Fiscal Implications: Increase in the marriage license fee will allow modernization of the Vital
 Statistics data system and continue support of the Hawaii Birth Defects Program.

3 Department Testimony: The Department of Health (DOH) **strongly supports** H.B. 2155 H.D.

4 1, which is part of the Governor's Administrative Package, to increase the marriage license fee to

5 support modernization of the vital statistics system, Hawaii Birth Defects Program (HBDP),

6 operating costs of marriage license agents, and spouse and child abuse programs of the

7 Department of Human Services and Judiciary.

8 Increasing the marriage license fee will support the DOH system that collects the marriage

9 license fees and the vital statistics system that issues the marriage certificates. In 2021, there

10 were 18,977 marriage licenses issued, of which 60% were issued to non-residents. No portion of

11 the current \$60.00 marriage license fee is retained by the DOH to maintain the statewide

12 marriage license registration system. The current vital statistics computer system that includes

the marriage license issuance and registration system is over 20 years old and needs to be

14 modernized. Post 9/11 laws like the REAL ID Act create an increased demand for marriage

15 records to prove legal name changes for state-issued driver's license and identification cards.

16 Operations will be curtailed without additional long-term financial resources. Hard costs like

17 postage and paper cannot be avoided in order to serve the public.

18 As specified in HRS §321.422, the purpose of HBDP is to collect surveillance information on

birth defects and other adverse reproductive outcomes; report the incidence, trends, and causes of
birth defects and other adverse reproductive outcomes; report information for the development of
prevention strategies to reduce the incidence of birth defects and other adverse reproductive
outcomes; and develop strategies to improve the access of children with birth defects to health
and early intervention services.

6 The Birth Defects Special Fund was established by the state legislature in 2002 to support the

7 HBDP using marriage license fees and creating a special fund. Since 2002, \$10 from each

8 marriage license fee collected by the DOH has been used to support program staff to collect,

9 analyze, and report on birth defects affecting babies statewide. The information from the

10 program has been essential to policymakers and public health programs as the only source

of accurate information to support or disprove concerns or theories about increased number of

12 babies born with defects or possible causes of birth defects (such as genetic—including inherited

13 disorders from parents, environmental, or other causes).

There are 43 states that have birth defects programs. HBDP staff directly abstract birth defects data from medical and other records at hospitals and other medical facilities statewide. The number of possible cases reviewed increased from approximately 1,000 to over 2,000 cases in the past few years. Annually, approximately 400 babies are found to have birth defects. HBDP staff salaries and fringe expenses doubled from 2002 to 2021.

The increased marriage license fee will also support two spouse and child abuse special fundsand marriage license agents, which have not had a fee increase since 1998.

DEPARTMENT'S POSITION: The Department of Human Services (DHS) supports this administrative measure, offers comments, and defers to the Department of Health (DOH).

PURPOSE: The purpose of the bill is to amend the marriage license statute to support the Hawaii Birth Defects Program, modernization of the vital statistics system, operating costs of marriage license agents, and spouse and child abuse programs of the department of human services and of the Judiciary. Effective 7/1/2060. (HD1) The HD1 amended the measure by defecting the effective date and making technical amendments.

Vital records such as marriage licenses and birth certificates are critical to obtaining government-issued identification compliant with the REAL ID Act. Hawaii residents and others will benefit from a modern vital statistics systems that will facilitate processing the increased number of records requests.

The increased fees will also provide additional funds to the Spouse & Child Abuse Special Fund (SCASF) administered by DHS. The DHS uses the SCASF to support spouse or child abuse intervention or prevention services as provided by section 346-7.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), including implementing Hawaii's Family First Prevention Service Act plan, Family First Hawaii.

Similarly, increased fees will also go to the Spouse and Child Abuse Special Account administered by the Judiciary as provided by section 601-3.6, HRS, to support its spouse and child abuse programs.
