## in consideration of SB 2581 SD 1 RELATING TO AFFORDABLE HOUSING.

Chair Nakamura, Vice Chair Hashimoto, and Members of the House Committee on Housing.

The Office of Planning and Sustainable Development (OPSD) **supports the intent** of SB 2581 SD1, which would amend Hawaii Revised Statutes Section 226-109 Affordable Housing to add as a priority guideline a section (9) that seeks to use lands within the State that are leased to the federal government or under federal government control that are to be returned to the State, including lands that have been used to house former military facilities, for affordable housing.

OPSD is in favor of measures that facilitate affordable housing. For your information, OPSD is currently in the process of collecting data from DLNR and the various counties regarding federal owned lands, including federal lands utilized by military facilities. This study was called for in Act 93, SLH 2021.

### In consideration of SENATE BILL 2581, SENATE DRAFT 2 RELATING TO AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Senate Bill 2581, Senate Draft 2 proposes to establish as a priority guideline for the provision of affordable housing the use of lands leased to the federal government or under federal government control and that are to be returned to the State, including lands that have been used to house former military facilities, for affordable housing. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) offers the following comments on this measure.

Through the Department, the State leases lands to the military, including the Army, Air Force, and Navy, on the islands of Oahu, Kauai, and Hawaii. Many of these leases were issued for initial terms of 65 years and are scheduled to expire around 2029. However, some of the lessees have expressed interest in retaining use of the lands after 2029 and may apply for new long-term leases. If the Board of Land and Natural Resources were to approve new leases at public, sunshine meetings, then State planning for affordable housing on these lands in the near term may not be worthwhile.
