Testimony of the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs

On the following measure: S.B. 2661, RELATING TO MIDWIVES

Chair Keohokalole and Members of the Committee:

My name is Lee Ann Teshima, and I am the Executive Officer of the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs' (Department) Midwives License Program. The Department appreciates the intent of and offers comments on this bill.

The purpose of this bill is to exempt persons who adhere to the core competencies of the National Aboriginal Council of Midwives and practices under the Hawaii Home Birth Elders Council from midwifery licensing requirements.

The Department recognizes the inherent difficulty in establishing regulatory standards for the practice of midwifery in the context of a diverse profession that draws from many disciplines and cultural practices. As such, the Department has been working with the Hawaii Home Birth Collective (HHBC) during the interim to discuss amendments such as those set forth in S.B. 2661. The Department defers to representatives of the HHBC to provide more information on their organization.

Previously, the Department testified before the Senate Committee on Commerce and Consumer Protection and Health on S.B. 2428 on January 24, 2020 offering comments, including but not limited to, the addition of a definition for "traditional midwife," and how this may lead to create confusion for the average consumer or public about the qualifications of the practitioner by allowing exempt individuals who do not qualify for licensure as a midwife to use titles that include the term "midwife." The Department respectfully suggests that the inclusion of a definition of "traditional midwife" may not be necessary to accomplish the intent of the bill if the proposed new exemption set forth on page 5, line 13 to page 6, line 3 can be more clearly identified.

The Department is open to continuing its dialogue with stakeholders to determine if an appropriate exemption is feasible.

Re: SB 2661 – Relating to Midwives Position: OPPOSE

The Hawai'i Section of the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (HI ACOG) represents more than 200 obstetrician/gynecologist physicians in our state, and we oppose SB 2661. This bill would create an exemption to the midwife licensure law that was recently passed by this legislature.

We support every birthing person's right to make informed decisions about their pregnancy and delivery. We believe that people should be informed that several factors are critical to reducing maternal and perinatal mortality and achieving favorable community birth outcomes. These factors include appropriately identifying circumstances that may make community birth riskier for either mom or baby; the availability of a midwife whose education and licensure meet International Confederation of Midwives' (ICM) Global Standards for Midwifery Education, or a physician practicing obstetrics within an integrated and regulated health system; ready access to consultation; and access to safe and timely transport to a hospital.

In April 2015, our national organization endorsed the ICM education and training standards and has since been advocating that ICM standards be baseline criteria for midwife licensure in the United States. The ICM definitions are accepted throughout the world across 6 regions, by over 130 member-organizations, and by U.S. midwifery professional organizations. This exemption, as written, does not meet those requirements. We do not support unlicensed providers being given authority to prescribe and administer medications, to order and interpret diagnostic tests and ultrasounds, or to perform cancer screening, which are some of the competencies of the National Aboriginal Council of Midwives (a First Nations group of midwives from across Canada).

We also acknowledge the critical importance of protecting and preserving indigenous traditions and birthing practices. <u>The current midwife licensure law already has an exemption for practitioners of Native Hawaiian birth practices</u>.

The majority of births occur without major complications, whether they occurred in the hospital or out of the hospital. But we know that complications occur, and it is critical that when they occur, the providers attending the birth are trained and competent to recognize it. In a recently published

study in the *Journal of Midwifery and Women's Health*,¹ investigators looked at records from the neonatal intensive care unit at Kapi'olani Medical Center of newborns who had been admitted for hypoxic ischemic encephalopathy – a brain injury that occurs during the birth process – and compared them to Hawai'i statewide birth data. The newborns in the neonatal ICU with this brain injury were three times more likely to have been planned home births compared to the normal neonates. This emphasizes that complications during birth occur, and it is critical to have trained, licensed healthcare providers capable of recognizing and managing these complications wherever that birth is occurring.

We understand and appreciate the important role of midwives, as defined by the midwife licensure law, in healthcare delivery, especially to rural and underserved areas of Hawai'i. We were pleased that the Hawai'i State Legislature recognized the importance of midwives, and the rigorous training they have undertaken and expertise they hold, by granting them the opportunity to be licensed health care professionals. Licensure of midwives was critical to making community (or out of hospital) births in Hawai'i safer, and for future efforts at promoting a more integrated maternal health care system, similar to those seen in western Europe where maternal and neonatal outcomes exceed those in the U.S.

Testimony of the Hawai'i Home Birth Collective (SB 2661) January 28, 2022 HTH Committee 1:00 p.m.

Aloha Chair Keohokalole and Members of the Health Committee,

My name is Kristie Duarte, and I am the President of the Hawai'i Home Birth Collective (HiHBC) and the Chair of the Hawai'i Home Birth Task Force, created by Act 32 in 2019. HiHBC strongly supports this bill but offers comments in regards to the regulation of traditional midwives, definitional terms and the safety of traditional midwives.

The purposes of SB 2661 is to: (1) address Act 32, Session Laws of Hawaii 2019, which stated that "the legislature notes that practicing midwifery according to this Act does not impede one's ability to incorporate or provide cultural practices" and (2) create an exemption in chapter 457J, Hawaii Revised Statutes, for traditional midwives from the current midwifery licensing law.

<u>Traditional Midwives will become illegal come July 1, 2023</u>. This bill will create a way for a traditional midwife to continue to practice under certain regulations. In the Hawai'i Home Birth Task Force Report, all twelve task force members agree unanimously on the following findings:

"Traditional midwives currently exist in Hawai'i, they define themselves as Traditional Midwives and are in demand by the communities they serve. Traditional Midwives are recognized and defined by the Midwives Alliance of North America, and states such as Oregon and Canada formally recognize and perpetuate their practices by creating pathways other than licensure to allow Traditional midwives to serve their communities.

Each woman has the right to choose where and with whom she gives birth."

<u>HiHBC will provide oversight and regulation of Traditional Midwives through the development of</u> <u>common standards, accountability measures, and disclosure requirements.</u> Traditional Midwives must adhere to the National Aboriginal Council of Midwives (NACM) Core Competencies and practice under the Hawai'i Home Birth Elders Council.

In addition, membership with HiHBC requires Traditional Midwives to provide informed consent/disclosure forms to clients, home birth statistics, and have accountability through participation in peer review and the process of the complaint review and grievance mechanism with the Hawai'i Home Birth Elders <u>Council</u>. Consumers can know that their traditional midwife participates in peer review, and that if a concern is raised, there is a platform for discussion and follow up. A form is available on our website for the community and consumers to fill out when there is a complaint or grievance. Our traditional midwives are also required to report any type of complication or transport. After completion of the grievance and complaint review, the Elders will determine the disciplinary action which can include suspension, probation, and even membership removal. Failure to comply with any of the membership requirements will also lead to removal of membership and their exemption.

<u>Definitional Terms</u>- It is necessary to keep in the language of SB 2661 a definition of the traditional midwife because traditional midwives are who HiHBC is regulating and providing oversight of.

<u>Safety of Traditional Midwives</u>- Hawai'i Home Birth Collective data on registered Traditional Midwives shows no maternal or infant deaths in the 5 years that data has been collected. <u>In the most recent two years</u>, <u>our traditional midwives have had no infant transfers, therefore there has been no abnormal conditions</u> <u>of the newborn, no assisted ventilation necessary and no NICU admission</u>. There were 2 maternal transfers each year, one for pain relief, yet both with good outcomes and follow up care from the traditional midwife after discharge. Safety is a priority in HiHBC and our traditional midwife data is required to be collected from traditional midwives. This data is only a piece of the Department of Health data, as our data is specific to HiHBC Traditional Midwives who are practicing, not just home births from all midwives (licensed and exempt).

<u>Safety for the Community</u>- Finding a pathway for these traditional midwives to be able to remain legal past 2023 must be a priority to keep birth practitioners above ground and giving the community the ability to transfer as needed, and not be afraid or make decisions that put themselves in danger, and discourage families from birthing alone. Traditional Midwives serve our communities across all islands, many in rural areas and their care cannot become illegal.

Aloha Kākou,

Ho'opae Pono Peace Project is a cultural peace resource focused on building cooperative solutions in the context of Aloha 'Āina, human rights, and genuine perpetuation of Indigenous well-being and cultural continuity.

We support SB 2661 strongly. Without the exemptions provided in this measure, important traditional birthing practices will soon be illegal. This would either cause cessation of these important practices, or force them underground. Either of these scenarios creates real danger for those who rely upon these practices for safe, knowledgeable, culturally competent assistance during birth.

Without the exemptions in SB 2661, Kanaka Maoli families, and therefore the endangered Indigenous birthing practices of Hawai'i, are seriously impacted. There is much confusion over this, because Kanaka Maoli practitioners appeared to have been eligible for exemption under Act 32 (2019); while there is theoretical ability to achieve protection of Indigenous practices through a complex administrative process that has yet to be achieved by anyone, the realization of the requirements of this exemption (recognition by or convening of a Kupuna Council under Papa Ola Lokahi) have been unrealistic for most traditional Kanaka Maoli traditional practitioners. While well intended, a fundamental problem of this model is the burden on traditional practitioners (many of whom are struggling just to survive in the current brutal colonial paradigm in which they must continue their ancient practices while paying exorbitant prices to live on their own lands) to achieve an extremely high bar of bureaucratic hoop-jumping. Another problem is the traditional cultural prohibition

amongst many lines of ancient Indigenous practice, against external certification or sharing of kapu knowledge.

In addition, and most importantly, it is critical to remember that the primary practitioner of Kanaka Maoli birthing practices is not the midwife, but the **mother**. Young Indigenous mothers reviving the sacred birthing traditions of their ancestors have the inherent right to be attended by anyone they deem pono, regardless of ancestry or any external impositions such as legal erasure of traditional attendant qualifications by government. However, this creates a difficult legal position for everyone under Act 32 (similar to the pre-1998 illegality of midwifery in Hawai'i, during which I must note that I myself bore my first child in Hālawa Valley in 1993, and was fortunate to be attended by an excellent traditional Midwife, Medrakanoeonapua, who literally faced down State Sheriffs and risked arrest to ensure the safety of my baby and me, as well as performing traditional resuscitation techniques that even the most qualified EMS would not have known, and would certainly have arrived too late to apply). In practical terms, the state of illegality under Act 32 creates a dangerous block to information sharing in a hospital transport scenario (note: before 1998, the illegality of midwifery meant that most hospital-transported mothers would not disclose any details of labor at all, for fear of persecution of themselves and their traditional attendants).

