Chair McKelvey, Vice Chair Wildberger, and Members of the Committee:

The Hawaii Primary Care Association (HPCA) is a 501(c)(3) organization established to advocate for, expand access to, and sustain high quality care through the statewide network of Community Health Centers throughout the State of Hawaii. The HPCA <u>SUPPORTS</u> House Bill No. 1568, RELATING TO AGRICULTURE.

By way of background, the HPCA represents Hawaii's FQHCs. FQHCs provide desperately needed medical services at the frontlines in rural and underserved communities. Long considered champions for creating a more sustainable, integrated, and wellness-oriented system of health, FQHCs provide a more efficient, more effective and more comprehensive system of healthcare.

This bill, as received by your Committee, would require the Departments of Education, Health, and Public Safety, and the University of Hawaii System to ensure that a certain percentage of food purchased in public school, public hospitals, public prisons, and University of Hawaii facilities be fresh, local agricultural products and local value-added processed, agricultural products.

Over the past five years, HPCA has served as a member of the Obesity Prevention Task Force, and as such has joined the Hawaii Public Health Institute and other advocates in support of efforts to promote healthy diets and the increased consumption of locally-grown vegetables and fruits in our schools and communities.

Because the State purchases so much food for the daily operations of public schools, hospitals, prisons, and higher education facilities, it is prudent and essential for government to spend its limited resources within the State to ensure that these funds are circulated through local businesses and communities. The COVID-19 pandemic has greatly exacerbated the need for a bill like this. Our overreliance on tourism has weakened our ability to respond to unforeseen economic downturns. The only way for us to protect ourselves from the next global pandemic is for Hawaii to diversify its economic base and become more self-sufficient. And for us to do that, we need to utilize more locally-grown food.

Mahalo for hearing this testimony to support HB1568 with amendments.

Our organization supported the creation of Act 176 last year, and now we support the intent of HB1568 to get the ball rolling and begin to implement Act 176's changes to state procurement practices. Increasing local food procurement is a win-win idea that can have a virtuous effect on developing local agriculture and the local economy.

While it is clear that HB1568 would set up needed requirements and reporting for the top four departments with the highest food purchasing, we are disappointed that local food procurement requirements would not extend to all principal departments as was passed into law last year. On behalf of the Hawai'i Farm to School Hui, thank you for the opportunity to testify in **support of HB1568 with amendments**, which changes the law requiring all state departments to ensure that a certain percentage of food purchased consists of fresh, local agricultural products or local value-added, processed, agricultural, or food products to apply only to the DOE, DOH, PSD, and UH System; requires each of those departments and the UH System to report to the legislature on its progress toward meeting these benchmarks; and clarifies the information to be reported.

We respectfully request that the bill be amended to **require reporting on the total purchases and total local purchases by produce category** (as reported by the Department of Public Safety in the table on page 4 of the Governor's Report to the 2022 Legislature on Act 176, SLH 2021).

Additionally, it may be beneficial to **continue requiring compliance and reporting from all state departments**, so that purchases of local produce in the form of prepared meals from third-party vendors will also be captured (as demonstrated by the Department of Defense on page 8 of the <u>report</u>, which if omitted would have missed an estimated \$567,000 in local produce/produce purchases).

The Hawai'i Farm to School Hui is a statewide network comprising five Island Networks and over forty public-private entities with a collective mission to strengthen Hawaii's farm to school movement. The three pillars of successful farm to school programs are: 1) school gardens and on-campus farms, 2) food education, and 3) school food improvements through local procurement. The Hui formed in 2010 and is a program of Hawai'i Public Health Institute.

I originally moved to Hawaii in 1973 and have devoted my life since then to education, grades 6-12, up until 2008 when I took an early retirement from Seabury Hall on the island of maui and embarked upon my current adventure building school gardens, K-12, in maui county schools. I eventually joined the Local Food Coalition and the Hawaii Farm to School Hui.

My primary purpose was to help our haumana return to the āina to the extent that they could become capable of growing their own food in a way that replenished the soil and respected the environment through resilency and self-reliance in the process.

Over the years it seemed as if commercial agriculture for export was a primary focus for our state along with the tourist industry as ways of providing funding for our state government but there was something that wasn't working with this framework and HB 1568 could bring us the self-reliance and self-sufficiency we will sorely need to survive as an island nation. Aloha Chair McKelvey, Vice Chair Wildberger, and Committee members,

My name is Hunter Heaivilin and I am a food and agricultural planning consultant working across the state. My firm focuses on data in the agro-food system as a means to support everything from planning to policy. I am testifying to aid further defining state efforts toward local procurement and in **support of the intent of HB1568**. The benchmarks established in Acts 175 and 176 (2021) are important mechanisms to increase local purchasing, thereby stimulating agricultural output and progressing towards the statewide goals in the Aloha+ Challenge and the Sustainable Hawaii Initiative.

