RE: H.B. 2275, H.D. 1; RELATING TO FIREWORKS INFRACTIONS.

Chair Rhoads, Vice-Chair Keohokalole and members of the Senate Committee on Judiciary, the Department of the Prosecuting Attorney of the City and County of Honolulu ("Department") submits the following testimony in support of H.B. 2275, H.D. 1, with suggested amendments.

The purpose of H.B. 2275, H.D. 1, is to amend certain fireworks offenses to "infractions," which would be non-criminal, non-jailable offenses, punishable by fine. Similar to the "emergency period infractions" created by Act 185 (2021), it appears the proposed "fireworks infractions" would be handled much like traffic tickets. Law enforcement would issue citations to offenders, and offenders would have to pay a fine by mail, contest the charge by mail, or appear before the court to contest the matter. In the latter two options, if a court finds in favor of the State, the offender could then request a "trial de novo." Trial de novo is basically a civil trial in which the State is represented by a prosecutor, who presents witnesses to prove the State's case by a preponderance of the evidence.

Due to serious, ongoing concerns regarding the dangers and nuisance presented by illegal fireworks use, the Department shares the introducers' desire to hold offenders accountable and will continue to do its part in the enforcement process. While it may seem counterintuitive at first, in this instance the Department believes that lowering certain fireworks offenses to an infraction may actually be a more effective enforcement tool for law enforcement than the current misdemeanor-level offenses—given various evidentiary issues that have arisen in court—and thus, the Department is willing to try this new approach to fireworks enforcement. Offenses involving larger amounts of fireworks, or illegal importing or distribution, would continue to be misdemeanors or felonies.

Based on the Department's understanding of this bill, we believe the intent is to allow law enforcement officers to issue citations that are payable by mail, without requiring offenders to appear in court. If this is the intent, we recommend that the Committee either: (1) establish a set fine for these fireworks infractions—as some Mayors have done for emergency period infractions—by amending the range of fines found on page 29, lines 9-11, to a single dollar amount; or (2) require the Judiciary to prescribe a schedule of applicable fines—as is done for traffic infractions—by adding language, similar to HRS \$291D-9(b), in proposed \$____-8 on page 21. Either of these approaches would likely eliminate any need for a court to determine the specific fine in each case cited.

For all of the foregoing reasons, the Department of the Prosecuting Attorney of the City and County of Honolulu <u>supports</u> the passage of H.B. 2275, H.D. 1. Thank you for the opportunity to testify on this matter.

Bill No. and Title: House Bill No. 2275, H.D. 1 – Relating to Fireworks Infractions

Purpose: Establishes an expeditious adjudication system for the processing of fireworks infractions. Appropriates funds. Effective 1/1/2050. (HD1)

Judiciary's Position:

The Judiciary appreciates the opportunity to provide comments on this measure. The Judiciary takes no position on the merits of the bill and recognizes the impact of illegal fireworks on the community.

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, legislation was passed in 2021 to create an "emergency period infraction." Act 185 of the 2021 Legislative Session created the infraction within Section 127A-29, Hawai'i Revised Statutes (HRS), and within Chapter 291D. Expansion of Chapter 291D, rather than the creation of an entirely new chapter, proved to be an effective vehicle for implementation. The approach enabled law enforcement agencies to temporarily utilize traffic infraction citation forms for the issuance of emergency period infractions. The

approach also enabled the Judiciary to adjudicate emergency period infractions in the same manner as traffic infractions. Due to the coordination and collaborative efforts between numerous stakeholders, Act 185 was successfully implemented last year. Based on this experience, the Judiciary believes that the same framework can be used as a guide to achieving a similar fireworks infraction, and suggests that the bill be amended accordingly.

RELATING TO FIREWORKS INFRACTIONS

The Department of Budget and Finance (B&F) offers comments on this bill.

House Bill No. 2275, H.D. 1, establishes an expeditious adjudication system, similar to the system used for traffic infractions, for the processing of fireworks infractions and makes an unspecified general fund appropriation in FY 23 to the Judiciary to update its information management system to implement the process established by this measure.

B&F notes that, with respect to the general fund appropriation in this bill, the federal Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act requires that states receiving Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) II funds and Governor's Emergency Education Relief II funds must maintain state support for:

 Elementary and secondary education in FY 22 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for elementary and secondary education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19; and Higher education in FY 22 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for higher education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19.

Further, the federal American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act requires that states receiving ARP ESSER funds must maintain state support for:

- Elementary and secondary education in FY 22 and FY 23 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for elementary and secondary education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19; and
- Higher education in FY 22 and FY 23 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for higher education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19.

The U.S. Department of Education has issued rules governing how these maintenance of effort (MOE) requirements are to be administered. B&F will be working with the money committees of the Legislature to ensure that the State of Hawai'i complies with these ESSER MOE requirements.

Aloha Chair Rhoads, Vice Chair Keohokalole and Committee Members,

On behalf of the Hawaiian Humane Society, thank you for considering our support for House Bill 2275, HD1, which stablishes an expeditious adjudication system for the processing of fireworks infractions and appropriates funds.

Hawaiian Humane supports any attempt to remove fireworks from residential neighborhoods by keeping these dangerous products out of our state entirely and/or enhancing enforcement. At what should be joyous times for local families, illegal fireworks fill our neighborhoods with unexpected explosions that terrorize pets and people alike.

Animals who flee their homes in fear are at enormous risk of injury and death. An average of 8 stray dogs per day came into the Hawaiian Humane Society in 2021. As the new year arrived, that number spiked to 36 between Jan. 1-2. Hawaiian Humane has long educated our community about keeping pets safe from the terror of fireworks around New Years and July 4, but these bombs increasingly go off for months at a time. That makes it impossible for pet owners to prepare and creates sustained stress on people and animals, which can do lasting damage to their emotional and physical health. Neither people nor animals should have to take tranquilizers just to survive the impacts of illegal behavior by their neighbors.

We urge the committee to restore peace and safety to our neighborhoods and leave fireworks displays to the professionals. Mahalo for your consideration.

I strongly support HB2275 HD1 that establishes an expeditious adjudication system for processing fireworks infractions similar to traffic infractions. Anything that can deter and stop the use of illegal fireworks is appreciated.

Aerial types of fireworks were banned in 2011. This is not just about a few individuals using fireworks during unauthorized times that is a nuisance but also the many island-wide using illegal fireworks during New Year's Eve.

My family does NOT do fireworks of any kind, yet every New Year's day DEBRIS from ILLEGAL fireworks from New Year's Eve lay scattered over our entire yard. Some land on our roof and wash down gutters. I have dogs and TOXIC chemicals from debris can cause illness or injury if ingested. Thus I spend hours cleaning up the mess.

Toxins and heavy metals that are dispersed from fireworks in our environment also pollute our air, water, and soil. Much of the debris are NOT biodegradable. They cause harm to people, pets, and wildlife.