It needs to be remembered that while out-of-hospital births are statistically as safe as hospital births (and probably significantly safer during the current pandemic), accessibility of hospital transport is still a critical part of that safety. Ideally, a transport should happen before a situation becomes a true emergency, and transports are indeed often advised by the midwife long before they are accepted by the mother— a basic reality that is poorly understood on a systemic or medical level, where blame is generally placed on the practice of midwifery whenever a delayed transport results in an emergency. Previous traumatic hospital experiences and deep cultural or religious beliefs may be part of this maternal reluctance, but the most significant variable is often fear of judgment or of being "in trouble" for birthing "out of the box" in the first place, possibly resulting in potentially discriminatory systemic repercussions - a very real threat to ethnicities who face known, ongoing and disproportionate parental persecution through the historically colonial Child Welfare system. Clearly, this risk of transport delays is amplified if the traditional attendant is also forced into practicing illegally.

In addition to Kanaka Maoli, birthing practices of all cultures in Hawai'i deserve protection. What about traditions from Africa, Micronesia, or Amish peoples? Every mother deserves the availability of skilled traditions of her own culture, wherever these are available, and the truth is that many very knowledgeable traditional birth practitioners simply do not have access to the extremely inaccessible and very "Western" training requirements laid out in Act 32. Again, this forces a terrible choice between extermination of traditional cultural practices or those practices being once again forced underground, as they were prior to 1998, into the shadows of illegality and birth under very real threat of persecution. This is not right.

Birthing practices are one of the oldest women's rights issues in history, all over the world. Excessive regulation of midwives has historically been linked to misogyny, racism, and Indigenous extermination. We need to turn this history around.

This is a serious situation. I request that you please mitigate it immediately. While it will not rectify all of the problematic aspects of Act 32, SB 2661 is a good place to start.

For these reasons and more, Ho'opae Pono Peace Project asks that this measure be passed by this committee.

We are available as a peace resource for continued dialogue in the building of genuine understanding based on true respect, peace, and pono. Please contact me at any time.

Dear Senator Jarrett Keohokalole, Senator Rosalyn Baker and committee members:

Midwives Alliance of Hawai'i (MAH) would like to provide the following comments regarding SB2661.

As the bill reads, it seeks to exempt a category of birth attendants who identify as traditional midwives. Much of the discussion around the need for this amendment to HRS 457-J has been to ensure protections of Native Hawaiian practices; and we 100% support ensuring Native Hawaiian practices are protected. We do note that Native Hawaiian practices are protected within the Hawai'i State Constitution and are therefore not impacted by any professional licensing law; these protections were redundantly listed as exempt within the Midwives licensure law HRS 457-J to reiterate that State Constitution protections cannot be construed otherwise. This means that HRS 457-J is not in need of

further exemptions. If the intent of SB2661 is to protect Native Hawaiian practices, our comment is SB2661 does not accomplish this intent.

At this time Hawai'i has issued 23 licenses to midwives under HRS 457-J. Midwives Alliance of Hawai'i (MAH) supports the continued licensure of midwives and MAH supports the International Confederation of Midwives definitions, statements, and core documents. We acknowledge and recognize that within SB2661 there is a reference to the National Aboriginal Council of Midwives core competencies. We are sharing that the document that the NACM created, titled *Indigenous Midwifery Knowledge and Skills: A Framework of Competencies* states they often receive questions such:

- What makes Indigenous midwives different from non-Indigenous midwives?
- How do we revitalize and bring the practice of Indigenous midwifery back to our community, by our own people?
- How can we better support Indigenous midwifery students to learn their cultural midwifery knowledge?

The "NACM undertook a process to articulate what distinguishes Indigenous midwifery and developed a tool to use this information. The goals are to support the return of birth and Indigenous midwifery to Indigenous communities through local education options and to support Indigenous midwifery students and midwives to strengthen their Indigenous midwifery skills, knowledge, and abilities." The document they created of a competency framework was intended to guide indigenous midwifery. The NACM further shares that aboriginal midwives in Canada have the opportunity to attend a 4 year university degree program or one of 2 community programs. Upon completion of a university degree program and one of the 2 community programs, aboriginal midwives are eligible to be a Registered Midwife (which is our equivalent to a Licensed Midwife in Hawai'i). Both of the community programs are three years in length and also meet the minimum International Confederation of Midwives global standards. We share this to acknowledge that there is still formal training, registration for the majority of aboriginal midwives in Canada, and accountability.

What we recognize within the edits of HRS 457-J is that the definition of Traditional Midwife does not indicate that the person practicing be Native Hawaiian, and if the intent is to extend it to other indigenous people, there is no definition for who this would include. We have concerns about non-indigenous persons utilizing a competency framework developed by aboriginal people for aboriginal people as the basis to self determine they are exempt from demonstrating minimum competencies of midwifery.

Further, we do not support unlicensed persons being given authority through the reference to the NACM competency framework to order diagnostic tests, perform and interpret ultrasounds, provide and interpret genetic screenings, conduct cancer screenings, and prescribe and administer medication.

Midwives Alliance of Hawai'i has concerns related to transparency to consumers who believe if one calls themself a midwife that they have certain skill sets and have been trained to adequately assess, manage and provide treatment for conditions related to birth, family planning and women's health. As SB2661 is currently written, a Traditional Midwife requires no training or license but is granted full practice authority by the State without oversight.

Midwives Alliance of Hawai'i offers these comments in hopes that the Legislature will acknowledge that Native Hawaiian practices are protected under the State of Hawai'i Constitution, and ask themselves: What are we trying to accomplish? Who are we trying to protect? What is left to be addressed within HRS 457-J that cannot be accomplished within administration rules?

Aloha mai kakou,

Mahalo for the opportunity to once again testify on this important issue of preserving traditional midwifery in the State of Hawai'i and beyond. Particularly in the times of Covid, our ability to serve our communities has become even more so relevant. As we are living in a current maternal and infant health care crisis, it is imperative that we return to culturally relevant and traditional practices that have continued to thrive even today, reguardless of massive efforts for generations to assimilate and oppress people of color and our traditional methods of health care. Now, we are very grateful for western intervention when needed, and collaborative care is really our goal, but women who are hapai are not sick, they are actually in a heightened state of wellness if properly nourished and care for. The amount of love and dedication we spend with each ohana pays off, and we see it in our outcomes. The data will show, for instance in 20 years of attending births at home in Maui, I have NEVER lost a mom or baby, and never had a maternal or infant transfer to Oahu under my care! We care and have relationships with our families and spend hours to prepare, educate, and empower them in this process. We look at birth as a ceremony, a right of passage and treat it as such. We were trained by our elders in apprenticeship model and our elders and community hold us accountable, especially on a small island. We were trained to have integrity and heart in everything we do. It is not a profession but a kuleana to pass to the next generation. We don't want to use pharmaceuticals, or bill insurance, so becoming licensed is not a part of who we are. Not to mention that certification and training required by the law is expensive and NOT available in our STATE of Hawai'i!!! I have been apprenticing the next generation for years, and they have just barely began to attend births as a certain level of competency and readiness is VERY important to all of us. I do hope that our cultural practitioners training to be traditional midwives have the opportunity to continue the good work that those of us that have been practicing and preparing them have done for generations. I hope that my daughters have the opportunity to follow in mamas footsteps one day, some of them have already been to births with me in the past. I am a traditional midwife, a mother of 5 homebirth babies and an advocate always of reproductive justice in Hawai'i. I will become illegal in 2023 if this legislation does not pass. Hundreds of ohana will not have choice for me to continue to serve them if this legislation does not pass. If safety is the goal, please PASS this

legislation, before people start to turn to free birthing options as we have seen grow recently instead of having the midwives of their choice attend. Birth is an innate process, and if a women is properly supported throughout her pregnancy, and low risk, the statistics show that HOMEBIRTH is SAFE and optimal even over hospital outcomes. There is a midwife for everyone, please ensure that traditional midwives continue to be part of our families options as we have been for generations.... WE are the ORIGINAL MIDWIVES....

	The Pacific Birth Collective strongly supports SB 2661, a bill that exempts traditional midwives from midwifery licensing requirements.		
	PBC serves women, families, and various service providers throughout Hawaii. We support autonomy in birth choice, whatever that choice may be. We support this bill because as a birth organization working throughout the Hawaiian islands, we personally know the positive impact our traditional midwives have on maternal health in our communities. This bill would be a good step toward respecting cultural traditions, protecting the autonomy of women and families, and not policing women's reproductive choices.		

We recognize that midwife licensure was a positive step toward better maternity care for Hawai'i's families. Though there were good intentions behind the original bill, the exclusion of traditional midwives is rooted in historical injustices that cannot go unrecognized and unremedied. For too long, Native Hawaiian and other cultural traditions and practices have been controlled, dismissed, and lost to history.

Families in Hawaii always have and will continue to seek out prenatal, birth and

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postpartum support from traditional midwives as they have for many generations. To take that choice away from them is oppressive and infantilizing.

Hawai'i's women deserve autonomy in their choice of childbirth provider. Choosing where and with whom to give birth is a basic human right. Families in Hawai'i have always sought the care of traditional midwives, and it is essential that they are able to continue doing so.

Continuing to regulate women's reproductive health by limiting their choices in prenatal and birth care is not safe, because women will continue to access these services even if it is not legal or recognized by the state of Hawaii.

There are many good reasons to support traditional midwifery. One that shouldn't be overlooked is because it will happen anyway, whether or not it is legal. Families already utilize the expertise that these women offer, and they will continue to seek this care even if it goes "underground." Much like abortion, it is safer for our communities if these practices are recognized and respected, especially if transfer does need to occur to a medical setting at anytime during pregancy, birth or postpartum.

