RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII SEA GRANT COLLEGE PROGRAM

The Department of Budget and Finance (B&F) offers comments on this bill.

House Bill No. 2302 appropriates an unspecified amount of general funds for

FY 23 for the continued operation and disaster preparedness outreach efforts of the

University of Hawai'i Sea Grant College Program.

B&F notes that, with respect to the general fund appropriation in this bill, the

federal Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act requires that

states receiving Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) II funds

and Governor's Emergency Education Relief II funds must maintain state support for:

- Elementary and secondary education in FY 22 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for elementary and secondary education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19; and
- Higher education in FY 22 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for higher education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19.

Further, the federal American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act requires that states receiving ARP ESSER funds must maintain state support for:

- Elementary and secondary education in FY 22 and FY 23 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for elementary and secondary education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19; and
- Higher education in FY 22 and FY 23 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for higher education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19.

The U.S. Department of Education has issued rules governing how these maintenance of effort (MOE) requirements are to be administered. B&F will be working with the money committees of the Legislature to ensure that the State of Hawai'i complies with these ESSER MOE requirements.

HB 2302 – RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII SEA GRANT COLLEGE PROGRAM

Chair Ichiyama, Vice Chair Eli, and members of the committee:

The University of Hawai'i Sea Grant College Program (Hawai'i Sea Grant) supports HB 2302 provided that its passage does not replace the priorities as indicated in the University's Board of Regents Approved Budget.

This Bill is urgently needed because there is more hazard risk than people realize, particularly with regard to hurricanes. Note the following:

- 1) A Pacific Disaster Study conducted after the near hit of Hurricane Lane in 2018, estimated a Category 2 strike on Oahu would result in 52,000 displaced households and 27 billion dollars in damage.
- 2) A 2019 Hurricane Behavioral Study by FEMA, the Army Corps of Engineers and the Hawaii Emergency Management Agency found the average citizen was ill-prepared and had not properly gathered their supplies or readied their homes. The number one recommendation was increased education and outreach. The second was help in hardening homes. Both are important to make the State resilient.
- 3) A 2019 Communication Outreach and Education Study conducted by Hawai'i Sea Grant, at the request of the 2017 HI State Legislature, concluded that education and outreach should be significantly increased with traditional and non-traditional methods on a continuous long-term basis to inform and prepare citizens in the State. The report was submitted to the 2020 Legislature and is available online at the link below.
- 4) In 2020 Hurricane Daniel threatened the Hawaiian Islands and a Hurricane warning was called for Oahu for the first time in recent history. A 2021 presentation by the

Central Pacific Hurricane Center indicates tropical cyclone tracks may shift north in the future attributed to warming waters and climate change. See graphic below. This would increase the risk of Hurricanes such as Daniel impacting the State.

Hawai'i Sea Grant is well positioned to continue and increase its education and outreach of hurricane risk and preparation around the State. The *Homeowner's Handbook to Prepare for Natural Hazards – 4th Edition* (link below) provides useful tips regarding readiness for natural hazards such as tsunami, earthquakes, floods and hurricanes. The handbook lists local civil defense and emergency management agency information, provides guidance on emergency supplies, evacuation planning, and explains various measures to reduce property damage through home retrofit. This publication has gone through ten print runs with over 100,000 copies and has been modified for thirteen U.S. states and other countries based off the Hawai'i book. The 4th Edition, released in late 2019, was a major update with more options on home retrofit, as well as evacuation planning guidance and sections on volcanoes and climate change.

In the last three years, Sea Grant has participated in over 100 outreach events, and given almost 30,000 Homeowner's Handbooks. We have provided free books to individual homeowners as well as large organizations such as: (Catholic Charities – 280), (AARP – 63), (Be Ready Manoa - 80), (Zephyr Insurance – 200), (Kahala Emergency Fair – 80), (Cross Island Resilience Network consisting of 21 Communities on Oahu – 2,800), Hawai'i Public Library System – 480 with another 600 requested for all 51 public libraries around the State). All Emergency Management and Civil Defense Agencies have receive an initial allotment of 1,000 books. Maui Emergency Management Agency has requested another 500. It is estimated about 7,000 homes have been retrofitted since 2007, through the education and outreach of many organizations, including Hawai'i Sea Grant. Many homeowner's who retrofit plan on using their locations to shelter their families and/or friends, so there is a multiplier in the relief on hurricane shelter demand.

