1 EOA's Position: The Executive Office on Aging (EOA), an attached agency to the Department

2 of Health, strongly supports the Governor's administration bill HB2145, Relating to Kupuna

3 Care Program.

4 Fiscal Implications: \$1.5 million is being requested in the EOA budget for the Kupuna Care

5 Program to enable working caregivers maintain their employment. In previous years, the Kupuna

6 Caregivers Program had its own allocated budget, however for purposes of combining the two

7 programs, we are requesting the \$1.5 million allocation be appropriated in the Kupuna Care

8 Program budget.

9 Purpose and Justification: The purpose of this bill is to amend Chapter 349, part II, HRS, to

10 incorporate the kupuna caregivers program into the kupuna care program.

11 The Kupuna Care Program was developed in EOA in 2001 to provide long-term services and

12 supports to kupuna, and the Kupuna Caregivers Program was established in 2017 specifically to

13 provide support for working caregivers. However, EOA determined that having two programs

| 13 | • Simplified the process of delivering services through the Kupuna care program |
| 14 | (i.e., traditional service delivery and participant-directed services) |
| 15 | • Specified that the kupuna care program shall award funds for services to the |
| 16 | service provider or financial management service provider upon receipt of an |
| 17 | invoice for services rendered |
| 18 | Recommendation: With this measure both programs, Kupuna Care and Kupuna Caregivers, |
| 19 | will continue to serve the needs of Hawaii's kupuna and caregivers, under a more efficient and |
| 20 | streamlined administrative and programmatic system. EOA strongly supports HB 2145. |
