The recent pandemic has significantly increased the demand and use of broadband for communication across all sectors, and throughout our communities statewide. Students are engaged in distance learning for their schoolwork, businesses for e-commerce transactions and patients have become more reliant on telehealth to connect with their physicians for medical consultation and monitoring.
