RELATING TO THE DIVISION OF CONSERVATION AND RESOURCES ENFORCEMENT

The Department of Budget and Finance (B&F) offers comments on this bill.

Senate Bill No. 2659, S.D. 1, appropriates an unspecified amount of general

funds for FY 23 to the Department of Land and Natural Resources for equipment,

training, and the establishment of 20.00 full-time permanent positions for the Division of

Conservation and Resources Enforcement.

B&F notes that, with respect to the general fund appropriation in this bill, the

federal Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act requires that

states receiving Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) II funds

and Governor's Emergency Education Relief II funds must maintain state support for:

 Elementary and secondary education in FY 22 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for elementary and secondary education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19; and Higher education in FY 22 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for higher education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19.

Further, the federal American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act requires that states receiving ARP ESSER funds must maintain state support for:

- Elementary and secondary education in FY 22 and FY 23 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for elementary and secondary education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19; and
- Higher education in FY 22 and FY 23 at least at the proportional level of the state's support for higher education relative to the state's overall spending, averaged over FYs 17, 18 and 19.

The U.S. Department of Education has issued rules governing how these maintenance of effort (MOE) requirements are to be administered. B&F will be working with the money committees of the Legislature to ensure that the State of Hawai'i complies with these ESSER MOE requirements.

In consideration of SENATE BILL 2659, SENATE DRAFT 1 RELATING TO THE DIVISION OF CONSERVATION AND RESOURCES ENFORCEMENT

Senate Bill 2659, Senate Draft 1 proposes to appropriate moneys to the Department of Land and Natural Resources' (Department) Division of Conservation and Resources Enforcement for purchasing equipment, funding training, and establishing twenty full-time equivalent (20.0 FTE) positions. The Department supports this bill provided that its passage does not replace or adversely impact priorities indicated in the Executive Budget request.

The Department is aware of the need to provide more proactive law enforcement work in state waters. This measure would create a dedicated marine patrol unit in each of the four counties focusing and specializing in marine patrol work. We believe this dedicated focus will establish a more frequent on-the-water presence that will enable the Department to provide greater protection of the State's marine resources, while also increasing recreational boating safety. This measure will also enhance the Department's law enforcement visibility and response in state waters.

Testimony Before The House Committee on Energy and Environmental Protection House Committee on Water and Land <u>IN SUPPORT OF SB 2659 SD1</u> March 22, 2022, 9:00AM, Room 325

My name is Kevin Chang and I am the Executive Director of <u>Kua'āina Ulu 'Auamo (or KUA)</u>. KUA works to empower grassroots rural and Native Hawaiian mālama 'āina groups to celebrate their places and pass on their traditions to better Hawai'i and achieve 'āina momona— an abundant, productive ecological system that supports community well-being.

KUA supports SB 2659 SD1 as an incremental step towards 'āina momona. This bill would appropriate funds to the Division of Conservation and Resources Enforcement of the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR-DOCARE) for purchasing equipment, funding training, and establishing 20.0 FTE positions.

KUA employs a community-driven approach that currently supports a statewide network of 36 mālama 'āina community groups collectively referred to as E Alu Pū (moving forward together), 40 fishpond projects and practitioners called the Hui Mālama Loko I'a, and a growing group of over 60 Limu practitioners and supporters called the Limu Hui. Members of these networks and future generations need a more resourced DOCARE and it is encouraging to see bills that will support this.

DOCARE officers are often the first representation community members get of DLNR. In some significant places it has long been know that there is an absence of almost any DLNR presence. A bill like this and the ongoing and growing DOCARE Academy you supported are beginning to fill that gap. More presence heightens awareness, influences behavior and also reflects the values our state and its people have wished to convey in our very constitution since 1972. Today a number of our network participants partner with DOCARE through growing community-based comanagement initiatives from mauka to makai. Indeed, as we look to the future our communities are raising the kupa'āina who want to have jobs focused on mālama 'āina. Indeed, I am sure some of the submitted applications that recently inundated and exceeded the capacity of the DOCARE Academy enrollment portal came from these young people.

The communities we work with are committed to ensuring the long-term health of our biocultural resources. They have depended on them for generations. We believe our environment, the foundation of our very existence, is about long-term investment and a vision of 'āina momona. To get there it requires among other things greater capacity, new and more innovative career pathways, mindsets, relationships and resource flows for mālama 'āina. This definitely includes a properly resourced DOCARE. Passing this bill out of your committee will open a pathway toward reaching this vision.