The idea that maintaining traditional practices is somehow at odds with health and good outcomes is not supported by the research, and these ideas take root in racism and xenophobia. Many traditional practices stand true to the scientific standards of the day. Time and again, when Native Hawaiian nutrition, social support structures, and ways of life are studied through the Western scientific model, they are proven beneficial. Perhaps more research around the practices of pale keiki and traditional midwives in Hawai'i would also prove this. We don't know because this research doesn't yet exist. A suggested approach is to improve data collection practices in order to create and pass truly informed legislation that would benefit women and families in Hawai'i.

Many women in Hawai'i seek care outside of the medical setting for childbirth. Reasons are many, but some cite safety. Maternal health outcomes in Hawai'i are on par with American maternal health outcomes, which is to say they are not good. <u>Cesarean rates in Hawai'i are 26.8%</u>, with one out of ten babies being born preterm. The <u>WHO reports</u> that 1 in 6 women in the US experience mistreatment during childbirth, and their findings suggest that mistreatment is experienced more frequently



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by women of color, when birth occurs in hospitals, and among those with social, economic or health challenges. <u>Another survey</u> of over 2,000 doulas, nurses, and childbirth educators found that almost 90% had witnessed a healthcare provider conducting procedures "without giving a woman a choice or time to consider," and nearly 60% had observed providers performing procedures "explicitly against the wishes of the woman." Numerous studies show that women, particularly women of color, are less likely to have their medical concerns taken seriously by doctors.

These are just some of the reasons that women seek alternatives to medical care when considering their options for childbirth. To not exempt traditional midwives would further erode their options.

According to the Hawai'i State <u>Department of Health</u>, 38% of women in Hawai'iare suspected to experience postpartum depression (PPD), with Native Hawaiian, Pacific Islander and Filipino women experiencing higher rates. There is a documented link between PPD and birth trauma. Continuing to limit the choices in prenatal care and birth for Hawaii women will not improve these statistics. Hawaii's women deserve autonomy in their choices of birth provider.

We respectfully ask that you pass SB 2661 to exempt traditional midwives from midwifery licensing requirements.

Thank you all for bringing SB2661 to the table and working to ensure a safe Hawai'i. I submit testimony today in full support of SB 2661. As a home birth mother, student, Maui community member, and advocate for safe autonomous birthing choices I am deeply invested in seeing Midwifery thrive at home, in hospitals, and birth centers. In particular the continued practice of Traditional Midwifery is essential as an option of care for families in our diverse community. The practice of Traditional Midwifery at the very core supports the traditional process of birth and family continuity. The medicalization and white supremacist take over of woman's health has shown to be catastrophic. America is the most dangerous and most expensive place to give birth in all developed nations and specifically for black and brown bodies. The growth of Midwifery in all capacities is an answer to the current maternal health crisis. Midwifery wisdom outside of the medical model holds keys that can have impactful change on a systemic level in our community. Yet the collaborative care of all people that work in the maternal health field is the goal. The continued division of care providers is part of what keeps women at such high risk. Midwives expertise is on well woman care and should not be compared to Obstetrical expertise nor should medicalized certification be treated as superior to Traditional practitioners. The goal is safety for all consumers of Maternal Health care. Allowing for the exemptions and acknowledgment of Traditional Midwifery to thrive can be steadily achieved as SB2661 is passed.

The debate of legalizing and criminalizing a life giving role such as Midwifery should make us all alarmed as a population. This is not only about the rights of Midwives in Hawai'i this is about the lives of Birthing people and a growing family. Midwifery as a practice is not that of wealth, or boards, or of who is right, or power trips, Midwifery is an age old traditional accountable support system that has been in existence I would imagine since the beginning of birthing humans. As I think about all the supporting evidence and work of Midwives and trying to prove the importance of Traditional Midwifery I am infused with sadness and anger. The Obstetrical and Genealogical practices did not stem from saving lives for sacred protection but of male dominated control and capitalism. It is well documented that this practice came from the ability to control two people at once, establish care for the family, and for capital gain while maintaining racial disparities among the population. If it was about safety, then it would see the role of the Midwife and the autonomy that it takes for someone to give birth. In the past there was collaborative care between doctors and midwives but greed, population control and racism destroyed this collaborative care. OB's never and still don't have time for traditional birth and so they have created interventions to 'speed things up' and create more money in the process while working to discredit and annihilate Midwives. Obstetrical care is a life saving medical practice and should be honored and utilized as such. Just as colonization can try to erase the memory of

what it was like before this has also affected the birthing space. Traditional Postpartum is not associated as that of depression but that of healing and nourishment. Traditional Midwifery is the lamp post that still is walking through the war on the uterus and is still standing strong. Licensure as clearly stated it is awarded by the controlling state and they own the title "Midwife' and can take it away at any time. But the fact remains a Midwife and the training can never be taken away. It is their wisdom regardless of what the state and education system wants to claim on their livelihood and calling. A midwife is a servant of her community and future generations

The common debate about legalization upon the services of Midwifery is one that leaves out the care for the birthing person as the main focus of the conversation. To have Midwifery be defined by boards and states is to create a monopoly and homogenized view of Birth within the context of a patriarchal system that has been destroying and controlling the uterus for far too long. The collaborative care for birthing people has not been the focus of the conversation in the mainstream and those that are in control of the narrative. Because the bureaucracy of the systems and the out right usage of women as chattel for breeding has been a focus and tool used in the scope of regulated reproductive health care. What we see in this is inhumane treatment and the lifetime of issue, disparities and sometimes death of too many women and children. Given this issue of Licensing in the guise of safety is a global issue and shows many faces based on cultures and government controlled systems. The continued argument comes from people who create and uphold regulations for Midwifery say safety as the main reason for regulations. Yet they do not discuss the violence in the creation of their system and the sheer fact that 31% of people have c-sections. This is a procedure that was used as the last method to save a life yet now it is normalized and seen as a safety measure, or imperialistic savior complex. If this percent of a population is in danger of death why are we not looking at the true reasons for this and the crisi that it is. Intervention should not be the main method of a doctor's oath to do no harm. Yet just as the blanket of obstetrical violence and abusive neglectful relationships are somehow normalized to cut open bodies as routine but not give proper prenatal care or autonomous laboring support. Obstetrical methods are for emergencies, that is the training. Midwives are trained to support birthing people in pregnancy, birth and postpartum and keep them at low risk by the impeccable healthcare provided.

I find the history of reproductive violence and the fight for reproductive justice run parallel. The ones that tell the story are often the one who holds control and often create a narrative based off of fear. It is similar to the idea of critical race theory and why it is so important that truth begins to be part of the education system. Once truth is part of education the scope of licensing and laws can begin to change. The education, medical, and government models are actually steeped deep in white violence/silence and control of bodies in society not for the well being of all. The Uterus is one of the most powerful and mystical in all human creation. Why are violations normalized? Traditional Midwifery has sat at the feet of wonder, observations and care of this precious gift. The education of apprenticeship and observations in the generations are accountable, autonomous, and without end.

When one looks at Reproductive health in America and Hawai'i since around 1900 we see Midwifery was a standard of practice in all people, in all cultures, and the care is unique to it's particular people with intersecting lines of Midwifery care. We see in Hawai'i the strong relations that family and genealogy play in almost every facet of life. The Pale Keiki was there to protect the child, the mother, the family, and birth was a normal sacred way of life way. There were many practitioners that supported the birthing person and collaborative care with other practitioners was normal. Regulation was based on many aspects of life, not just one path and not

based on a written test that gives one a piece of paper to certify. This is a ridiculous notion within a traditional framework of life. Birth was a normal and intense process that walked the line of life and death. Birth is a normal physiological process our bodies were born to potentially fulfill. When we look at the time line of regulation of traditional health care practices in Hawai'i we can see the decline of population and actually close to annihilation of Kanaka Maoli. When colonized disease and colonized medical ideas come to a nation it is clear destruction. Papa Ola Lokahi has created an amazing time line that shows the regulation of lomi, lā'au lapa'au, universal health care, creation of Maternal care, population decline, and how Hawai'i continued to try to create solutions among the power control and death that was infiltrating by foreigners. Various other facts show that regulation wasn't about health as it was used for American benefit in the method of genocide. We can see under the care of Haole medicine the ali'i were wiped out at very young ages, fertility was also challenged. There is no where that shows that regulation of traditional health care practices achieved the goals of health but they do follow the path of sickness. When one talks about alternative practices we see that Midwifery is considered in this category as an alternative to the standards of care. We can see that this clearly shows who is in control of licensing, state regulations, care standards. Standard systems do not include these wellness models of health as one would see in a traditional society. Health and well being was the goal of the Hawaiian generations. Current Government defines what is the scope of practice for practitioners and the definition of medicine based on their systems.

The Hawaiian Kingdom was trying to establish systems to create new health care systems to deal with the crisis that foreigners brought. The American way then and now does not focus on health care but focuses on sick care. Regulations set a pathway for destruction versus the models of health in a Hawaiian view point. I bring this up to state the correlation of Traditional Midwifery and the current regulations that are trying to be implemented, It will follow the same line. It is not about the safety of a person because that truthful investigation would look very different.

The process of pregnancy is to be supported as a natural process that cannot be manipulated, and controlled without autonomy if safe outcomes for the generations is the goal.

There were various steps in America to establish and regulate Medical care. In 1894 The Massachusetts Act, The Medical Practice Act was created to define obstetrics and licensing of physicians. Other states then followed this method. The regulation and practice of Midwifery in the North versus the South looked different and was so because of racism and male domination in medicine. Deirdre Cooper Owens in her book Medical Bondage clearly demonstrates the systems of Obstetrical care and unrestricted violence upon the black female body for medical purposes. "The Father of Gynecology " Marian Sims is a great example of the perpetual violence that the education systems still teaches but yet leaves out the truth of the continued harm in the systems. Traditional Black Midwives were abundant in the southern states with thousands in each state. With the public health conversation always stated in the guise of health we see the Sheppard-Towner Maternity and Infancy Act of 1921 is again following this same trajectory. It was created using federal funding to address health concerns in the family way. What this did was directly affect the lives of Midwives, the care they provided, and the families in which they served. It was run in the model of white narrative which looked to control the "other" without holding personal accountability to the social crisis that the supremacist systems had on the lives of the people and society. It was racist at the core and created for control. Again it is regulations based on problems that create more problems that do not create modalities to change and provide actual health for society. If these regulations were for solutions America would not be holding

the title as the most dangerous country to give birth in all of the developed nations and the most expensive. We can see across the board laws that have caused harm and have helped. This is an endless debate given the perspective that one sits from. Yet basic human needs are fundamental, birth is foundational, and the prosperity of a nation rests in the health of the people and land. Hawai'i is exceptional in its potential. The grace of Medical provisions is a blessing and the care of Obstetrical doctors and Midwives should be praised. Educational pathways are a blessing to every society and this can not be highlighted enough. Yet what must be recognized is Traditional methods of healing and education are essential to the well being of society. One focus is sure to divide and maintain sickness.

