### RELATING TO THE CREATIVE WORKFORCE

The Department of Budget and Finance (B&F) offers comments on House Bill (H.B.) No. 1923.

H.B. No. 1923 establishes the Creative Arts Workforce Grant program to be

administered by the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts (SFCA). The measure

appropriates unspecified general funds in FY 23 to SFCA for this purpose.

B&F notes that, with respect to the general fund appropriation in this bill, the federal Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act requires that states receiving Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) II funds and Governor's Emergency Education Relief II funds must maintain state support for:

- Elementary and secondary education in FY 22 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for elementary and secondary education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19; and
- Higher education in FY 22 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for higher education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19.

Further, the federal American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act requires that states receiving ARP ESSER funds must maintain state support for:

- Elementary and secondary education in FY 22 and FY 23 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for elementary and secondary education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19; and
- Higher education in FY 22 and FY 23 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for higher education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19.

The U.S. Department of Education has issued rules governing how these maintenance of effort (MOE) requirements are to be administered. B&F will be working with the money committees of the Legislature to ensure that the State of Hawai'i complies with these ESSER MOE requirements.

### In consideration of HB 1923 **RELATING TO THE CREATIVE WORKFORCE.**

Chair Gates, Vice Chair Tam, and members of the Committee.

The Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism (DBEDT) respectfully offers comments on HB 1923 that would establish the creative arts workforce grant program to be administered by the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts. The measure also appropriates funds for the creative arts workforce grant program.

Creative Industries DBEDT has seen firsthand the impacts of COVID-19 on Hawaii's vibrant ecosystem of artists, cultural artisans, musicians, media makers and designers representing 54.071 jobs or 6.1% of the state total civilian jobs and \$4.2 billion (GDP) as noted in the most recent DBEDT Creative Industries Report<sup>1</sup> and Emerging Industries Report, including self-employed entrepreneurs and gig workers.

According to the June 2020 report by Brookings Institute, The LOST ART: MEASURING COVID-19'S DEVASTATING IMPACT ON AMERICAS CREATIVE ECONOMY states that "The creative economy is one of the sectors most at risk from the COVID-19 crisis. Arts, culture, and creativity are noted as one of three key sectors (along with science and technology as well as business and management) that drive regional economies." The report further identifies the State of Hawaii as one of the top 5 States that have job losses in this sector greater that the national average of 30.3%.

CID/DBEDT is in process of convening the creative resurgence task force as required in SCR 242, SD1, HD1, SLH 2021, which directs the department to form a

working group to provide guidance on definitions of creative workers and related creative economy sectors activity. As this is synergistic with the proposed measure, we will continue working with DLIR Workforce Development Division and share with LRB on best practices to develop recommendations for a definition for Hawaii's creative workers.

While DBEDT and CID support the intent of this measure, which would expand much needed grant support for Hawaii's creative industries sector, we want to ensure that the definition of creative worker is comprehensive and inclusive of all creative workers that contribute to Hawaii's economy.

Definitions by leading National agencies including the US Department of Commerce's Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA), the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA), and Western States Arts Federation (WESTAF), have varying and often broader definitions than those outlined in this Bill.

For these reasons, DBEDT welcomes the opportunity to work with SFCA, our sister agencies, the Creative Resurgence Task Force, and the Legislature to share insights through our Creative Industries Division experience in best defining Hawaii's creative economy and entrepreneurial workforce.

Chair Gates and members of the Committee, I am Jonathan Johnson, Executive Director of the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts (SFCA), and we are grateful for the opportunity to testify with **COMMENTS** on H.B. 1923.

Hawaii's creative arts workforce of culture and arts organizations, individual artists and cultural practitioners are an important and unique resource of the State's economy and community. SFCA recognizes the importance of the creative arts workforce and provides support through granting programs, as funding permits. An increase in grants appropriation through SFCA can have a similar impact to individuals in the creative arts workforce that H.B. 1923 is proposing.

H.B. 1923 needs to be refined to make the most impact in Hawaii's creative arts workforce. In order for a program such as this to succeed, there must be significant government financial and policy backing. Implementing the creative arts workforce ideals through community based organizations and structures, supported by the public sector and private philanthropy may serve as a bridge to growing government buy-in. A framework to grow the State's creative arts workforce exists through SFCA's grants to organizations.

Through Act 88, SLH 2021, funding for SFCA's community grants program was significantly impacted by a 40% reduction which the Legislature did not concur with (attached detail from EXEC-HB200-CD1). Due to this reduction in funds, SFCA was limited to funding half of the applications received statewide.

An appropriation to the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts' grant program would directly impact those identified in H.B. 1923. Creating a complex government structure as outlined in H.B. 1923 in the current economic climate would not be the most effective use of Hawaii's limited resources. This work can be accomplished by SFCA granting organizations in the community already doing this important work.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony on this matter.
