SENATE BILL NO. 2622 RELATING TO BIOFUELS

Chairpersons Gabbard and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on Senate Bill 2622. The bill establishes and appropriates moneys for a 2-year pilot project to grow biodiesel crops on the island of Molokai and requires a report to the Legislature. The Department supports the intent of this bill.

RELATING TO BIOFUELS

The Department of Budget and Finance (B&F) offers comments on this bill.

Senate Bill No. 2622 establishes a two-year pilot project within the Department of

Agriculture (DOA) to grow crops on Moloka'i for the production of biodiesel fuels;

requires the DOA to submit a report of its findings and recommendations to the

Legislature no later than 20 days prior to the convening of the 2024 Regular Session;

and appropriates \$1,500,000 in general funds in FY 23 to implement the pilot program.

B&F notes that the federal Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act requires that states receiving Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) II funds and Governor's Emergency Education Relief II funds must maintain state support for:

 Elementary and secondary education in FY 22 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for elementary and secondary education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19; and Higher education in FY 22 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for higher education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19.

Further, the federal American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act requires that states receiving ARP ESSER funds must maintain state support for:

- Elementary and secondary education in FY 22 and FY 23 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for elementary and secondary education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19; and
- Higher education in FY 22 and FY 23 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for higher education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19.

The U.S. Department of Education has issued rules governing how these maintenance of effort (MOE) requirements are to be administered. B&F will be working with the money committees of the Legislature to ensure that the State of Hawai'i complies with these ESSER MOE requirements.

Chair Gabbard, Vice Chair Nishihara, and Members of the Committee, the Hawaii State Energy Office (HSEO) offers comments on SB 2622, which establishes and appropriates moneys to the Department of Agriculture for a 2-year pilot project to grow biodiesel crops on the island of Moloka'i and requires a report to the Legislature.

HSEO's comments are guided by its mission to promote energy efficiency, renewable energy, and clean transportation to help achieve a resilient, clean energy, decarbonized economy.

Although HSEO is not named in the bill, HSEO is supportive of efforts for Moloka'i communities to identify energy opportunities that could provide local jobs and economic benefits in both the energy and agricultural sectors. The bill notes that a variety of crops can provide both fuel and other products, including food, animal feed, and inputs to cosmetics and health products. HSEO has been impressed with the efforts on Moloka'i, including those of the Moloka'i Clean Energy Hui, to identify, understand and develop a variety of energy options and economics for the island. HSEO believes that projects such as this can provide useful information and contribute to those efforts and would recommend a more flexible timeline to allow for planning, implementation, growing of the crops and reporting.

HSEO defers to the appropriate agency for comment on this matter.

HSEO supports this bill provided that its passage does not replace or adversely impact priorities indicated in the Executive Supplemental Budget.