We can look to Corona Virus to show. Collectively we are all invested in the end of this virus and the strength of immunity. There are different focuses and the system has focused on vaccination as the method. Yet why are we not making sure that people have clean water , immune boosting herbs, and healthy food at a pharmacy. Collaborative care in a society that truly wants health as the outcome must look to collaborative care and methods. Laws that force one method of health care or pathway have shown in every capacity to divide and increase disparities often by race, and economic impact.

WE must increase Midwifery as a normalized practice. To take that word and method of care into normalization. Hawai'i should and can continue create pathways of education so that local residents can engage in this calling and profession. If Midwifery is criminalized then every person choosing that path will have to leave Hawai'i to gain that medicalized certification, or only have foreigners moving here to provide care and precept. If the Department of Commerce and Health see the value of Midwifery then they should work towards options of having full specturm Midwifery care and education be accesible here in Hawai'i. The Midwifery bill without these Traditional Midwifery exemptions will criminalize an age old practice that is coming to light out the destructive force of colonization. The Midwifery Bill without these exemptions would uphold the racist and patriarchal violence of the current medical monopoly. Midwives of all modalities are needed now more than ever to stop this public health crisis we are currently in. The role of the Traditional Midwife is essential in this process and SB2661 is essential. When we look at regulations, education of midwifery, and the care for pregnant people we can see the line of experimentation, population control, eugenics, capitalism, decline of long term health, and war upon the uterus in many ways. It may seem extreme to place all of this within the line of this conversation of Midwifery regulation but I think it is absolutely the forefront of this conversation. Eugenics is a conversation many people do not want to have and often want to disassociate from this. But Eugenics has been long used in America and other nations in the medical & education system. We see in Hawai'i the colonized destruction of the Hawaiian's physical bodies and lifeways and then the repopulation based on commerce, occupation, and growth. The American government has long used regulations for the benefit of their goals, not the benefit of the whole. The days are done that women's health is used for capitalistic and experimental purposes based on sickness not as sacred people being provided health care. Regulations change birth from a communal process to a medical one. Traditional Midwives should have many seats at the table and stake in the growth of Midwifery here in Hawai'i. I stand with the support of the Maui County Committee on the Status of Women, Traditional practitioners, and Birthing people in support of SB2661. Collaborative safe care for birthing people must be the focus. I urge for the active role in the state and health care providers to see the crucial need for Traditional Midwifery to thrive. SB2661 is about transforming the Maternal public health crisis we are in and Traditional Midwives hold a key that must be upheld.

May we all continue to work to bring accessible Midwifery care to Hawai'i. Know that when Traditional midwifery is honored then all Midwives are honored. The public health experiment of criminalizing and demonizing Midwifery must end as we have seen obstetrical focused birth isn't working. Collaborative care between OB's and Midwives was normal before legislation and certifications. Capitalism and Racism were the main reasons for certification and are still in charge. As we can see looking at boards and the education models, they are still teaching narrow racist ideas and perpetuating medical violence while harming students and consumers of healthcare. We see in H.R. 6142/s.3424 Black Maternal health Momnibus that institutional and systemic change is happening. Let us work to be in the momentum that this nation needs to bring us out of this maternal health crisis that began with white supremacist laws and violence. Traditional Midwifery is a cornerstone to bringing Maternal health to this nation again. Thank you for being part of the change out of the dark ages of capitalistic medical monopolies. Please pass SB2661. Trust in the work you are doing and let us all work for the safety and normalcy of traditional birth in Hawai'i and globally! I urge you to pass SB 2661 and together we can work to end this maternal health crisis. Thank you so much for your time and the important work that you do. I full-heartedly SUPPORT SB 2661, as it allows choice--a fundamental, legal right for women and humans in our country--for families regarding their reproductive health and birthing choices and experiences. It gives families autonomy and options for the normal, physiological event that is birth.

SB2661 allows people from our community to continue their cultural birth practices without fear of being legally reprimanded, and allows us to stay in our communities to practice, rather than having to uproot our lives to get the western education that is valued over indigenous knowledge. I can say from personal experience as a student at National College of Midwifery that they do not and can not understand what birthing in a community like Maui is like, and therefore --while the western knowledge I am receiving is valuable--it does not correlate with the world in which I am practicing birthwork here on Maui.

Thank you for taking the time to review my testimony.

I support Bill 2661 as written.

Acknowledgment of traditional midwifery passed through apprenticeship is a cultural and spiritual practice more than a medical one. It is my life's work to ensure that these practices can continue to be passed down in my home community on Maui.

I am a bachelor trained registered nurse at UH Manoa and practiced as a Labor, Delivery, Postpartum nurse at Castle Medical Center for five years. left the hospital to apprentice with elder midwives in my home community on Maui who had been practicing for more than 30 years. The years that had the opportunity to work with them supporting out of hospital birth gave me insights and a foundation in my work that I would not have been able to gain from the current law's requirement to attend school on the continental US.

Hawai'i is a unique blend of many cultures and traditions which honors our diversity. For the past 3 years I have been working with a traditionally trained Pale Keiki, midwife on the island of Maui. We do not advertise our practice and only attend a small number of births and yet we are still inundated with requests through word of mouth referral. We disclose to our families that the best medical care is provided through dual care with an obstetrician and going into the hospital early if any type of medical care is needed.

We develop close personal relationships with the families we work with and spend many hours getting to know them and helping them to reconnect with their own traditions of health and wellness. Traditional midwifery honors the sacred aspects of childbearing as a rite of passage that requires personal responsibility for the birthing woman and partner over their own experience. After years of working in the hospital I can say that the work we do is essential and safe!

Traditional midwives are not an authority and we do not identify ourselves as medical professionals. We do not replace the need for medical providers, OB's, Nurses, or licensed

professional midwives. As traditional practitioners we are guides and coaches as women navigate the complex and individual experience of having a baby. seek collaboration and community involvement in all aspects of a woman's care. Please support this pathway as one that can help to correct some of the devastating disparities experienced by women of color in our community!!

Hello my name is Jordan Hocker. I live on the island of Maui, I am a transplant and I have been trained as a postpartum doula and in the past have donated my time to families. I have a six year old daughter who was born at home. Today, I'm asserting the right of traditional midwifery to exist. I'd like to assert that the power of intergenerational learning, community service and cultural knowledge not be diminished via legislature. Unfortunately, Act 32, signed into law on April 30th 2019 does just that. The licensure requirements put forth are not available to all equally, with education requiring mainland travel, over \$40,000 tuition, not including licensing fees and time spent away from their families and the communities they serve. Furthermore, Act 32 criminalizes traditional midwives in Hawai'i, requiring that they stop calling themselves midwives regardless of their competence and years of experience. We cannot claim to care about the health and safety of all women but then cripple the competent practitioners serving some women, particularly those of Hawaiian and Polynesian women and babies whose mortality rates in the hospital are appalling and indicative of systemic racism faced by Black families in the US. Low Risk Birth with a traditional midwife is shown to be as safe as hospital birth and the cultural competency therein can save lives.

It should be also noted that it is not acceptable for any piece of law to violate the state constitution, but it can easily be argued that Act 32 does violate Article 12, sec 7, which protects cultural rights of Hawaiians a designation that should include birthing rights.

Now good news! There is a solution in the form of SB2661, a bill for Act 32. It carves out proper distinctions for traditional midwives and acknowledges current licensure laws do not meet the need of the islands, nor do they keep all birthing persons safe. I implore this body to recognize that now, more than ever, birthing persons deserve a choice of where and with whom we birth. Supporting SB2661 and the hard work from the community to continue to push for safe birth for all, would not only be putting Act 32 on the right side of the law, but it would serve as a step in the right direction to mend the reality that Traditional Hawaiian midwives have faced discrimination and disenfranchisement via licensure as far back as the 1930's. It is time to go forward, together, for the health of all women and families because when all birthing people are served adequately we all benefit. Thank you.

Aloha,

I am a newly graduated midwife, having just completed a 4-year MEAC accredited Bachelor's of Science in Midwifery degree program while living on Maui. I believe I am the first person to finish a MEAC midwifery degree while living on a neighbor island. I am the owner of Maui Midwifery.

I can speak from my own experience on how this type of MEAC program, which is required for licensure according to the original bill, is not at all accessible for most people living in Hawaii due to cost, a lack of qualified preceptors, and travel barriers. In fact, anyone not from a privileged background would find it next to impossible.

I strongly support SB 2661, a bill that exempts traditional midwives from MEAC education and midwifery licensing requirements.

I do so based on 3 clinical ethical principles:

 Justice: Historically in the US, in many cases, midwives' legitimation as providers through licensing rested on deliberately differentiating ourselves as "better educated," more "hygienic," and/or more "scientific" than others [midwives of color], while at the same time extracting and appropriating traditional midwifery knowledge, but excluding midwives of color from paths to "legitimate" education and licensure (Goode, 2014). The state of Hawaii is following this blueprint, and it is an act of violence. MEAC schools align with Western style of education that values medicalized midwifery practice, which does not represent traditional midwifery values. Traditional and indiginous pathways to midwifery are no less valid or valuable, although colonialism tells us differently.

