Subject: Senate Bill 2600, SD2, HD1: Relating to Underground Storage Tanks

The Honolulu Board of Water Supply (BWS) strongly supports SB 2600, Senate Draft (SD) 2, House Draft (HD) 1. This bill proposes to amend Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) Section 342L to prohibit the issuance of permits for future large capacity underground storage tanks systems mauka of the underground injection control (UIC) line beginning July 1, 2022. It also prohibits operation of, and renewal of permits for, large capacity underground storage tank system permits located mauka of the UIC line beginning January 1, 2023.

For clarification purposes, the term mauka is not defined in the HRS, so the BWS suggests amending the term to "<u>inland</u>" of the UIC line. The BWS proposes an amendment to the definition of the UIC with new language underscored as follows:

"Underground injection control line" means the underground injection control line represented by a dashed line on the department of health underground injection control program maps made effective July 6, 1984, pursuant to <u>§340E-2, HRS</u>...

Specifying the UIC provisions pursuant to §340E-2, HRS is essential to clarify any potential intra-agency conflicts that arises in the event environmental protection and permit approval priorities do not align.

Hawai'i Alliance for Progressive Action <u>Supports</u>: SB2600 SD2 HD1

Aloha Chair Johanson, Vice Chair Kitagawa and Members of the Committee,

On behalf of the Hawai'i Alliance for Progressive Action (HAPA) I am submitting testimony in **support of SB2600 SD2 HD1**.

Mahalo for hearing SB2600 SD2 HD1, which prohibits issuance of future underground storage tanks mauka of the underground injection control line as defined by the Department of Health beginning July 1, 2022. The measure also prohibits operation of and renewal of underground storage tank permits located mauka of the underground injection control line as defined by the Department of Health beginning January 1, 2023 (SD2).

SB2600 SD2 HD1 seeks to protect our islands' most precious resource from fuel contamination. The presence of leaky fuel tanks at Red Hill and the Navy's mismanagement of this crisis directly impacts the health and quality of life of Oahu's residents, and will continue to for generations to come. Some of our staff and many of our supporters are directly affected by this crisis. Our water is precious and we all have a duty to protect our islands' source of life for present and future generations.

The legislature must do all that it can to remove the threat of something far worse happening to our water supply, both now and for future generations to come. O'ahu's residents are facing a serious crisis which will continue for years. Board of Water Supply's Ernie Lau said that the Hālawa shaft – which was shut down as a precaution following the Navy's Red Hill well contamination – could be shut down for years, even permanently.

We cannot allow 80-year-old underground storage tanks that store up to 187 million gallons of fuel per day and that pose such an immense threat of leaking and contaminating our environment and water supply to operate 100 feet above O'ahu's sole-source drinking water aquifer.

Navy officials cannot be trusted to protect our water. They have lied time and time again. The following reasons explain why the legislature must act since the Navy has failed to:

- The Navy lied about an active leak at Pearl Harbor for months, discovering the leak in January 2021 but not informing Health Department officials until May. This was revealed in whistleblower emails and documents in October.
- A whistleblower also told the Department of Health in September that Navy officials provided false testimony and withheld information about the full extent of the Facility's infrastructure, including connected pipelines, as well as "historical records of corrosion issues, including holes in tanks" at its Red Hill fuel facility during legal proceedings.

- The Navy suspended use of its Red Hill water shaft on November 28, but the public only found out on December 1. The Navy continues to confuse and gaslight community members.
- Hundreds of community members reported chemical smells in their water on November 28 and then health issues on November 29, which the Navy refused to acknowledge as a potential health concern until the state Department of Health advised residents to not drink the clearly contaminated water.
- A day after the Navy said it had detected diesel in its 'Aiea Hālawa well at levels more than double the DOH safety limit, the military backtracked, saying the contaminated sample "did not come directly" from the well and the Navy does not believe the result proves the well is contaminated.
- They continue to not be transparent despite agreeing to the Administrative Order of Consent, which requires them to be more forthcoming about operations at the Red Hill facility.
- The BWS Hālawa shaft will be shut down until fuel is removed from the tanks and may not reopen for years to come. This shaft was a source of water for South O'ahu from Hālawa to Maunalua. The BWS has advised that mandatory water conservation measures will now need to be in place in the summer of 2022.
- The Navy "flushed" Red Hill contaminants for days in violation of Department of Health requirements despite repeated warnings. This risked long-lasting effects on birds, plants, fish, and other aquatic life from petroleum contamination

