Dear Chairs Rhoads and Moriwake, Vice Chairs and Committee Members:

The American Civil Liberties Union of Hawai'i ("ACLU of Hawai'i") writes in **support of S.B. 2694.** This bill requires requires all principal departments in the State to use gender-neutral terminology in all state contracts.

We testified in support of HB 1165 a few years ago, which ultimately became Act 148. That Act created the "X" gender option for driver's licenses. According to the Williams Institute, Hawai'i has the highest percentage of its population identifying as transgender in the nation. In 2016, the National Center for Transgender Equality released its 2nd U.S. Transgender Survey, which included the experiences of almost 28,000 respondents. Only 11% of respondents reported that *all* of their IDs had the name and gender they preferred, and 68% reported that *none* of their IDs matched the name and gender that theypreferred.

Before Act 148, Hawaii's driver's licenses and state identification cards did not recognize non-binary people, who self-identify as neither male nor female, both male and female, or something else. Approximately 31% of respondents to the U.S. Transgender Survey identified as non-binary. For these individuals, neither an "M" nor an "F" gender marker accurately reflects their gender identity. Offering a third option will provide a more accurate gender designation, as well as a privacy option for those who do not wish to disclose their gender.

Similarly here, mandating the use of gender-neutral terminology in the implementation of all state contracts better reflects and respects the gender identity of all parties to these contracts. This is a welcome step forward to promoting equality and inclusivity.

Aloha e Senators Misalucha, Chang, and Lee:

I have been a Hawaii resident for over 57 years. I attended public schools, the University of Hawaii, and have worked as a public school teacher since 1987.

Fairness and equity have been passions in my life. Born and raised as a female, I was often told to "be more ladylike" and learned to be quiet and not make waves. I often complied, but noticed things like girls being forced to wear dresses at graduation, the sport of football receiving far more attention than other sports at school, and being forced to use the term "Miss" or "Mrs." while it didn't matter for males whether they were married or not ("Mr.").

These seemed like small things back then. However, since our teachers' untion (HSTA) is 76% female, I found it odd that male-gender descriptions were used when a majority of our union is female (https://www.hawaiipublicschools.org/Reports/Employment%20Report%2018-19.pdf).

I noticed inconsistent usage of language as I skimmed the contract agreement for July 1, 2013 to June 30, 2017, I noticed that many pages contained gender-biased language: (I sent this in an email to HSTA 11/28/2017). Here are a couple of examples:

page 36 (section D, his, he, he, he . . .)

48 (section B, his, his, his . . .)

37 (section E, he, his, his . . .) + more

For many years, I asked HSTA (through surveys, Institute Day sessions, e-mails, meetings w/union reps, speaking personally to the HSTA President, etc. . .) to use gender-neutral language in our teacher contracts. The union leadership responded and said they would address this issue (Jan. 19, 2017 email to members):

"Protect and Support All Teachers. HSTA advocates for teachers having a safe, supporting work environment. The HSTA is proposing improved language in the following areas: . . . and changes to verbiage in the contract to reflect that majority of the unit is female." Until this year, none of the verbiage had changed. Union leadership said that the state did not want to change any older portions of the contract (thus the inconsistent use of gender-neutral terms). I volunteered to go through our contract to find the terms that were not equitable but again was told it was the state negotiators that did not want to change the terminology.

Therefore, I am asking for a law to ensure that all state contracts use gender-neutral terms. This way, there will be no excuse for using sexist language. To ensure equity for all genders and those who are non-conforming, we should use the proper language to ensure inclusiveness, equity, and respect.

Final note: HSTA did finally update our contract: (email from 01/14/2022):

"HSTA contract updated with gender-neutral language

The 2021–23 Hawaii State Teachers Association Collective Bargaining Agreement, or contract, has been updated with gender-neutral language. Previous contracts utilized masculine pronouns in reference to gender types.

'To have so many vestigial references to 'he' and 'him' in a contract that covers a primarily female profession speaks to the outdated nature of such language," said HSTA President Osa Tui, Jr.

The updated digital contract is available for download with the printed version to be distributed to members in the near future.'

Although the HSTA contract has now been updated, I'd like a law to ensure that all state contracts use fair and respectful language for all genders.