- 2. Autonomy: Hawai'i's pregnant people deserve autonomy in their choice of childbirth provider. Choosing where and with whom to give birth is a basic human right. Families in Hawai'i have always sought the care of traditional midwives, and it is essential that they are able to continue doing so.
- 3. Nonmaleficence, first do no harm: Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islanders are dying in childbirth at a higher rate compared white women, and Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander babies are twice as likely to die as white babies (CDC, 2021). Maternal and infant mortality disparities between racial and class groups cannot be discussed without a focus on inequality and racism within America's structures and institutions, including hospitals, legislative/licensing bodies, and midwifery education institutions such as MEAC. In fact, institutional racism in midwifery education and authoritative boards is well documented (Goode, 2014). In addition, racial and cultural congruency between patient and provider has shown to improve health outcomes for mothers and babies (Williams & Cooper, 2010).

The license requirement works to limit the number of cultural and racial minority midwives serving their communities, directly contributing to the harm of minority birthing people and babies.

I respectfully ask that you pass SB 2661 to exempt traditional midwives from midwifery licensing requirements.

I am submitting testimony in full support of SB 2661.Such as stated in Section 1. Of the bill, disparities in maternal and infant mortality are rooted in racism. Structural racism in health care and social service delivery means that Black/Indigenous women often receive poorer quality care than white women. It means the denial of care when Black/Indigenous women seek help when enduring pain or that health care and social service providers fail to treat them with dignity and respect. These stressors and the cumulative experience of racism and sexism, especially during sensitive developmental periods, trigger a chain of biological processes, known as weathering, that undermine Black/Indigenous women's physical and mental health. Out of 100 births, only 10 to 12 will be attended by a midwife – and 9 out of 10 of these midwives are white. Yet globally, most childbearing women are attended to by midwives, only turning to an obstetrician if serious complications arise.

Midwifery is one of the most ancient of traditions and professions in the world, with roots that can be traced back to the healing traditions of Babylonia, Egypt, Ancient Greece, Vedic India, and the Aztecs. How has this essential role been so obliterated with barely a peep from feminists claiming reproductive liberation and rejecting male domination, pink pussy hats and all? How did we lose our way in this long-standing battle to keep the patriarchy out of our pregnant uteruses? And why is American midwifery so white?

Until the late 19th century, the majority of births were attended by midwives, many of whom were Black, indigenous, or immigrant women. Most midwives, including enslaved women, drew upon traditional healing knowledge and practices passed down through generations. Others learned their practice through apprenticeship, either to local physicians or experienced midwives in their community. In the early 20th century, however, as childbirth became medicalized, physicians emerged as the primary birth attendants and childbirth moved from the home to the hospital. Midwives delivered about half of all babies in the U.S. in the early 1900s; by 1930, however, that figure had dropped to fifteen percent.

Congress passed the Sheppard-Towner Act of 1921. This regulatory initiative provided federal funding to states to establish midwifery training and licensure and targeted Black

midwives in the South, who represented the largest group of unregulated birth attendants. "Midwifery" is now an extremely white female profession.

With the creeping privatization of American health is the near obliteration of birthing at home. Part of this is the growing narrative that birth is risky, needing constant vigilance for medical interventions. Bringing birth into the hospital was business strategy 101: bring the customer to you, manage more than one labor at time, centralize care, and create a medical birth monopoly completely controlled by male obstetricians.

So the question in a country whose foundations remain rooted in white supremacy is whether midwives are ready for a reckoning. Can midwifery uproot themselves from its ties to misogyny and white supremacy in a workforce that currently identifies as 90% white.If midwifery is to thrive into another century in the United States – in the midst of a deeply racialized maternal health crisis, where Black/Indigenous women are three to four times more likely to die in a childbearing complication – then we need to start looking for a way to invest and support the growth of Black, Indigenous, and immigrant midwives of color to reclaim the legacy of midwifery that existed well before Mary Breckinridge.

Aloha Senators,

In 2019 Act 32 regarding licensure of midwives was passed and implemented in 2020. Those who supported the bill often said it was necessary to **1**- Protect the community. A public health emergency picture was painted. It was made out to seem that emergency transports and unfavorable outcomes were occurring at home all the time. One legislature said there were emergency transports from home births every day in Hawai'i. There were only 302 home births in Hawai'i in 2017 and 325 in 2018 with 4 and 6 infant transports respectively. This is just one example of many inaccuate beliefs and statements that clouded this topic. **And 2**- to increase access to midwifery care. Let me break down points 1 & 2 and demonstrate that those arguments held no water then, and hold no water now - 2 years after the law has been implemented.

1- The belief that there was a public health crisis with out of control unfavorable birth outcomes was fueled by anecdotal stories. There were no statistics to reference at the time. When Act 32 passed- it required the formation of a Hawai'i Home Birth taskforce that collected statistics from midwives from all Hawaiian islands. Those statistics can be found here:

The data collected - which was congruent with DOH's data- showed favorable outcomes with home birth midwives in 2018 - when there was no regulation. We presented these statistics in 2021 in hopes of creating an exemption for traditional midwives. But we were told that it was too early to tell if the licensure law was working and if changes were appropriate. Now 2 years after licensure being implemented - there has been no data collection from licensed midwives to prove that the program is working or not. But we do have data to show that home birth in Hawai'i with midwives who were unlicensed and unregulated is safe.

2- There are approximately 7 actively practicing home birth midwives on the island of Oahu. I know this because I am a part of them. Only one of these 7 is licensed. Only one. Yes, there are other individuals on island who have a midwifery license. But they do not have an active home

birth midwifery practice. In July of 2023 - the remaining 6 unlicensed midwives serving Oahu, will be outlawed. So this bill has literally done the opposite - it has DECREASED midwifery access to the community instead of increasing access as it was tooted it would.

I am a traditional midwife and I have trained with certified professional midwives, nurses, obstetricians, naturopathic doctors, and traditional midwives. I have served in communities where mandatory licensure exists and can attest first handedly that it causes more harm than good. When rigid rules pinhole women into having limited legally approved practitioners that they don't want to work with - they often turn to birthing alone. Not because that is what they want but because they are pushed to choose one extreme or another. Please do not put Hawaii's women in this position. Please do not create more division and polarity. Please support the diversity that already exists.

As a *Kanaka 'Ōiwi Kauka* (Native Hawaiian physician) who specializes in the care of newborns requiring specialized medical care, I recognize that there is mistrust among Native Hawaiian and other indigenous communities towards western medicine. There is still much western medicine can learn from traditional practices to improve the health of our *mākuahine* and *keiki* (mothers and babies), as physicians have moved away from outdated practices such as immediate umbilical cord severance or separation of mothers and babies after birth and have made traditional practices such as skin to skin bonding between mother and infants immediately after birth now the standard of medical care. I believe such practices can co-exist with life-saving standards of care in modern medicine, particular in the early recognition of complications during pregnancy, labor or neonatal care where timely referral to advanced medical care services can prevent permanent disability or death.

I have cared for numerous infants and their 'ohana (family) who have faced serious harm or disability due to late recognition and transfer of care after home birth in Hawai'i. A recently published study by my colleagues demonstrated that infants with hypoxic brain injury were three times more likely to have had a planned home birth in Hawai'i. https://pubmed.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/35037395/. Our *mākuahine* (mothers) in Hawai'i have the right to decide where to give birth and with whom as their birth attendants. They have the right to seek Reproductive Justice, defined as the human right to personal bodily autonomy and have children in a safe community. This proposed bill undermines the original bill's intent to ensure that home birth occurs as safely as possible with appropriately licensed and skilled providers and thus undermines the ability of *wāhine* (women) to seek Reproductive Justice. While there already is a provision in the original bill that exempt Native Hawaiian healing practices, this proposed bill seeks to create a new category for exemption entitled "traditional midwives", which is vaguely defined as "a person who adheres to the core competencies of the National Aboriginal Council of Midwives and practices under the Hawaii Home Birth Elders Council." Such an amendment would open a path for all direct entry midwives regardless of their education/training/skills to seek this exemption and the potential for abuse and misappropriation of Native Hawaiian cultural practices already exempted in the original bill by non-Native Hawaiian or other non-indigenous persons. In fact, an examination of the core competencies of the National Aboriginal Council of Midwives does indeed reveal a requirement of knowledge and competency in the use of modern advance resuscitation techniques and equipment, further supporting the need for regulation and licensure to ensure the safest environment possible for home birth.

Rejection of SB 2661 will ensure that *wāhine* (women) who choose to have a home birth will be attended by competently skilled providers with the *'ike* (knowledge) to both embrace traditional cultural values and advanced medical interventions when needed to achieve *Mauli Oli* (optimal health balance of spiritual, physical, mental and social wellbeing).

Dear Senate Committee on Health,

I am providing the following comments regarding SB2661. As the law currently is written, there is an exemption for persons choosing to serve women in labor and birth who choose not to become licensed. The Hawaii State Constitution protects Native Hawaiian practices in perpetuity, and they are also noted as exempt from requirement for licensure. The amendments to SB2661 provide exemptions to non-Native Hawaiian persons practicing without education, curriculum, or oversight in place, while granting full scope practice authority. If the Legislature desires to do this, my question is, why would we leave the midwife licensure law in place? This amendment allows anyone to practice without a license which is what the Legislature, and State Auditor one two separate occasionas, determined previously could not continue.

I encourage the Senate Committe on Health to consider what objective they are trying to achieve with amending HRS 457-J and review if the amendment achieves that purpose. I believe the public should be aware who the Legislature is trying to grant midwifery practice to without licensure, as it is not clearly outlined in the amendment.

STATEMENT OF SUPPORT FROM THE MAUI COUNTY COMMITTEE ON THE STATUS OF WOMEN

Support for Amendments to Act 32

The Maui County Committee on the Status of Women (MCCSW) stands in full support of the proposed changes to Act 32 proposed by the Hawai'i Homebirth Collective after working on the Hawai'i Home Birth Task Force. The requests laid out in the amendment are reasonable and should be supported as midwives provide an important and valuable role in our communities.

MCCSW believes that passing Act 32 into law (requiring licensure of midwives in the State of Hawai'i) was too harsh and restrictive and unreasonable for many midwives who have been practicing for years and even decades. The numerous data presented by midwives and others showed no justification for such strict regulations, in fact, when compared to hospital births, the outcomes for home births with midwives showed better results.

