Honorable Chair Luke, Vice Chair Yamashita, and Members of the Committee:

The County of Kaua'i is in **strong support of HB 1688 HD1** which subjects U-drive motor vehicles to the same motor vehicle registration fees as other motor vehicles, and authorizes the counties to use certain motor vehicle registration fees to mitigate and address the impacts of tourism-related traffic congestion.

Over the years our islands have continued to be impacted by the increase of abandoned and derelict vehicles left littering the sides of our roads and on vacant properties. To address this issue on Kaua'i, we initiated a county Abandoned Car Task Force with representatives from our finance department, solid waste division, police department, county council, and the private sector. One of our challenges, of course, is funding the removal and disposal of these vehicles; this measure helps in this task.

Registration fees that are equitable for all motor vehicles will certainly assist our effort in managing this challenge and keeping our Kaua'i as the Garden Island.

Honorable Chair Luke, Vice Chair Yamashita, and Members of the Committee:

The Finance Department of the County of Kaua'i *strongly supports* HB 1688 HD1, which allows the director of finance of a county to charge u-drive vehicles the same beautification fee as any regular citizen would pay. Currently the County of Kaua'i charges \$1 for u-drive vehicles and \$5 for all others. We use this money to defray the costs of abandoned and derelict vehicles left for county disposal.

The abandoned and derelict vehicle problem is impacting the quality of life for our residents, impacts our environment, and is an eye-sore that detracts from our visitor experience. Mayor Kawakami put together an abandoned vehicle task force which made progress in identifying process issues. While we are making progress on addressing some of those issues, this increased fee would help to pay for the clean-up initiatives.

It is for these reasons, that we **strongly support** HB 1688 HD1. Thank you for your consideration of this testimony.

COMMENTING ON HB1688 HD1 RELATING TO REGISTRATION OF VEHICLES

The Maui Chamber of Commerce would like to comment on HB1688 HD1 which subjects U-drive motor vehicles to the same motor vehicle registration fees as other motor vehicles. Authorizes the counties to use certain motor vehicle registration fees to mitigate and address the impacts of tourism-related traffic congestion.

The Chamber agrees that all motor vehicles should be charged the same fee for highway beautification, disposal of abandoned vehicles, etc. Our concern is that the additional use of these funds – to "mitigate and address the impacts of tourism-related traffic congestion" – may reduce the amount of funds available for the original purposes of this fund. We would prefer to see that only the **additional** revenue from rental car registration be used for mitigating and addressing the impacts of tourism-related traffic congestion.

SUBJECT: MOTOR VEHICLE, Registration Fees for U-drive Motor Vehicle

BILL NUMBER: HB 1688 HD 1

INTRODUCED BY: House Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: Subjects U-drive motor vehicles to the same motor vehicle registration fees as other motor vehicles. Authorizes the counties to use certain motor vehicle registration fees to mitigate and address the impacts of tourism-related traffic congestion.

SYNOPSIS: Amends section 286-51, HRS, to raise the beautification fee for U-drive vehicle registrations from \$1 to \$2, which is the rate generally applicable to vehicles. Deletes the proviso that a county's power to increase the beautification fee up to \$10 by ordinance will not apply to U-drive vehicles, so that the county ordinance may apply to all vehicles.

Allows beautification fees to be used to mitigate and address the impacts of tourism-related traffic congestion.

EFFECTIVE DATE: January 1, 2050

STAFF COMMENTS: The special reduced beautification fee for U-drive vehicles was enacted by Act 274, SLH 1999, which raised the beautification fee from \$1 to \$2 and gave the counties the power to raise it further, but froze the beautification fee for U-drive vehicles at \$1. This bill reverses the preferential treatment of U-drive vehicles.

We submit this testimony on behalf of Enterprise Holdings, which includes Enterprise Rent-A-Car, Alamo Rent-A-Car, National Car Rental, and Enterprise Commute (Van Pool).

Enterprise **supports** H.B. 1688, H.D.1, which subjects U-drive motor vehicles to the same motor vehicle registration fees as other motor vehicles, and authorizes the counties to use certain motor vehicle registration fees to mitigate and address the impacts of tourism-related traffic congestion.

The rental car industry has been engaged in discussions with some of the counties to partner together to address the impacts of tourism related traffic congestion. As part of these discussions, this measure emerged as a concept having support from all stakeholders.

The current registration fee for U-drive motor vehicles, or rental motor vehicles, is less than all other motor vehicles. Raising the current county certificate of registration fee to \$2 for all vehicles would create parity between U-drive vehicles and all other motor vehicles and allows for a more equitable application of the fee.

In addition, allowing counties to use the fee to address the impacts of tourism congestion will help provide funding for the counties, as well as flexibility for the counties to use the fee to support county traffic programs and infrastructure.

For the above reasons, we support H.B. 1688, H.D.1 and respectfully request that the Committee pass the bill in its current form. Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony on this bill.

The Hawai'i State Association of Counties (HSAC) strongly supports H.B. No. 1688, H.D.1, with a recommended amendment.

H.B. No. 1688 H.D.1: requires U-drive motor vehicles to pay the same beautification fee as that charged to regular citizens; and authorizes the counties to use the additional motor vehicle registration fees to mitigate problems caused by the additional costs of disposing abandoned and derelict vehicles, and to address the impacts of tourism-related traffic congestion.

The Department of Environmental Management links a lot of the abandoned vehicles throughout our county to illegal chop shop activity - abandoned vehicles contribute to making our places look run down and not taken care of. Also, a lot of people lose their vehicles through theft to benefit illegal chop shops. It's a serious financial strain/setback on our hardworking families.

A lot of time illegal chop shop locations are known but without serious penalty there's more risk than anything else trying to clean up these places.

Currently, there is a \$10-limit on the amount the beautification fee a county may increase the fee and limits the amount over \$2 to be used for the disposal of abandoned and derelict vehicles. H.B. 1688, H.D.1, removes the restriction on the use of the amounts over \$2 to the disposal of abandoned and derelict vehicles.

The costs relating to abandoned/derelict vehicles, however, is as great a problem for some counties as tourism-related traffic congestion. During 2017, the County of Kauai handled the removal of 404 abandoned and derelict vehicles, 498 in 2018. Kauai taxpayers paid more than \$411,000 for the handling and disposal of abandoned and derelict vehicles in 2017; \$423,000 in 2018; and \$419,999 for the period up until September 2019. Because of the greater number of registered vehicles in some of the counties, the \$10 cap is sufficient. Removing the cap



acknowledges the varying conditions in different counties; storage space, recycling facilities, administrative services.

We request that H.B. No. 1688 H.D. 1 be amended to remove the \$10 cap on the beautification fee that a county may charge for the disposal of abandoned and derelict vehicles. Amend page 2, line 17 to page 3, line 1 to read:

"The \$2 fee established pursuant to this subsection for certificates of registration for <u>all</u> motor vehicles [other than U-drive motor vehicles may be increased by ordinance up to a maximum of \$10; provided that all amounts received from any fee increase over \$2 shall be expended only for the purposes of paragraph (2)]. The moneys so assessed and collected shall be..."

For these reasons the Hawai'i State Association of Counties strongly supports H.B. 1688, H.D.1, with the recommended amendment and requests your favorable consideration of this measure.
