House Bill 2514 proposes to amend Section 342-L-32, Hawaii Revised Statutes, requiring the Department of Health to adopt the standard that all underground storage tanks not exceed a maximum capacity of 100,000 gallon. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) offers the following comments.

The Department recognizes the risks of underground storage tanks containing hazardous material leaking and contaminating the surrounding area and possibly any underlying aquifer. Larger capacity underground storage tanks present a higher potential for larger leakage events.

The risk of underground storage tanks must be balanced with the benefits provided, through regulatory measures. The Department defers to the Department of Health on the determination of the maximum capacity of the underground storage tank that should not be exceeded and any other concerns with this measure.

Chairs Yamane and Lowen, Vice Chairs Tam and Marten, and Members of the Committees:

The Office of Planning and Sustainable Development (OPSD) **supports the intent of this measure and offers comments** on HB 2514, which requires the Department of Health to adopt the standard that all underground storage tanks not exceed a maximum capacity of 100,000 gallons.

Since December 2021, the Office of Planning and Sustainable Development's Statewide GIS Program and Statewide Sustainability Branch provided emergency GIS mapping and planning support to the Department of Health in response to the recent petroleum contamination of the Navy's drinking water system from the Red Hill Bulk Fuel Storage Facility.

The Office of Planning and Sustainable Development prepares and coordinates climate change adaptation actions for the State; and recognizes the value of all of Hawai'i's water in both the natural and built environments, including freshwater, wastewater, and stormwater resources for their best sustainable use, and to preserve the water's quality and quantity.

Hawai'i's changing climate includes scientific data that generally, rainfall throughout the state has decreased by 18% over a 30-year period from 1978-2007.¹ The access to clean and safe drinking water is vital for Hawai'i's climate resilience and sustainability. This is imperative for the Island of O'ahu since the island contains the majority of the state's population.

Measures like this bill seeking to establish a maximum capacity for underground storage tanks would mitigate the risk of potentially contaminating potable drinking water sources. The Office of Planning and Sustainable Development joins the Department of Health, the Commission on Water Resource Management, Honolulu's Board of Water Supply, and Hawai'i's Congressional Delegation's demand for the Navy to immediately suspend operations at the Red Hill Bulk Fuel Storage Facility and fully comply with the Department of Health's Emergency Order to execute the safe removal of fuel that "poses an imminent threat to human health and safety or the environment."

The Office of Planning and Sustainable Development is committed the sustainable development and climate adaptation of the state to meet the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations of Hawai'i to meet their own needs.

Subject: House Bill 2514: Relating to Underground Storage Tanks

The Honolulu Board of Water Supply (BWS) supports the intent of House Bill (HB) 2514 and offers the following comments.

This bill proposes amending Hawaii Revised Statutes Section 342L-32 to limit the maximum size of underground storage tanks (USTs) to one hundred thousand gallons or less. The BWS supports revising Hawaii's UST laws to prohibit enormous UST that have disproportionate potential to adversely impact Oahu's irreplaceable sole-source groundwater aquifer. The continued presence of such USTs poses an unacceptable risk to our critical drinking water resources.

However, the BWS also believes that Hawaii Revised Statutes Section 342L-32 provides the foundational standards for the design, construction, installation, upgrade, maintenance, repair, and operation of all USTs. The BWS recommends the bill amend HRS 342L to add a new section entitled "Maximum Tank Size," providing that:

"No person shall operate an underground storage tank or tank system with a maximum capacity that exceeds one hundred thousand gallons."

On behalf of Hawaii Children's Action Network Speaks!, we are writing to support in STRONG support HB 2514, relating to underground storage tanks.

We can all agree that having fuel found in tap water is not a natural occurrence. The fuel-tainted water has negatively affected more than just military families, but also local civilian families who reside on military housing. In town halls between military families and military officials, families shared their personal experiences of taking their sick children to the hospital and diagnosed with chemical burns in their mouths and rashes on their bodies. Pregnant women have been rushed to the emergency room for uncontrollable vomiting. Families are not able to use the running water in their own home. Imagine using bottled water in a cup to brush a young child's teeth in a home in military housing. This is not a healthy environment for children or families.

The U.S. Navy Red Hill Bulk Fuel Storage Facility stores over 100 million gallons of fuel in 20 large tanks which sits just 100 feet above O'ahu's natural aquifer and primary drinking water supply.¹ This facility in Kapūkaki, or Red Hill, has had its share of leaks and damages. Since this facility was built in 1943, reports of at least 180,000 gallons of fuel have leaked into the environment. That includes the larger spill in 2014 that wasted 27,000 gallons into the natural environment. The Navy cites its own studies that detail a 27.6% chance that the facility could leak up to 30,000 gallons of fuel every year. Those same studies also show that there are annual leaks of thousands of gallons per year.² For the health and safety of the children and families on this island, I respectfully request the committee vote favorably on HB 2514 and pass the measure.

The Environmental Caucus of the Democratic Party of Hawai'i stands in support of HB 2514. This measure would require the Department of Health to adopt the standard that all underground storage tanks not exceed a maximum capacity of 100,000 gallons.