The proposed amendment seeks to recognize "Traditional Midwives," who are trained according to culture with experienced midwives. The amendment would also recognize "Direct-entry Midwives," to honor the paths of nontraditional and non-certified midwives who have had many years of training with mentors and with peers in addition to formal and informal training and education.

MCCSW believes in the abilities of women to give birth to their babies and we support safe, healthy options for all birthing moms. Act 32 takes away the options for women who would choose a homebirth with a Traditional or Direct-Entry Midwife. The amendments suggested will have no impact on the already Certified Professional Midwives but would create a way to recognize the training and expertise of Traditional and Direct-Entry Midwives and take away sanctions and punishments that are unnecessary and are another way to oppress women and our reproductive rights. Women have been giving birth to babies since the beginning of time, it is unnecessary to overregulate birth without documented justification.

The Hawai'i State Legislature passed this law based on individual horror stories of bad home birth outcomes that were terrible, but not the norm. Report after report from Hawai'i and from across the country was submitted that showed home birth to be safer than hospitals and midwives didn't push their own experiences with horrible outcomes happening in hospitals because the power structure doesn't flow that way. There are new reports, especially during the pandemic, of the value of having home birth as an option.

Bill 32 as it stands disproportionately affects Black, Indigenous and all People of Color (BIPOC)who are statistically proven to have worse maternal outcomes.

Furthermore, MCCSW recognizes that the wants and needs of women living in Hawaii are diverse. It is a fact that the State of Hawai'i faces unique challenges due to its geographical makeup as an island chain as well as its isolated location in the middle of the Pacific Ocean. The availability of birthing options and resources already varies widely by island. For example, women on Moloka'i and Lana'i are forced to move to either O'ahu or Maui a month before their due date, at their own expense, to give birth in a hospital on another island without their support systems.

Increasing professional pathways for Traditional Midwives and Direct-Entry Midwives may have more significant benefits for BIPOC households, as data shows BIPOC populations are statistically proven to have improved maternal outcomes when working with midwives for prenatal, birth, and postpartum care. Given that 74.5% of the population of Hawai'i is non-white (2019 American Community Survey), it is critical that the women in this State have a diverse range of options that will enable safe birthing care.

This bill disproportionately affects BIPOC midwives and other birth workers because there is no midwife certification program in the State so there is a huge geographical disadvantage for midwife candidates in Hawai'i. In addition, if midwifery students are able to participate in a program on the continent, there are very few preceptors available to supervise the students locally, particularly on neighbor islands. Most of these preceptors are white, intensifying the effect on BIPOC students. This law is part of the continuum of government overreach into women's reproductive rights. Women have a right to choose not to go to the hospital where outcomes often include a higher rate of unwanted medical interventions, cesarean operations, evacuation births and even forced sterilizations, particularly again in BIPOC women. These are the reasons more women in Hawai'i are seeking midwives and home births so they can have better control over what happens to them while they are giving birth.

Birth is a natural process and has been happening in home settings since the very beginning of time. Birth is an easy money maker for hospitals and the medical systems because it nearly always happens naturally without intervention, but can rake in the billing with each and every intervention. This is the real reason for government regulation and professionalization of a natural, human event.

The Hawai'i State Legislature did not consider the data, testimony and information provided by midwives fairly in comparison to the information provided by the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG)

After meeting for nearly a year, the Hawai'i Home Birth Task Force submitted a diminished version of the information to the Legislature. Not included were numerous studies and data verifying the safety and positive outcomes of home birth in Hawai'i presented by the Hawai'i Homebirth Collective, as well as testimony from Cultural Practitioners and organizations from Hawai'i and from other states and countries supporting the valuable work being done by midwives.

Women should be allowed to choose how and where they have their babies without government regulations. Homebirth and midwifery must be an option, especially for BIPOC women and babies.

Cultural and Traditional Midwives as well as Direct-Entry Midwives need to be allowed a pathway to practice and ultimately be recognized as professionals and experts in their fields in the State of Hawai'i.

I practice at Kapiolani Medical Center for Women and Children as well as Queen's Medical Center and provide obstetric care at both hospitals. I am nearing the end of my four years of residency training in obstetrics and gynecology. During those years I have delivered over 500 babies in Honolulu. Despite that high number, I and my fellow resident physicians are not licensed to independently provide obstetric care outside of our training program. Medical training and licensure is a closely regulated and well-organized system set in place to protect patients. The midwife licensure law does not restrict Native Hawaiian birth practices. There is specific language in the law that states that practitioners of Native Hawaiian birth practices are already exempt.

This is about public safety. We know that births attended by people who do not have basic competency to recognize complications can result in harm - whether those births occur in the hospital or out. This legislature and the state of Hawaii recognized that by making out of hospital births safer when they passed the midwife licensure law. This exemption would undermine that law. For this reason, I oppose SB 2661.

All healthcare providers are responsible for ensuring they are well-educated and well-trained in their specialty. We spend years to decades preparing to care for patients because it can be a matter of life and death. We are proud that we practice evidence-based medicine and are trained to handle emergencies. Childbirth can quickly become an emergency, whether that is due to postpartum hemorrhage, a shoulder dystocia where the baby gets stuck during delivery, or nonreassuring fetal status requiring immediate delivery to prevent fetal brain injury. All practitioners willing to deliver babies must be trained and experienced in handling these medical emergencies that can have devastating consequences if not handled appropriately. Therefore, I believe that midwives need to be upheld to the same standards and responsibilities so that patients and the community are well cared for. My name is Crystal-Marie Alpiche-Kanae and I am in support of SB2661 that will exempt traditional midwives from the licensing requirements set to go into effect in 2023.

In late 2021 my husband and I decided that we wanted to give birth to our last and final child at home. Due to COVID restrictions and the way that this pandemic has been and will be affecting our lives, we wanted to give our daughters the opportunity to experience the birth of their baby brother, to be intimately and lovingly involved, as well as see what a strong, beautiful woman's body is capable of.

Unfortunately, my entire family caught COVID and per DOH guidelines, we were no longer able to give birth at home with the comfort of having our midwife team physically present and able to assist in the birth of our son. However, there was massive confusion in the week leading up to my son's birth. I was being told by a doctor that I would have to give birth by myself in the emergency room, I was told by a nurse that I wouldn't have to give birth in the emergency room, I was told come, I was told that he couldn't, there were so many stories that it was a very stressful time and nothing was certain or clear. In addition to this, both of my daughters were induced so I had no idea what a normal birth looked like. I didn't know how to time my contractions or when to head out to the hospital, everything was a rather grey area that I had never experienced.

And because of this, I ended up going into active labor at home. If my husband and I hadn't made the choice to have a traditional midwife team to begin with, our experience of having our son at home could have been very traumatic and traumatizing for myself, my husband, and our daughters. However, because we had a traditional midwife, we were able to videoconference

with her and she made all the difference. She helped guide myself and my husband through the birthing process so that my son was healthy and safe, never put in a compromising position that would have affected him or I. Everything that she did for us, helped lead my body to do what it was naturally designed to do without putting me or my son at risk.

On the contrary, the 911 operator wanted someone to place their hand over my opening pelvis and try to keep my son in. This would have not only placed myself in danger from trying to deny my body of what it naturally needed to do, but it could've also put my son in danger because there wouldn't have been his father to nurturing and lovingly catch him as he exited my womb. If we hadn't had our traditional midwife to support us, the outcome of our story perhaps wouldn't have been as successful as it was. Those trusted with the responsibility of guiding pregnant and birthing people through this process need to be able to identify complications in a timely manner, and sometimes need to be able to quickly act. A woman experiencing postpartum hemorrhage could bleed to death in a matter of minutes if the birth attendant is not licensed and trained to perform the maneuvers or administer the medications to stop the bleeding. To whom it may concern,

As a woman, I believe in a woman's right to choose. Some women choose to birth their baby's in hospitals, some choose to birth their baby's in birthing centers, and some, like me, choose to birth their baby's at home with a traditional midwife. I chose my traditional midwife, Ki'i Kahoohanohano early in pregnancy and she and her partner, Kiana Rowley, nurtured me mind, body, and soul on my journey to motherhood.

Ki'i and Kiana's care starkly contrasted to the hurried and distracted care I received from the Kaiser doctors who Ki'i advised I continue seeing for labs. The Kaiser doctors spent minimal time discussing nutrition, lifestyle adjustments, mental health, and questions about pregnancy. My appointments usually lasted 5 minutes and routinely consisted of the doctor scaring me about potential worst outcomes, a highly unhealthy way to treat a pregnant woman. My meetings with Ki'i and Kiana were personal. They often lasted 2-3 hours and there was space for me and my husband to ask all our questions. Ki'i explained the tests the doctors were going to run so I was educated and unafraid. We discussed diet, exercise, and sleep in great detail. She also made herself available for my emotions- anyone who has journeyed to parenthood knows there is so much more than blood work that must be cared for along the way. Ki'i and Kiana cared holistically. When it came time to birth my baby I felt confident and prepared, in large part because of their care.

My daughter's birth, attended by Ki'i and one of her apprentices, at home was smooth and beautiful. I was calm and focused throughout. Ki'i gave me the space to follow my intuition so that labor was as easeful and comfortable as possible. At the same time she monitored the whole process, checked my vitals, kept me hydrated, and assured me that I could bring my baby into this world. I felt safe, I was safe, and that made labor a marvelous dance rather than a painful experience. When my baby was born, Ki'i placed her in my arms and my heart filled with unfathomable love and gratitude.

Though my daughter is 2 months old now, Ki'i continues to care for our ohana. Her postnatal visits have helped make my postpartum journey, like my pregnancy and birth, graceful. As a new mother I have many questions and Ki'i is always there when I ask. She has counseled me and my husband and we are indebted to her. Not only has my family grown with the addition of our daughter, it has grown with the addition of an aunty.

My birth was beautiful beyond comparison. Because of the counseling and care I received during my pregnancy and birth from my traditional midwife, I feel strong as a mother. I trust my instincts and myself. When I hear the birth stories of many friends I do not hear the same sentiment about their experience. Too many of my friends have been traumatized in their births and have had a rough postpartum adjustment. It makes me sad. Every woman has the right to an intuitive, empowering, and beautiful birth. There is certainly a place for medicine and I'm grateful that we have modern technology when we need it, but there is also a place for traditional midwifery. Every woman has the right to choose. I trust that the State of Hawai'i will continue to allow women to decide what model of care is best for them and their families.

