1568, House Draft (HD) 2, which amends Act 176, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021, requiring PSD and four other Executive Branch departments to ensure that a certain percentage of food purchased consists of fresh, local agricultural products or local value-added, processed, agricultural, or food products.

The Department understands and has always been very supportive of the goal to increase local agricultural production and consumption. Unlike other State agencies, PSD has its own inmate farming program at the Waiawa Correctional Facility and Women's Community Correctional Center on Oahu and the Kulani Correctional Facility on Hawaii Island. The produce grown is used in our

correctional facilities to promote a "Farm-To-Table" experience for staff and inmate meals, thus offsetting a small portion of food expenses. Augmented by Corrections Program Services contracts with the University of Hawaii at Manoa's "Go Farm" program, which provides education to inmates on basic agricultural practices and "farm-to-table" processes, PSD's "Farm-To-Table" initiatives allow inmates to earn their way towards a successful reentry back into the community. These programs are successful in providing inmates with knowledge and education in sustainability, so that when they are released, they are able to provide meaningful support to the local agricultural industry and themselves and their families as contributing members of society.

The Department's food service program is an institutional food service program funded by the State general revenues, which requires large quantities of food items, reliably delivered when it is to be prepared and consumed at all correctional facilities statewide. As with other similar agencies/organizations, PSD follows a standardized 5-cycle menu based on the U.S. Department of Agriculture's *Dietary Guidelines for Americans*.

With a lean budget (FY2020-21 food costs were \$7,199,772, of which, \$213,700 (2.97% was locally produced), and procurement preference for purchasing Hawaii products, the following staple items needed weekly that are not locally produced make it challenging to meet the required benchmarks:

<u>Produce</u> – Apples, carrots, celery, oranges, potatoes, and round onions. Locally produced head cabbage and Chinese cabbage, papayas and pineapples, and shell eggs may also be sourced locally, but smaller supplies and higher costs make them infrequent purchases.

Beef, Pork, Chicken – local supplies are insufficient for PSD's needs.

The Department's Food Services program makes every effort to purchase local agricultural products and in good faith, is willing to increase its purchasing of local agricultural products which are generally more expensive, as long as the needed quantities are available. proposed in HB 1568, HD 2, the Department will make its budget request to the Legislature for a significant Food Services budget increase, beginning in the 2024-25 fiscal year.

Chair Gabbard, Chair Moriwaki, and Members of the Joint Committee:

The Hawaii Primary Care Association (HPCA) is a 501(c)(3) organization established to advocate for, expand access to, and sustain high quality care through the statewide network of Community Health Centers throughout the State of Hawaii. The HPCA <u>SUPPORTS</u> House Bill No. 1568, House Draft 2, RELATING TO AGRICULTURE.

By way of background, the HPCA represents Hawaii's Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs). FQHCs provide desperately needed medical services at the frontlines to over 150,000 patients each year who live in rural and underserved communities. Long considered champions for creating a more sustainable, integrated, and wellness-oriented system of health, FQHCs provide a more efficient, more effective and more comprehensive system of healthcare.

This bill, as received by your Committee, would require the Departments of Defense, Education, Health, and Public Safety, and the University of Hawaii System to ensure that a certain percentage of food purchased in public school, youth campuses, public hospitals, public prisons, and University of Hawaii facilities be fresh, local agricultural products and local value-added processed, agricultural products.

This bill would take effect on July 1, 2112.

Over the past five years, HPCA has served as a member of the Obesity Prevention Task Force, and as such has joined the Hawaii Public Health Institute and other advocates in support of efforts to promote healthy diets and the increased consumption of locally-grown vegetables and fruits in our schools and communities.

Because the State purchases so much food for the daily operations of public schools, hospitals, prisons, and higher education facilities, it is prudent and essential for government to spend its limited resources within the State to ensure that these funds are circulated through local businesses and communities. ## Comments:

Aloha, I am writing in support of HB 1568 HD2, a bill that requires all state departments to ensure that a certain percentage of food they purchase consists of fresh, local agricultural products or local value-added/processed agricultural or food products.

I do believe that the bill should be implemented immediately, or at the minimum in fiscal year 2023, instead of 2025. I also believe that 10 percent is too low a bar to start with, especially given the 2025 starting date. I believe that the 10 percent starting level should only be implemented as a quick stop-gap measure to meet the fiscal year of 2023, and immediately should be raised to meet the 2024 fiscal year to 25 percent with a 50 percent benchmark by 2025. Although I know there are a lot of contingencies, I believe the specter of climate change and food insecurity needs more radical measures such as these. However, despite the more conservative benchmarks that HB 1568 HD2 implements, I agree that the bill is at least recognizing these goals of sustainable food production as bein essential to our health as a state and a society,

I would also like it if this was a full state mandate, as at this juncture this bill only requires the Department of Education (DOE), Department of Health (DOH), PSD (Department of Public Safety), Department of Defense (DOD), and the University of Hawai'i (UH) System to adhere to the mandate.

These statures of this bill are very limited and basic, but they are better than nothing and at least make a start towards local food sufficiency. However, because of the bill's limited scope, there is no reason not to give this kind of policy a try to show the state's commitment to local farmers and sustainable food production.

There are many reasons why this policy should not only be passed but expanded to all state agencies and even in the private sector. Obtaining our agriculture from local sources is essential to help develop a society that values and understands the vital role of agriculture, food security, quality food, and natural resources systems in advancing personal, local, and global well-being. This kind of education dovetails with the objectives of HB 1568 HD2, as the education sectors would be funded and the practice of utilizing local food sources and agriculture could aid in educating future generations in the benefits of sustainable and local agriculture.

Additionally, with the state's goal of net negative emissions, the more we invest in local agriculture and local food sourcing, we also reduce carbon emissions related to shipping and

packaging waste associated with importation from the mainland and elsewhere in the world. Considering the initiatives that are looking to impose producer responsibility bills for excess plastic packaging, it will save not only money but food miles, reduce reliance on extractive fossil fuels that goes along all plastic and current shipping methods, and in case of emergencies such as war or current boycotts of countries such as Russian imports, will help move us to a case of selfsufficiency so we are not beholden and dependent on others for our basic needs. Climate change will make it very likely that our current food sources may not be able to support us, such as heat waves in California that are leading to extreme drought. We cannot base food security by automatically relying on these places to budget our food supply anymore.

If we are to be a free society, the ability to feed ourselves and to be good to the aina by adopting local, sustainable and holistic food practices is essential. This bill is a good start towards this objective.