In 2018, nearly four years ago, the O'ahu County Democrats, out of dire concern over the risk to the Moanalua-Waimalu Aquifer, our major drinking water source for Moanalua to Hawai'i Kai, affecting hundreds of thousands of residents, businesses and visitors of the Honolulu District, adopted a resolution, OC 2018-11, urging the Navy to retrofit its tanks or move them away from the aquifer. The Navy has taken no such action, and the situation has now become, in the words of your former colleague, U.S. Rep. Kai Kahele, "a crisis of astronomical proportions."

Aloha Chair Yamane, Chair Lowen, Vice Chair Tam, Vice Chair Marten, and HHH/EEP Committee Members,

As you can glean from our name, Livable Hawaii Kai Hui is deeply concerned with the continuous threat posed by the Red Hill fuel tanks to our shared aquifer. This is why we **strongly support** HB2514 regarding such underground storage tanks (UST).

It is of utmost importance that we pass this Bill as part of a series of measures at all levels of government to address the Red Hill water crisis and prevent others like it.

Still, while we support HB2514, we hope this Committee will also consider the following **amendment** to Section 342L—32, Hawaii Revised Statutes, subsection (b)(1):

 The tank and tank system shall be designed, constructed, installed, upgraded, maintained, repaired, and operated, emptied, decommissioned, and dismantled to prevent releases of the stored regulated substances for the operational entire life of the tank or tank system;

The specific language may need edits, but the point is to clarify that the statute demands health, safety, and environmental protection for as long as a tank or tank system exists. Current language includes "designed, constructed, installed," showing that "operational life" already covers the period prior to normal operations. We hope our proposed language extends that coverage across the entire time a tank or tank system might leak, preempting any argument about liability after a site – which may or may not be fully emptied – declares itself out of operation. Alternatively, perhaps a broad definition for "operational life" might be inserted.

Our suggestions aside, we would like to send a big mahalo to this Committee and the many legislators behind this Bill for providing the public an opportunity to address this issue on a Hawai'i-wide level.

The events of the past few months – let alone the 74 years since the first *documented* leak at Red Hill – have opened our eyes to the ever-clearer threat to our precious water resources.

What does it say about our situation when the poisoning of nearly 100,000 people's water isn't even close to the worst case scenario? Every second that we don't do anything brings us closer to certain catastrophic failure. This is not hyperbole, it is what the Navy's own studies have indicated.

So once more, thank you for hearing this Bill, strengthening it, and passing it on for House approval. While it may not be a cure-all, this and other efforts on the County and Federal level will be critical for ensuring a livable future for all living things on this island, and hopefully set a worldwide precedent.

The Honolulu Board of Water Supply (BWS) supports the intent of House Bill (HB) 2514 and offers the following comments.

This bill proposes amending Hawaii Revised Statutes Section 342L-32 to limit the maximum size of underground storage tanks (USTs) to one hundred thousand gallons or less. The BWS supports revising Hawaii's UST laws to prohibit enormous UST that have disproportionate potential to adversely impact Oahu's irreplaceable sole-source groundwater aquifer. The continued presence of such USTs poses an unacceptable risk to our critical drinking water resources.

However, the BWS also believes that Hawaii Revised Statutes Section 342L-32 provides the foundational standards for the design, construction, installation, upgrade, maintenance, repair, and operation of all USTs. The BWS recommends the bill amend HRS 342L to add a new section entitled "Maximum Tank Size," providing that:

"No person shall operate an underground storage tank or tank system with a maximum capacity that exceeds one hundred thousand gallons."

Aloha Chairs Yamane/Lowen, Vice Chair Tam/Marten and Members of the Committees,

On behalf of the Hawai'i Alliance for Progressive Action (HAPA) I am submitting testimony in **support of HB2514.** HAPA is a state-wide organization that engages approximately 10,000 local residents annually.

Mahalo for hearing HB2514 to require the Department of Health to adopt the standard that all underground storage tanks not exceed a maximum capacity of 100,000 gallons.

HB2514 seeks to protect our islands' most precious resource from fuel contamination. The presence of leaky fuel tanks at Red Hill and the Navy's mismanagement of this crisis directly impacts the health and quality of life of Oahu's residents, and will continue to for generations to come. Some of our staff and many of our supporters are directly affected by this crisis. Our water is precious and we all have a duty to protect our islands' source of life for present and future generations.

The legislature must do all that it can to remove the threat of something far worse happening to our water supply, both now and for future generations to come. O'ahu's residents are facing a serious crisis which will continue for years. Board of Water Supply's Ernie Lau said that the Hālawa shaft – which was shut down as a precaution following the Navy's Red Hill well contamination – could be shut down for years, even permanently.

We cannot allow 80-year-old underground storage tanks that store up to 187 million gallons of fuel per day and that pose such an immense threat of leaking and contaminating our environment and water supply to operate 100 feet above O'ahu's sole-source drinking water aquifer.