Dear Chair, Vice Chair and members of the committee,

I am writing to you to express my support of SB2661, to exempt traditional midwives from midwifery licensing requirements. My name is Gianny Navas, and as a woman, doula, student midwife, and aspiring mother, I wouldn't want to be served during my pregnancy, birth, and postpartum by any midwife other than one of the traditional midwives on the island. If I don't have the chance to have a traditional midwife to attend me at my birth, my options would be limited. There are many women who want a home birth with a midwife who holds traditional knowledge and techniques to carry out a safe labor and birth. I want limited medical interventions, to be in my home where I feel safe, and with someone assisting me in a way that also guided the women in my family in the past, before hospitals, nurse midwives, or licenses. This is a choice I feel comfortable and safe with, and would be the opposite in a hospital. I would also not feel comofrtable having a homebirth with a nurse midwife, or one who was more medical minded and didn't share any cultural birth knowledge the way traditional midwives do. At the end of the day, a licensed provider does not make me feel safe. I would rather have a traditional midwife who has been practicing for 10 years, over a new licensed midwife practicing for 3-5 years. Midwifery is not neurosurgery, psychiatry, or any other typical medical field. It is women serving laboring women, and has been around since the beginning.

It is disappointing, and quite appalling that Act 32 has been implemented. An act that completely disregards all the traditional midwives in the past who have served mother's and their babies without a license. An act that is only adding more regulation, and control to a practice that has been around since the literal beginning of mankind and did not need a license or college degree. An act that will only limit women's choices in who they include in their birth, forcing them to hire a midwife who does not support or understand their culture, religion, or values especially regarding birth. This act will reduce the amount of midwives available for mother's on the island to choose who they are comfortable with. Mother's who's aunts, mothers, grandmothers, sisters, nieces, and other family members have used these traditional midwives, will no longer be able to have them serve their birth. At least a dozen midwives will be outlawed if this bill doesnt pass.

Midwifery, and especially traditional midwifery, is not just about medicine, but about the cultural, and religious aspects of care along with safe homebirth midwifery care. Traditional midwives feel obligated, and accountable to their community, and to serve the mothers who pick them as their midwives. It is a mother's decision to choose what kind of birth she wants, and who she wants attending it and serving her; one of the most important, if not the most, person

involving her birth is her traditional midwife. The traditional midwife understands the mother's needs, practices shared-decision making and informed consent, holds the birthing space, learns and practices with traditional, unique knowledge of birth, and helps guide the mother through her birthing experience in whichever way she needs. These are ways that only a traditional midwife can encourage, and a reason why women should have the choice to have a traditional midwife. As a friend of mine says "We are all descendants of someone who birthed at home without a licensed midwife."

Thank you for taking the time to read my testimony, and for this opportunity for us to fight to expent traditional midwives from licensure. This is the chance for you to rectify the issue that was originally created, and we appreciate you greatly for listening. I support SB2661.

I am a physician who takes care of sick babies in a newborn intensive care unit in Hawai'i. As a pediatrician, I am an advocate of children who have no voice, regardless of their age, sex, gender, ethnicity, or race.

In my practice, I have cared for newborns who have suffered from both illness and injury as a result of delay in seeking necessary hospital care by birth attendants who are not licensed to practice in the state. If families would like a home delivery, it is their choice but it should not be at the expense of the infant. Not every pregnancy is a candidate for a home birth and families should be recommended that they deliver in the hospital if the safety of mother and infant is in question. Even "good" candidates for home deliveries can have unexpected and devastating outcomes. I strongly feel that families should be aware of complications of having a home delivery.

Parents depend on the knowledge of their medical providers to give them that information. Medical providers have received rigorous schooling and training, in addition to being certified for their job. My scope of practice as a pediatrician is to care for children. It would be considered malpractice if I performed neurosurgery on a patient. That is because we are held accountable for the type and quality of medical care provided for our patients. What we want is for the birth attendants to be licensed and potentially carry malpractice insurance, like all medical providers do. We want parents to have an option for recourse should there be a death. What we want is a standard to provide basic care for the mother and infant. We want them to have the training to recognize when something is out of the scope of their practice and refer their patients to be seen by another provider. Licensure can help standardize the minimum requirements to practice.

I believe it is the choice of parents to have a licensed or unlicensed birth attendant at the delivery. Parents should not have the concern for CWS involvement based on their choice because many parents respond appropriately by bringing in their baby for further evaluation and treatment.

Families should have the choice between a licensed and unlicensed practitioner. I am under the impression that Native Hawaiian practitioners are already exempt under the current midwife licensure law. Ultimately, I want families to know the risks and benefits of a home delivery and I want them to know whether or not their birth attendants are licensed.

I oppose bill SB2661 as it seeks exemptions for birth attendants who do not want or do not qualify for licensure in Hawaii.

I am a neonatologist who takes care of sick babies in a neonatal intensive care unit in Hawaii. In my practice, I have cared for newborns who have suffered from both illness and injury as a result of delay in seeking necessary hospital care by birth attendants who are not licensed to practice in the state.

The preservation of indigenous birth practices should be supported, as it recognizes the unique social, economic, and health needs and circumstances of Native Hawaiians. As has been noted previously by the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, as early as 1865, Kamehameha V began issuing licenses to Hawaiian kahuna. It is our responsibility as part of the medical community to ensure that health professionals have the appropriate level of training and credentialing. I would like to point out that Native Hawaiian birth practitioners are already exempt under the current midwife licensure law signed in 2019 under section 457J-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

Based on my experiences as a licensed medical doctor for over 17 years, I believe the safest place for delivery is in the hospital setting. I agree with the American Academy of Pediatrics and American Heart Association that each delivery should be attended by 2 individuals, at least 1 of whom is primarily responsible for the care of the newborn infant and has the appropriate training, skills, and equipment to perform a full resuscitation of the infant in accordance with the principles of the Neonatal Resuscitation Program. I believe that all newborn infants should be evaluated by a health care professional who is knowledgeable and experienced in pediatrics within 24 hours of birth, as recommended by the American Academy of Pediatrics.

That being said, I understand that there will be mothers in Hawaii that will choose home birth as an option. A study recently published in the Journal of Midwifery and Women's Health demonstrated that neonates in Hawaii with hypoxic ischemic encephalopathy (lack of adequate oxygen or blood flow to the brain) were 3 times more likely to have been a planned home birth compared with neonates without hypoxic ischemic encephalopathy (Buchanan et al, 2022). I am happy for the families that have had a successful home birth resulting in a healthy baby. However, I have personally treated babies born at home in Hawaii for life threatening conditions including hypoxic ischemic encephalopathy, seizures, heart arrhythmias, and bacterial infection. I have seen babies die after home birth due to delays in seeking hospital care. It is these babies that I think of in forming my opinion on the need for home birth patient safety measures, as all of these poor outcomes were likely preventable.

The choice Hawaii's mothers should have to make is between delivering safely in a hospital or safely at home. I am a neonatologist, a pediatrician physician who specializes in the care of sick babies in a newborn intensive care unit in Hawai'i. In my practice, I have cared for newborns who have suffered from both illness and injury as a result of delay in seeking necessary hospital care by birth attendants who are not licensed to practice in the state.

I want to also just share a study that was just published in the Journal of Midwifery and Women's Health that analyzed data from the NICU at Kapi'olani Medical Center available at <u>https://pubmed.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/35037395/</u>. It reviewed Hawaii statewide birth data, looking at admissions for hypoxic brain injury and found that neonates with hypoxic brain injury were 3 times more likely to have been planned home births than normal neonates. I am not strongly against home births as they are necessary and quite accepted in many cultures, but they should be done as safely as possible. The data in the paper shows that we need to do what we can to make home births safer.

The present midwife licensure law went a long way in at least saying that those who call themselves midwives must have a certain amount of training and demonstrated competency. The argument used for the proposed Birth Attendant Bill SB2661 is the importance of preserving indigenous birth practices. Preserving indigenous birth practices is vital in this state. However, Native Hawaiian birth practitioners are already exempt under the current midwife licensure law. This proposed bill appears to try to expand the definition of traditional practitioner. The definition of "traditional midwife" on this proposed bill is quite vague and lends itself to misuse and abuse of this terminology by non-Native Hawaiian practitioners who wish to practice without oversight – regardless of the danger it poses to the families and babies in our state and the misrepresentation of our very important Native Hawaiian practitioners who are already exempted from this oversight by law.

I oppose any bill that seeks exemptions for birth attendants who do not wish to make the necessary efforts to qualify for licensure in Hawai'i to improve the safety of home births. It is selfish and unfair to the families and babies in our state.

Criminalizing traditional midwives puts women at higher risk and disempowers our community as a whole. Chong, My family is from the Eastern Band of Cherokee, my children are Native Hawaiian, I am a Midwife Licensed in the state of Hawaii, I attended a "Traditional Midwifery" MEAC approved program. I seamlessly weave my familial cultural and traditional practices with the latest clinically safe practices available.

Thank you for being here today and hearing my 'Comments Only' testimony. I am not against Traditional Midwifery practices, nor do I think that alone is unsafe or considered less than. I do however think every profession should adhere to the highest standards and continue to strive for best care. I believe that best care is a blend of culturally matched care, and clinically based knowledge and resources.

This bill raises many questions. Questions of accountability, skills attainment and clinical application.

I know that the Native Hawaiian Community is protected and will continue to forge their way towards sustaining, revitalization and growth of traditional midwifery practices. This is already protected federally and named in the previous Act32. So if we are not talking about Native Hawaiian Practices I respectfully ask what indigenous midwifery model are we talking about? Yes, there are several different cultures represented here, my own included, but I would like to ask who is the cultural representative/practitioner of these other traditional practices and how can we best support them?

Stated in Bill 2661 is a change to the definition of a ""Traditional midwife" means a person who adheres to the core competencies of the National Aboriginal Council of Midwives and practices under the Hawaii Home Birth Elders Council." I am very familiar with the NACM's work and the 9 core competencies.

