The Waikiki Neighborhood Board is in favor of the concept of SB 2124, Noise Control.

While the Honolulu Liquor Commission has an excellent enforcement branch there is an occasional noise complaint from a bar or other locations where liquor is served.

The concept of this bill should allow the Honolulu liquor commission to review and adjust current noise levels to meet the needs of each community.

With the exception of Hotel General, there are very few 4AM liquor outlets in Honolulu so this will probably support the control of special events that are serving alcohol.

## TESTIMONY OF THE DEPARTMENT OF THE ATTORNEY GENERAL THIRTY-FIRST LEGISLATURE, 2022

ON THE FOLLOWING MEASURE: S.B. NO. 2124, RELATING TO NOISE CONTROL. Chairs Moriwaki and Keohokalole and Members of the Committees:

The Department of the Attorney General provides the following comments.

Senate Bill No. 2382 creates a new section in chapter 281, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), establishing noise level restrictions for liquor establishments (and outdoor areas under their control) to be enforced by summons or citation issued by law enforcement officers, and allows the county liquor commissions to revoke or suspend a liquor license, deny the application, renewal, or transfer of a license, or withhold issuance of a license when the licensee or applicant fails to take corrective action to address noise complaints of violations under this new section.

This bill may have unintended effects because the new section is placed in chapter 281, HRS, Intoxicating Liquor, rather than chapter 342F, HRS, Noise Pollution:

First, the Department of Health may lack the power to enforce this section. The liquor commissions are empowered under section 281-17(a)(10) to investigate violations of chapter 281, HRS, and violations of the applicable Department of Health's allowable noise levels. While the Department of Health has the power to prevent, control, and abate noise pollution in the State under section 342F-3, HRS, the Department of Health does not have the power to enforce chapter 281, HRS.

Second, chapter 342F, HRS, (and rules adopted by the Department of Health thereunder) will not apply to this section, including section 342F-5, HRS, Variances. Without the ability to apply for variances, liquor establishments will no longer have a

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legal means to exceed maximum permissible sound levels for construction, agricultural, or industrial activities.

If the Committee wishes to avoid these effects, we recommend amending the bill as follows:

(1) On page 1, lines 1-4, replace the wording to state as follows:

Chapter 342F, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by adding to part II a new section to be appropriately designated and to read as follows: <u>\$342F-</u> <u>Noise violations; maximum permissible sound</u> ....

(2) On page 5, line 3, to page 6, line 2, delete subsection (e) and place it

into a new section to read as follows:

SECTION \_\_\_. Chapter 281, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by adding to part III a new section to be appropriately designated and to read as follows:

"<u>§281-</u><u>Revocation, suspension, or denial of license.</u> Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the commission may revoke or suspend a license, deny the application, renewal, or transfer of a license, or withhold issuance of a license, if the licensee or applicant, as applicable, fails to take corrective action that, to the commission's satisfaction and approval, addresses:

- (1) Complaints from the public;
- (2) Reports from the commission's investigators;
- (3) Summons or citations issued pursuant to section 342F- ; or
- (4) Adjudications of the commission or the liquor control adjudication board,

indicating that noise emitting from an establishment, adjacent outdoor areas under the control of the establishment, including parking lots or lanais, or patrons entering or departing from the establishment disturbs residents on the street or of the neighborhood in which the establishment is located, the noise exceeds the applicable maximum permissible sound levels set forth in the county's noise codes or commission rules, or intrudes into nearby residential units, or the establishment is in violation of section 342F- ..."

(3) On page 6, line 3, redesignate subsection (f) to subsection (e) as follows:

"(e) As used in this section: ..."

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(4) On page 6, lines 13-14, replace the wording in the definition of "Establishment" to reference chapter 281, as follows:

"...proposed to be issued, renewed, or transferred pursuant to chapter 281."

(5) On page 6, line 15, to page 12, line 6, delete SECTION 2 and SECTION 3 in their entirety.

(6) On page 12, line 15, and on page 13, lines 7 and 18:

Delete "281- " and replace it with "342F- ."

I strongly support SB2124 relating to noise control. I also recommend a hefty penalty fine imposed by offenders. SB2124 should also be strongly enforced especially in residential areas. There are some establishments that start their loud music as early as 11:00am in the morning, even on weekends. Music goes on - all day past midnightight until 1:00am.

This affects residential neighborhood areas. Our children come home from school, need to do their homework. They cannot concentrate with such loud music coming from these bars and restaurants with Karaoke music. They need to be in bed by 9am and get up the next morning to go to school. Parents also need to sleep to get up early the next day to go to work. How is this possible with this loud music going on past midnight. In addition, customers from these establishments are cheering, singing, yelling, shouting when watching sports games on the huge screen provided by these establishments who have erected HUGE TENTS OUTSIDE WITH OPEN SIDES, facing the street.
