Aloha all.

My name is Manabo "Robert' Sato. I am the Vice president and General manager of Moped Doctors Inc. We are a well established moped repair/sales shop in Honolulu for over a decade and helped out with the City and County of Honolulu on the original moped Safety inspection legistlation introduced in 2017. We worked directly with the State DOT to help finalize the sound standards for this process and we are a current moped safety inspection station on Oahu.

We have seen the impact that the law changes regarding mopeds have had on the lives of moped drivers. Many of them are from the lower part of Oahu's income segments. Mopeds are one of the few reliefs that they get from the overall skyrocketing cost of living here. It allows a Hawaii resident on a tight budget transportation mobility and independence.

Because they start as low as \$1000 brand new and get nearly 100 miles a gallon they are also very good for the environment as well as being economical.

The issue is that many moped drivers feel disprespected on the road. Regular citizens feel that they are getting lumped in with "outlaw" moped drivers (who we in the legitimate moped business and rider community deplore) who are the main fault and reason why undue attention is paid to the moped community.

By having law enforcement officers gaining greater latitude in pulling over specifically targetting moped drivers, it would lead to more stress, pressure and difficulty for mainstream moped riders. If some driver is riding an excessively loud, fast or otherwise unsafe moped, a law enforcement officer could easily pull over such people to check for their driver's license or permit with existing laws.

We at Moped Doctors believe there is no need for this change or law and that HPD and law enforcement can use their own discretion with existing laws regarding pulling over moped drivers and this proposal and bill is unnecessary.