The <u>Annual Report on Purchases of Fresh Local Agricultural Products and Local Value-Added</u>, <u>Processed</u>, <u>Agricultural or Food Products by the State Pursuant to Act 176</u>, <u>SLH 2021</u> found 11 of 18 departments reported 'having no purchases of produce or local agricultural products as listed in Act 176', though they 'may have purchased food in the form of prepared meals from third-party vendors'.

To ensure meaningful reporting of departments covered by the statue, and for that reporting to provide market signals to the agricultural industry, **I ask that this bill require departments and UH reporting on the following:**

- Status of the department's progress in meeting the local percentage procurement goal
- Total spending on consumable foods
- Total spending on produce (as defined in the current statute)
- Total local purchase spending
- For departments that do direct purchasing and food preparation, total purchases and total local purchases by produce category, (as demonstrated by the exemplary and clear reporting by the Department of Public Safety). Namely:
 - Fruits & Vegetables
 - Coffee
 - Staple Starches
 - Eggs
 - Poultry & Poultry Products
 - Livestock (Beef)
 - Livestock (Pork)
 - Milk & Milk Products

- Aquacultural and maricultural products
- For departments that only purchased food in the form of prepared meals from third-party vendors, an estimate use/purchase of local produce/products (as demonstrated in the reporting of the Department of Defense)

Chair McKelvey, Vice Chair Wildberger, and Members of the Committee:

The Department of Public Safety (PSD) opposes House Bill (HB) 1568, which amends Act 176, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021, requiring PSD to ensure that a certain percentage of food purchased consists of fresh, local agricultural products or local value-added, processed, agricultural, or food products.

The Department's Food Services Branch does make an effort to purchase local agricultural products and would be willing to increase its purchasing of local agricultural products, but that is unfeasible under current conditions. Bearing in mind that PSD is operating with a lean budget and local food products are generally more expensive (sometimes up to triple the cost), the Department would not be able to meet the proposed benchmarks or will require a significant increase in its budget to do so.

In FY 2020-21, PSD's Food Services Branch spent approximately \$7.2 million on food products, including approximately \$213,700 in local food products, equaling 2.97% for the fiscal year. HB 1568 calls for the purchase of

local foods to constitute 10% of total foods purchased by January 1, 2025, increasing by 8% in each succeeding 5-year period – 18% by January 1, 2030, 26% by January 1, 2035, 34% by January 1, 2040, 42% by January 1, 2045, to 50% by January 1, 2050. These benchmarks would be impossible for PSD to meet.

While supporting local agricultural producers by increasing the purchasing of local foods seems to be a laudable goal, other factors related to the availability of the local food supplies need to be taken into account, such as:

- Not all the needed crops can be grown in Hawaii at market scale or at all. Hawaii's subtropical climate is not conducive to growing foods more readily grown in temperate climates, e.g., carrots, celery, potatoes, etc.
- 2) The quantities of foods produced locally are small, and sufficient supplies are not available on a consistent basis. PSD's Food Service Branch plans its menus and purchasing well in advance, but the process breaks down if the supplies are inadequate or unavailable.

In the statewide correctional facilities, food products such as chicken, pork, beef, onions, potatoes, celery, carrots, apples, and oranges account for a large percentage of the food purchases. These basic item quantities are not available locally, and if they are, they are not competitively priced to be able to meet PSD's food budget. These items must be imported, as we are not in position to wait for local vendors to receive their goods. In the event of natural disasters (e.g., hurricane, tsunami, flooding, etc.), it is PSD's responsibility to ensure each facility maintains emergency food supplies.

PSD supports inmate farming and uses produce grown by inmates at various correctional facilities such as the Waiawa Correctional Facility (WCF) and the Kulani Correctional Facility (KCF). The Corrections Program Services has a contract with the University of Hawaii at Manoa "Go Farm" to provide education Testimony on HB 1568 House Committee on Government Reform February 2, 2022 Page 3

to inmates on basic agricultural education and "farm-to-table" processes, so it needs to be understood, the Department is trying to do its part to support local. HB 1568 seems to be well-intentioned, but is unworkable, in the Department's view. PSD, therefore, respectfully asks that the bill be held. Thank you for the opportunity to present this testimony.