The Department of Health has agreed that the situation is inherently dangerous. DOH said that a water sample taken from the Red Hill drinking water shaft on December 5 confirmed the water is contaminated with "high levels" of petroleum and gasoline. The sample detected total petroleum hydrocarbons diesel range organics levels 350 times above the DOH Environmental Action Level (EAL) for drinking water, and gasoline range organics more than 66 times the DOH EAL.

The Red Hill facility – the fragile, antiquated fuel tanks and supporting systems – has a long history of leaking fuel into the surrounding environment and has already contaminated O'ahu's primary drinking water aquifer. Shutting down Red Hill immediately and entirely is the only way to guarantee the safety of our water and our people.

The Facility's tanks, each with a 12.5 million-gallon capacity, had a quarter-inch thick steel liner when first constructed nearly 80 years ago. They are encased in aging concrete and the steel liners have been corroding to the point where many through-wall holes have been found and in some areas they are one-third of their original thickness.

These tanks have leaked 180,000 gallons of fuel since they were constructed and the Navy's own risk assessment from 2018 concluded that the probability of an acute leak of between 1,000 and 30,000 gallons (independent of any earthquake risk) over the next ten years is 96%. The Navy cannot prove that the tank or tank system will not leak regulated substances into the environment.

Approximately 93,000 people living in military housing have been unable to use their water for over two months. If the Navy water system is further compromised, our housing crisis will mushroom.

Lower levels of petroleum products were also found in samples collected from the Aliamanu Child Development Center as well as homes located on the Navy's water system.

It's absolutely critical that the State Legislature take action immediately to address this major threat to Honolulu's water supply.

Please pass SB2600 SD2 HD1.

Hawaii's Thousand Friends, a statewide non-profit dedicated to ensuring that appropriate land and water planning and management decisions are made that protect the environment, human health and cultural and natural resources, supports SB 2600 SD2 HD1, which establishes 7/1/22 as the last day to issue permits and beginning January 1, 2023 prohibits operation of large capacity underground storage tank systems mauka of the underground injection control line.

For years organizations, the Board of Water Supply (BWS) and others have warned of contamination to O`ahu's drinking water aquifer and wells from the 78-year old Red Hill underground fuel storage tanks, which are only 100 feet above O`ahu's aquifer and in late 2021 our worst nightmare came true.

Human and cost impacts from fuel-contaminated drinking water have been enormous. In early December 2021 the Department of Health (DOH) advised 93,000 people and businesses on the Navy's water system to stop drinking the water forcing the Navy to provide bottled water to more than 4,000 families and provide alternate housing to more than 3,440 families.

The threat of contamination forced the BWS to close the Halawa shaft, which provides water to 450,000 people from Moanualua to Hawai`i Kai and to find new wells at a cost of \$100 million. This drinking water catastrophe so far has cost the DOH \$1.5 million.

Hawaii's Thousand Friends supports setting deadlines to stop permitting and operating large capacity underground storage tank systems and calls for the immediate decommissioning of the Red Hill underground fuel storage system to prevent future contamination of O`ahu's drinking water.

In consideration of SENATE BILL 2600, SENATE DRAFT 2, HOUSE DRAFT 1 RELATING TO UNDERGROUND STORAGE TANKS

Senate Bill 2600, Senate Draft 2, House Draft 1 proposes to: beginning 7/1/2022, prohibit issuance of permits for future large capacity underground storage tank systems mauka of the underground injection control line and beginning 1/1/2023, prohibits operation of, and renewal of permits for, large capacity underground storage tank systems located mauka of the underground injection control line, effective 7/1/2060. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) supports this measure and offers the following comments.