Navy officials cannot be trusted to protect our water. They have lied time and time again. The following reasons explain why the legislature must act since the Navy has failed to:

- The Navy lied about an active leak at Pearl Harbor for months, discovering the leak in January 2021 but not informing Health Department officials until May. This was revealed in whistleblower emails and documents in October.
- A whistleblower also told the Department of Health in September that Navy officials provided false testimony and withheld information about the full extent of the Facility's infrastructure, including connected pipelines, as well as "historical records of corrosion issues, including holes in tanks" at its Red Hill fuel facility during legal proceedings.

- The Navy suspended use of its Red Hill water shaft on November 28, but the public only found out on December 1. The Navy continues to confuse and gaslight community members.
- Hundreds of community members reported chemical smells in their water on November 28 and then health issues on November 29, which the Navy refused to acknowledge as a potential health concern until the state Department of Health advised residents to not drink the clearly contaminated water.
- A day after the Navy said it had detected diesel in its 'Aiea Hālawa well at levels more than double the DOH safety limit, the military backtracked, saying the contaminated sample "did not come directly" from the well and the Navy does not believe the result proves the well is contaminated.
- They continue to not be transparent despite agreeing to the Administrative Order of Consent, which requires them to be more forthcoming about operations at the Red Hill facility.
- The BWS Hālawa shaft will be shut down until fuel is removed from the tanks and may not reopen for years to come. This shaft was a source of water for South O'ahu from Hālawa to Maunalua. The BWS has advised that mandatory water conservation measures will now need to be in place in the summer of 2022.
- The Navy "flushed" Red Hill contaminants for days in violation of Department of Health requirements despite repeated warnings. This risked long-lasting effects on birds, plants, fish, and other aquatic life from petroleum contamination

The Department of Health has agreed that the situation is inherently dangerous. DOH said that a water sample taken from the Red Hill drinking water shaft on December 5 confirmed the water is contaminated with "high levels" of petroleum and gasoline. The sample detected total petroleum hydrocarbons diesel range organics levels 350 times above the DOH Environmental Action Level (EAL) for drinking water, and gasoline range organics more than 66 times the DOH EAL.

The Red Hill facility – the fragile, antiquated fuel tanks and supporting systems – has a long history of leaking fuel into the surrounding environment and has already contaminated O'ahu's primary drinking water aquifer. Shutting down Red Hill immediately and entirely is the only way to guarantee the safety of our water and our people.

The Facility's tanks, each with a 12.5 million-gallon capacity, had a quarter-inch thick steel liner when first constructed nearly 80 years ago. They are encased in aging concrete and the steel liners have been corroding to the point where many through-wall holes have been found and in some areas they are one-third of their original thickness.

These tanks have leaked 180,000 gallons of fuel since they were constructed and the Navy's own risk assessment from 2018 concluded that the probability of an acute leak of between 1,000 and 30,000 gallons (independent of any earthquake risk) over the next ten years is 96%. The Navy cannot prove that the tank or tank system will not leak regulated substances into the environment.

Approximately 93,000 people living in military housing have been unable to use their water for over two months. If the Navy water system is further compromised, our housing crisis will mushroom.

Lower levels of petroleum products were also found in samples collected from the Aliamanu Child Development Center as well as homes located on the Navy's water system.

It's absolutely critical that the State Legislature take action immediately to address this major threat to Honolulu's water supply.

The Council for Native Hawaiian Advancement (CNHA), a member-based 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization with a mission to enhance the cultural, economic, political, and community development of Native Hawaiians, <u>STRONGLY SUPPORTS</u> HB2514. This bill would set the maximum size for underground fuel storage tanks at 100,000 gallons.

This measures follows in the wake of a water crisis where the Navy's Red Hill Bulk Fuel Storage Facility has leaked 180,000 gallons of fuel since 1940, <u>including recent leaks that have</u> <u>contaminated the Southern O'ahu Basal Aquifer.</u> After the November 2021 leaks, the Honolulu Board of Water Supply (HBWS) was forced to shut down its Hālawa Shaft, Hālawa Well and 'Aiea Well as a precautionary measure to prevent the fuel contamination from migrating to the public water system. An extended or permanent shutdown of these three critical HBWS wells could trigger mandatory water conservation measures during dry periods. <u>Moreover, the</u> <u>unknown levels of fuel contamination in the Southern O'ahu Basal Aquifer could have</u> <u>potentially devastating impacts on Hawai'i's economy, especially if the contamination is so</u> <u>great that the HBWS is unable to approve new wells to support new affordable housing</u> <u>developments.</u>

This measure, should it pass, would be a long-overdue step in the right direction toward the establishment of necessary governing frameworks that effectively work toward protecting Hawai'i's finite natural resources for the betterment of future generations. Native Hawaiian traditions have reflected the importance of fresh water for survival on this isolated archipelago in the middle of the vast Pacific Ocean. What Native Hawaiians, of the time before, knew of sustainability and self-sufficiency in the Hawaiian Islands, through centuries of struggle-turnedinto-prosperity, is often taken for granted until an existential threat arises. We are presently



faced with such a threat and it is evidently imperative that measures, like this, are needed to address the existing crisis and to mitigate the potential for future crises.

CNHA urges the Legislature to pass HB2514 to better protect O'ahu's life-giving waters and the health of its residents.
