RELATING TO THE JUDICIARY'S 'OLELO HAWAI'I INITIATIVES

The Department of Budget and Finance (B&F) offers comments on this bill.

House Bill No. 1870 makes a \$300,000 general fund appropriation in FY 23 to

the Judiciary to support its 'Olelo Hawai'i projects to promote and explore ways to

provide Hawaiian language interpreter and translation services to the public. Of the

\$300,000, \$100,000 is for a program coordinator and \$200,000 is for implementation.

B&F notes that the federal Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental

Appropriations Act requires that states receiving Elementary and Secondary School

Emergency Relief (ESSER) II funds and Governor's Emergency Education Relief II

funds must maintain state support for:

- Elementary and secondary education in FY 22 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for elementary and secondary education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19; and
- Higher education in FY 22 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for higher education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19.

Further, the federal American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act requires that states receiving ARP ESSER funds must maintain state support for:

- Elementary and secondary education in FY 22 and FY 23 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for elementary and secondary education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19; and
- Higher education in FY 22 and FY 23 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for higher education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19.

The U.S. Department of Education has issued rules governing how these maintenance of effort (MOE) requirements are to be administered. B&F will be working with the money committees of the Legislature to ensure that the State of Hawai'i complies with these ESSER MOE requirements.

Purpose: Appropriates funds for staff positions and various services to support the 'Ōlelo Hawai'i Initiatives

Judiciary's Position:

The Judiciary strongly supports House Bill No. 1870 and the appropriation of \$200,000 for implementation of the Judiciary's 'Ōlelo Hawai'i projects, including interpretation and translation services, website translation and upgrades, educational outreach, and coordination of collaboration efforts; and \$100,000 for a program coordinator to manage such implementation. The Judiciary is committed to enlist specialists, agencies, and sources of knowledge to implement the recommendations enumerated in the *Report of the Hawaiian Language Web Feasibility Task Force* in accordance with 2015 House Concurrent Resolution No. 217, House Draft 1, Senate Draft 1 (HCR 217).

The Judiciary especially appreciates the appropriation for a program coordinator position to oversee the important responsibilities in this measure and requests a permanent position count to support it. The Judiciary looks forward to continuing to support the revitalization of the Hawaiian language and sees House Bill No. 1870 as a helpful means to support our efforts.

The Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) <u>SUPPORTs</u> HB1870, which supports the Judiciary in 'Ōlelo Hawai'i initiatives. OHA supports the State's efforts in providing opportunities to incorporate Hawaiian language as the co-official language of Hawai'i.

Over the decades, the resurgence of the Hawaiian language has accelerated. In 1978, the Hawai'i State Constitution was amended to recognize the Hawaiian language as an official language of the State, making Hawai'i the first state in the union to recognize its native language as an official language. In 2013, the first law to be published in 'Ōlelo Hawai'i since 1943 was passed, recognizing February as Mahina 'Ōlelo Hawai'i or Hawaiian Language Month.

Furthermore, programs such as the 'Aha Pūnana Leo's Hawaiian language immersion pre-schools, Hawaiian language immersion charter schools, the Department of Education's Ka Papahana Kaiapuni Hawaiian language immersion program, and the Hawaiian language programs of the University of Hawai'i system have helped to revitalize and perpetuate the Hawaiian language.

Although there is much momentum in the revitalization of the Hawaiian language, for 'Ōlelo Hawai'i to thrive, its usage must be strengthened. Recommendations of the Native Hawaiian Language task force to examine and thereby facilitate the establishment of Hawaiian language resources for the Judiciary has paved way in perpetuating 'Ōlelo Hawai'i. In way of this bill, the State of Hawai'i will extend their support of the Hawaiian language programs and the betterment of conditions of Native Hawaiians.

Therefore, OHA urges this Committee to **PASS** HB1870. Mahalo nui loa for the opportunity to testify on this measure.