The Department is concerned about the risks of large capacity underground storage tanks and their related plumbing leaking and contaminating potable drinking water aquifers. The Department and its Commission on Water Resource Management stands united alongside Hawai'i's Congressional delegation, the Hawai'i Department of Health, and the Honolulu Board of Water Supply calling on the Navy to immediately suspend operations at the Red Hill Bulk Fuel Storage Facility and fully comply with the Emergency Order to begin the process of planning and executing the safe removal of fuel that continues to pose a threat to O'ahu's drinking water.

Prohibiting the installation or continuance of large capacity underground storage tanks systems *mauka* of the underground injection control line would mitigate the risk of contaminating potable aquifers. While the underground injection control line is established to protect drinking water aquifers, the Department notes that there may be public trust protected uses like groundwater dependent ecosystems and/or traditional and customary practices that may be impacted should contamination from underground storage tanks occur *makai* of the UIC line.

HB1801 HD1 SD1 Energy Efficiency; State Facilities SUPPORT with amendments

HB1801 HD1 SD1 would implement cost-effective energy efficiency measures for state facilities. This measure used to establish a goal to achieve at least 30% reduction in the electricity consumption of state facilities but that goal was removed with the SD1 amendment.

We need to set and establish a goal to ensure efforts are made to achieve that goal.

WHY IS THIS IMPORTANT? Energy efficiency is the most cost effective way to reduce carbon emissions associated with electricity generation and consumption. Maximizing efficiency and thereby reducing demand for power generation is a necessary component of reaching the State's clean energy and decarbonization goals.

My name is Bruce Lum, resident of Halawa, a native Hawaiian and great-grandfather to 7 great-grand children.

I am in in full agreement and support of SB2600 SD2 HD1 and SB2172 SD2. Mahalo for allowing testimony today on SB2600 SD2 HD1 and to all the legislators who have worked diligently, and stood in coalition to protect our great 50th State's, collective aquifers, and in doing such, protecting the health and livelihoods of all Hawaii's people, and guests from now and into perpetuity.

Ola I ka wai, Water is Life, and protecting our pure water source is the number one kuleana of all Hawai'i's people.

Simply put, Ernest Lau, Honolulu Board of Water Supply Manager and Chief Engineer says, "The DOH Hearings Officer at the evidentiary hearing held in December 2021 stated, ""the Red Hill Facility, as currently configured and operated, poses an imminent threat to human health and safety of the environment.""

The navy's oversight and management of the Red Hill fuel facility has a long history of failures and fuel leaks and proves the navy cannot protect the water from the leaking fuel in its antiquated fuel storage system. This crisis is real and we know it. This crisis has not been resolved and we know it. The military's negligence to adequately maintain it's decaying fuel farm positioned 100 feet above O'ahu's sole-source aquifer is a calamity that has happened several times, and recorded for more than 80 years.

In November 2021 The state ordered the U.S. Navy to halt operations at the Red Hill facility after a petroleum leak on Nov. 20 contaminated the military drinking water supply that serves some 93,000 military and civilian customers. This is the disaster that happened, and this is the disaster that all of the nation should recognize and be alarmed that the Red Hill fuel facility is now the greatest current threat to the security of Hawai'i, and all military installations drawing water from Oahu's aquifer system. Like Ernie Lau so elegantly suggests, Its the same aquifer and that means every well that supplies Oahu with drinking water is like individual straws drawing from one glass of water. Contamination at any well should be regarded a potential threat (over time) to every other well.

I leave you with this final thought: Health is fundamental to a state's and nation's security. All people need clean water to be healthy and productive. If people are unhealthy, they can't work. If they can't work, they can't contribute to the economy. If they can't contribute to the economy, the government can't provide services and infrastructure. If the government can't provide services and infrastructure, then states and nations are persistently vulnerable to security threats.

Please adopt SB2600 SD2 HD1 to secure the health security of Hawai'i and the United States of America.