Hawai'i Sea Grant is committed to continued partnership with all emergency management and civil defense agencies at the State and county level in order to make our communities more resilient and foster a greater culture of preparedness in Hawai'i.

HB2302 – RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII SEA GRANT COLLEGE PROGRAM

Chair Rep. Linda Ichiyama, Vice Chair Rep. StaceyInn K.M. Eli, and members of the committee:

I am Dennis Hwang, Faculty at the University of Hawaii Sea Grant College Program. Since 2007, I have been helping the University of Hawaii Sea Grant with hazard education and outreach related to the Homeowners Handbook to Prepare for Natural Hazards. In 2020, we sent a Communication Education and Outreach Plan to the Legislature. Both the Handbook and Communication Plan can be found in the links below.

Today I am speaking as a private citizen. I am in support of HB2302 as there is more hazard risk than the general public realizes. To make our community more resilient, it will take a concentrated education/outreach effort on multiple fronts using traditional education and outreach methods as well as concepts of Social Science. Sea Grant is well suited to carry out this mission as demonstrated by the resources provided below as well as their experience in having conducted over 300 events since 2007 to educate the community.

A few things to note:

- Through research, field work and partnerships the Handbook strives to provide the most up to date mitigation measures to reduce damage to homes from a Hurricane. For example, we work with engineers and architects, as well as agencies such as the FEMA Building Science Branch and Institute of Building and Home Safety.
- 2) The Handbook also covers concepts of Climate Change and provides guidance measures that are simultaneously resilient, adaptive and sustainable.
- 3) There is strong demand for the book. Maui Emergency Management Agency recently asked for 500 after receiving an initial 1,000. Hawaii Public Library System, which distributes to all 51 of their libraries around the State on all islands recently asked for 600 more after receiving an initial 480. The Cross Island Resilience Network which consists or resilience organizations around Oahu (e.g., Aina Haina, Hauula, Kaaawa, Kailua, Kaneohe, Manoa, Wahiawa, Waimanalo) requested and picked up 2,800 books.
- 4) One of the major vulnerabilities for Hawaii is shelter space for Hurricane. Through education with our partners we believe approximately 7,000 homes have been

retrofitted. While much more needs to be done, this is significant in that many of these homeowners plan to shelter multiple families if there is a severe weather event. This will relieve demand on shelter space.

For the reasons above, I support HB2302

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on this measure.

My name is Darren Okimoto and I serve as the Associate Director/Extension Leader for the University of Hawai'i Sea Grant College at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa. I am providing testimony as a private citizen in support of HB 2302.

In 1992, Hurricane Iniki struck Kaua'i and damaged or destroyed over 41% (15,200) of the homes. Since Hurricane Iniki the Hawaiian Islands were threatened numerous times, most notably: i) there was a record of 13 tropical cyclones in the central Pacific in 2015, all of them fortunately missing the Hawaiian Islands, ii) Hurricane Lane threatened to do to O'ahu what Hurricane Iniki did to Kaua'i in 2018, and iii) Hurricane Douglas in 2020 was the closest tropical cyclone to pass near O'ahu in decades. A hurricane warning was issued for O'ahu, indicating hurricane winds were expected within 36 hours. A Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Hazus study indicates a Category 2 strike on O'ahu would cause 52,000 houses to be displaced and cause \$27 billion in economic losses. The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration National Weather Service (NOAA NWS) forecasters have also noticed a trend of hurricane paths that once tracked to the south of Hawai'i, now appear to have a more northerly track, placing the islands at greater risk from storm systems like Hurricane Douglas in 2020. With an apparent increasing trend of hurricane risks, most likely caused by the warmer ocean waters and climate change, it is even more important that residents in Hawai'i prepare their families and homes for future storm threats.

Hawai'i Sea Grant is well positioned to continue and increase its education and outreach of hurricane risk and preparation around the State. The Homeowner's Handbook to Prepare for Natural Hazards – 4th Edition (link below) provides useful tips regarding readiness for natural hazards such as tsunami, earthquakes, floods and hurricanes. The handbook lists local civil defense and emergency management agency information, provides guidance on emergency supplies, evacuation planning, and explains various measures to reduce property damage through home retrofit.