"Core Competences of Indigenous Midwives Include: Contribute to the revival and growth of Indigenous knowledge, Awareness of Indigenous worldviews and realities, Honour the relationship with the land and water, Reduce birth evacuations, Education and mentorship for Indigenous Midwifery students, Acknowledge Spirit, Support rites of passage, including pregnancy rites, birth rites, parenting rites, Honor and respect Indigeneity, Facilitate Indigenous cultural practices for labour and birth, Increase culturally based food security, Distinct ability to contribute to the healing of families and communities and Acknowledge the Newborn." The program that houses such a tall order of education and professional privileges also very specifically states this care model is, "Essential, clinically excellent, culturally rooted, primary health care BY Indigenous health professionals FOR Indigenous families and communities." https://indigenousmidwifery.ca/wp-content/uploads/2019/06/NACM Banner Infographic.pdf Their program also has collaborative sharing of clinical knowledge and rotation in clinical sites with licensed providers including CNMs, CPMs, OB's etc... clinicals lasting 3-4 years with core competency evaluations.

Who is entrusted with creating, implementing, and monitoring the progress of such a cumulative academic program and the infrastructure needed? Hawaii Homebirth Elders Counsel?

If this is for Indigenous providers, for indigenous families, who is evaluating someone's indigenous status and by what criteria? When can that be shared so we can see it? This could pose a serious issue with discrimination for sure and in turn limit access for those communities at highest risk.

Which makes me curious again, wouldn't this be the Native Hawaiian Community? Which has already been accounted for in the original Act?

Is the organization founded in 2019 wanting to take over the Native Hawaiian Traditional Midwifery, the "Indigenous Midwifery" counsel from the already established Papa Ola Lokahi? And is POL involved in this decision?

If this isn't to replace or protect Native, Indigenous Practices who is it for?

Does it protect the community of diverse families that call these islands home? Does it increase safety for birthing people in Hawaii?

Thank you for reading my testimony, I hope that we can find clarity of this Bill and get answers to the questions. I want the best outcome for the families of Hawaii and making thoughtful, judgements is important.

When we drive our traditional midwives underground, the dialogue between both worlds becomes nonexistent out of fear of persecution. Continued care by our traditional midwives and ob/gyns, working together is imperative in order to make our births safe, in the event there needs to be transfer of care from the home.

Limiting the home birth midwives in our community will not make it safer. Women have the right to choose who they want to attend their births at home. They will continue to do so, law or no law. We all know that you cannot get in a woman's way, once her mind is made up.

Let our mothers have autonomy over their bodies. You cannot regulate midwifery, just like you cannot regulate a woman's bodies. One woman's birth is not the same as another's. I am a Kauka Kanaka 'Ōiwi who specializes in the field of medical genetics and genomics. As a rare disease doctor, and as a Native Hawaiian, I recognize the historical trauma between our indigenious commnity towards western medicine. While I practice "western" medicine, I believe that there is still a space where Native Hawaiian cultural practices and western medicine can co-exsit to provide better care for our lāhui. However, I do do not believe that midwives should be able to practice without appropriate oversight. I have cared for countless kamaiki who would have be perfectly healthy babies, but have been left neurologically devastated (or worse, have faced death) after having a complicated home birth where the midwife did not reconize the need to seek medical attention. A recently published study by my colleagues demonstrated that infants with hypoxic brain injury were three times more likely to have had a planned home birth in Hawai'i when compared to infants born in a hospital setting (https://pubmed.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/35037395/). Regulation and licensure for midwives must exist to ensure the safest enviroment possible for home birth.

Our makuahine in Hawai'i have the right to decide where to give birth and with whom as their birth attendants. They have the right to seek Reproductive Justice, defined as the human right to personal bodily autonomy and have children in a safe community. This proposed bill undermines the original bill's intent to ensure that home birth occurs as safely as possible with appropriately licensed and skilled providers and thus undermines the ability of wahine to seek Reproductive Justice. While there already is a provision in the original bill that exempts Native Hawaiian healing practices, this proposed bill seeks to create a new category for exemption entitled "traditional midwives", which is vaguely defined as "a person who adheres to the core competencies of the National Aboriginal Council of Midwives and practices under the Hawaii Home Birth Elders Council." Such an amendment would open a path for all direct entry midwives, regardless of their education/training/skills, to seek this exemption and the potential for abuse and misappropriation of Native Hawaiian cultural practices already exempted in the original bill by non-Native Hawaiian or other non-indigenous persons. In fact, an examination of the core competencies of the National Aboriginal Council of Midwives does indeed reveal a requirement of knowledge and competency in the use of modern advanced resuscitation techniques and equipment.

We owe it to our keiki and our future generations to ensure the safest environment possible for home birth with regulation and licensure for midwives. Rejection of SB 2661 will ensure that wāhine who choose to have a home birth will be in the hands of competent providers who have the 'ike to embrace traditional cultural values and advanced medical interventions when needed to achieve Mauli Oli.

Aloha, I am writing today in support of SB 2661. As a student midwife I began my apprenticeship in 2017 and chose this route of study because of its flexibility for me as a mom of 5. My training included traditional midwifery knowledge and education as well as clinical knowledge and assessments. This route also required me demonstrate didactic and hands on midwifery skills. This training would ultimately be preparing me to sit for the nationally recognized certifying NARM exam. I passed my NARM exam and obtained CPM certification in early 2020. This exact exam is also required to be taken by any student midwife who is enrolled in a MEAC accredited midwifery school. The state passed a law in 2019 that only allows for a student enrolled in a MEAC accredited institution and obtains their CPM certification to be licensed. Although I qualified for and passed the same exam required for MEAC enrolled midwifery students, I do not qualify for the state's midwifery license. My training and knowledge gained through my apprenticeship is not sufficient for the state but is sufficient for a national CPM certifying body.

This law passed elimates the possibility of me legally practicing in a state where my skills are actively sought after. I am a black woman. Black women, even in the state of Hawaii, have much higher rates (3-4x's higher) of maternal morbidity and mortality in the United States. Many minority women are choosing midwives, such as myself, to help guide them safely through their pregnancy and births. Given America's history of mistreatment of black and brown bodies in the medical system it should be no surprise that a midwife with my background and experience is an important choice for community members here on Oahu. I would not turn my back on any community member seeking my service.

Until I am able to complete additional requirements, which could take 2-3 more years, I am unable to practice in this state as a licensed CPM. By default I would choose to practice as a traditional midwife with skills that rival those of other licensed midwives in this state. If SB 2661 is not supported then I stand the chance of being considered illegal and thus criminalized for a profession that I have comparable expertise in. Ultimately, for me, seeking licensure IS something I would personally choose, yet I understand why other traditional midwives would not want to choose this path due to what they may see as red flags and/or inconsistencies in the way this law was written. I ask you today to protect those traditional midwives that are skilled and

knowledgeable but, due to one reason or another, are not able to OR do not want to be licensed. Their choice to be registered under HIHBC should be honored due to the role HIHBC plays in our home birth community. Thank you for your help with protecting traditional midwives in Hawaii.

My name is Brieanne Lacaillade. I am a graduate student of public health and a mother to a sixmonth old. I support SB 2661: Relating to Midwives. My baby was born at home in Waianae supported by traditional midwives. I desire all my future children to enter the world in this same way.

By having the baby at home, I knew I would be free from medical violence. I once had a surgical procedure done as a kid during which I was not adequately anesthetized. This created a fear of surgery and doctors. Instead we invited traditional midwives into our home, saving me from potentially having a scary experience with anesthesia (as done in hospitals), and keeping us from being in a hospital where COVID could be transmitted as well as a long trip to Town to a hospital from the West side. I felt safe. We got to include our cultural practices surrounding the birth that would not be possible in a medical setting.I got the birth I wanted because I got to choose who would care for baby and I. Everyone should be able to make the choice that is best for them.

Our baby was greeted into this world by a team of women whom we had gotten to know during prenatal home visits. In a hospital we would have been with strangers during the birth and labor. Instead, we had women who knew all our concerns, goals, and family members. We all trusted each other. They brought their invaluable, beautiful wisdom and experience that the community needs to stay strong and attached to their culture.

Birthing people should be able to choose who attends their birth, whether any kind of midwife or other provider. It is a human right. Traditional midwives preserve culture with the care they give to the community by reminding us that birth is sacred.

It is a fundamental right that Hawai'i's birthing persons have autonomy in their choice of a childbirth provider. Choosing where and with whom to give birth is a basic human right. Families in Hawai'i have always sought the care of the traditional midwives in their communities and it is essential that they are able to continue doing so.

Continuing to regulate reproductive health by limiting choices in prenatal and birth care is not acceptable.

I respectfully ask that you pass SB 2661 to exempt traditional midwives from midwifery licensing requirements.

Dear members of the Senate Committee on Health,

I am a Native Hawaiian family physician who is opposing this bill. Although I value our traditional healing practices, I believe this bill is too broad and would allow too many requests I am concerned as it speaks to racism and seeks to address it and yet, the for exemptions. connection between racism and how this bill, which is placed clearly in Hawaii, addresses racism is not well laid out. The use of the term "traditional" could be confusing as we in Hawaii think of "traditional" in the context of "traditional Native Hawaiian" healing practices. Also, naming the Hawaii Home Birth Elders Council in this bill may lead the public to think of a Native Hawaiian elders council (where this term is usually heard) which it is not. I worry about misunderstanding by the public. The Hawaii home birth group does not appear to have a focus on Native Hawaiian practices and the Aboriginal Council of Midwives is based out of Canada. Do our traditional healers and practitioners of Native Hawaiian midwifery support these core competencies? Do any of these core competencies conflict with these exemptions? Most importantly, as a physician who must be licensed and submit to licensing requirements, I understand that this is a way for the State to try to protect it's citizens. Being licensed assumes an acceptable level of competence. Why put our keiki at risk by allowing very broad exemptions? Childbirth is full of risks and complications have life long effects. Licensing was developed for the purpose of safety in mind; most healthcare providers understand and accept its function and purpose. I am not anti midwifery, but I am "anti" avoiding that which is put in place to protect our citizens, especially our precious keiki. Why would we hide from licensing by requesting exemptions? Why would anyone want to put our keiki at risk?
